THE public may expect a good days' sport at Upton Park on Dominion Day. The Park has been put in first-class condition and arrangements are made to bring the "flyers" together on that day.

THE Pietou Masons intend holding a grand Picnic at that place on Dominion Day. A cordial invitation to attend and take part in the amusements of the day has been extended to the Island brethren, and it is probable that a large number will respond.

HIS GRACE, ARCHBISHOP O'BRIEN, arrived here last evening. His Lordship, Bishop MacIntyre, met him at Pietou and returned with him to the Island. His Grace leaves for County Line this evening. He will likely return to Halifax on Saturday next.

One concern had to stop hauling their traps, as all the labor they could muster could not keep the catch clear at the sheds. This concern has packed over \$15,000 worth already, representing 75,000 lobsters killed at one place, while the other six fact-ries, within a radius of five miles, have not killed over 125,000.

WE regret to learn that Master Stanley Newbery son of F. T. Newbery, Esq., met with a serious accident yesterday afternoon. While out riding on the Brighton Road, near the Mount's property, he was thrown over the animal's head to the ground, as a result of

which his collar bone was fractured. The plucky little fellow got on his feet again as soon as possible, and led the horse back to town, notwithstanding the fact that his injuries were exceedingly painful.

A Double Disaster.

A few days ago while three boys named Greeves, Latimer and Birnie were out on a lake near Craigville, Ont., fishing, a heavy gale sprang up and drifted the boat a considerable distance from the shore. Greeves got excited, jumped into the water and was drowned. An alarm was given at the rescue mill, and all the hands rushed to the rescue of the other two boys, which was accomplished at great risk. When the party returned to the shore the mill was discovered to be on fire, and owing to the high winds it was soon destroyed together with a large quantity of lumber and logs. There is no insurance.
