## Mrs. Andrew Johnstone, 97, Dies At Home In Kensington

KENSINGTON — Mrs. Andrew Johnstone died at her home here Wednesday following an illness of several months.

In her 98th year, she was the oldest resident of Long River where she lived most of her life and of Kensington where she has resided for the past four years.

Formerly Janie Brown of Margate, she was married to Andrew Johnstone of Long River who predeceased her in 1902, leaving her with a young family.

Surviving are one daughter, Bessie, (Mrs. Murdoch MacLeod), Kensington; three sons,

William, with whom she resided on the homestead at Long River and later at Kensington; Ernest W. of Woodleigh and Edwin, a former mayor of Charlottetown now living at New Haven; also a grandson, Arthur Johnstone, whom she raised from early childhood, and other grandchildren.

A son, Arthur, was killed in the First World War. Other survivors include the following brothers and sisters — Alexander and Harry Brown and Mrs. Dan MacKenzie, all of Kensington. The funeral will be held from Kensington United Church Friday at 2 p.m.

## Assessment System Changes Suggested For Nova Scotia

SYDNEY (CP) — Plans for sweeping changes in Nova Scotia's municipal assessment system were placed before representatives of local governments here Wednesday.

W.E. Moseley, deputy minister of municipal affairs, announced he would recommend to the government that the present system of individual assessment departments in the separate units be abolished. Instead, the province would be organized into some 22 districts for assessment purposes.

The deputy minister told the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities changes were being considered in the present assessment appeals system.

Provincial assessment director H.B. MacGlashan said Nova Scotia, through its training program, had built up a corps of well-trained assessors. Smaller municipalities still operated with part-time, untrained men because there was not enough work for a permanent employee.

The new plan proposed dividing the province into areas, each of which would have a trained director of assessment with the required staff. They would carry out valuations for all municipal units within the district.

The biggest advantage, he said, would be elimination of the untrained assessors. Other advantages included improved assessment rolls, greater uniformity of valuation, use of labor saving equipment, efficient use of trained men, uniform dates for closing assessment rolls, better public relations and attraction of good men to the assessment work.

Alternatives were being considered. One proposal was for appointment of regional appeal courts, composed of competent members.

