## Model Of U.S. Lunar Spaceship Rocketed Into Orbit From Cape

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—The U.S. Apollo man-to-the-moon test flight program rocketed to an impressive start Thursday when a Saturn I sub-boosted projectile into orbit an unmanned model of the lunar spaceship.

The feat boosted United States space agency confidence that the Apollo program—which is expected to cost more than \$20,000,000 before American astronauts land on the moon. The price tag on Thursday's launch was more than \$20,000,000, including \$17,000,000 for the Saturn I.