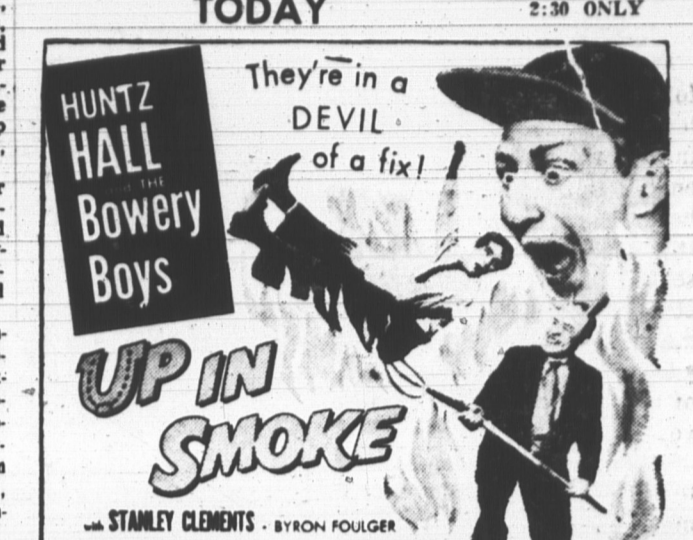

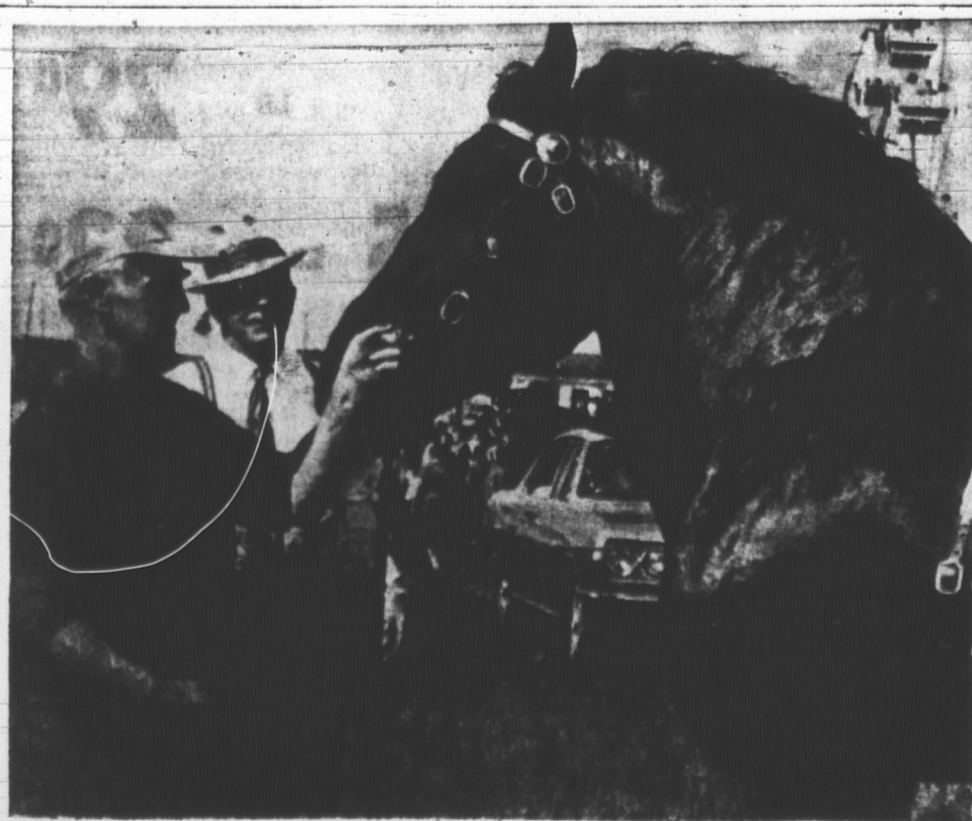

## St. John's Plans \$3,000,000 Hotel

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Plans for a \$3,000,000, 200 room motor hotel for St. John's were approved Wednesday by city council.

The 200-room hotel is to be operated here by Ramada Motor Hotels Ltd., Inc., an American hotel chain.

Construction must begin by November of the option which the company holds on land here will be cancelled by the St. John's Housing Corporation.

The Ramada Hotel would be the largest in the city. The CNR's Newfoundland Hotel is the largest now with 140 rooms.

Another 125-room hotel, announced last week, is to be constructed as part of a \$10,000,000 commercial redevelopment in downtown St. John's.

The new Ramada Hotel is being built and financed by Atlantic Investments Inc. of St. John's.

## Russian Delegates Reach Canadian Goal

INUUVIK, N.W.T. (CP) — A Russian delegation touring Canadian projects reached a major goal Tuesday at this town built on stilts 100 miles north of the Arctic Circle.

The Russians, all construction engineers with special interests in northern development, have really been aiming at Inuvik since they arrived in Canada Aug. 16. They wanted to compare Canadian and Russian methods of building on permafrost and the stop at Inuvik has given them their first good opportunity to study such techniques in Canada.

Most buildings here are built on piles frozen into the permafrost. The Russian party includes the engineer who was largely responsible for the construction of Norilsk, a modern city of 130,000 well within the Arctic Circle in the U.S.S.R.

Boris Ermilov is proud when ever anyone mentions the achievements at Norilsk. The city has everything you would find in any large community in the Western world—tall buildings, theatres, apartment projects, sports stadiums, paved roads and parking problems.

Canada has little in the north to compare with it, but Mr. Ermilov and the five other members of the Russian group freely admit they have learned a few things about construction methods and organization during the trip, which still has eight days to go.

The Russians appear to have been most impressed at the way large Canadian corporations and government agencies provide comfortable attractive, and in some cases sumptuous living quarters for their employees.

PLEDGE MUTUAL AID

NAIROBI (Reuters) — The leaders of Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda ended Friday two days of talks here in which they restated their desire to strengthen joint public services linking their three countries. A communique said the leaders—President Jomo Kenyatta of Kenya, Julius Nyerere of Tanzania and Uganda Prime Minister Milton Obote—agreed to meet again in Nairobi at the end of this month.

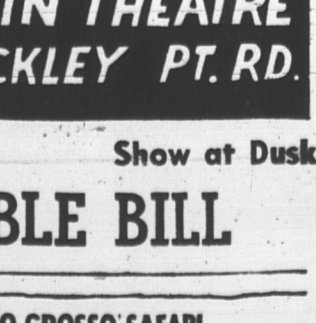
