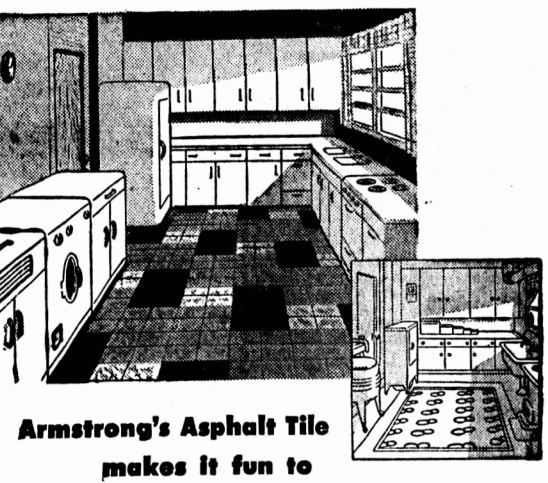

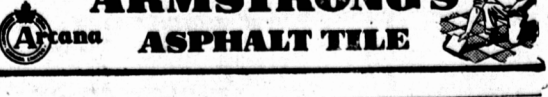

Clementis Purge Scares Red Diplomats; Czech Envoys In U.S., Paris Seen Next

Paris—(NEA)—The purge of Vladimir Clementis, Czechoslovak Foreign Minister, has convinced satellite diplomatic circles that all ambassadors appointed by Clementis, including those in Washington and Paris, soon will be recalled for a similar fate.

Adolf Hofmeister, the Czech ambassador in Paris, already has been asked to return to Prague by the Czech Foreign Minister, Villem Siroky, reliable sources say. But there are strong indications that neither he nor his colleague in

Washington will agree to go back to Czechoslovakia. Hofmeister is reported to have sold his home in Prague last fall in preparation for just such an eventuality. A resident of the U. S. during the war, he was a top-ranking employe of the Office of War Information. Although an orthodox Stalinist, he is accused, like Clementis, of harboring "pro-Western" sympathies.

A similar situation prevails in the Hungarian embassy in Paris, where two veteran Soviet M. V. D. agents, Zoltan Szanto and Maria Kern, have been put in charge. Szanto is a former high official of the Red Trade Union International in Berlin, and is said to be the Communist's representative in Paris. Ousted as ambassador was Count Michael Karolyi, notorious leftist statesman. He disgraced himself with the Kremlin by pleading, in a telegram, for the life of Laslo Rajk, Hungarian Red Leader condemned by the Soviets.

Another satellite diplomat on the Kremlin's purge list is Jerzy Putrament, Polish Ambassador in France. A writer of sorts, Putrament was a figure in Paris literary cafes on the left bank before the war. He is ostensibly accused of "Gomulka tendencies" which is the Polish version of "Titoism."

Putrament has been practically stripped of all power and the real boss of the Polish embassy in France is Zygmunt Muzel, a fanatical Communist and confidante man of Soviet Marshal Rokossovsky, the undisputed ruler of Poland today.

Fear has paralyzed all satellite diplomatic activity in Western

Europe. Several diplomats recently attempted suicide. One found refuge in a mental institution and the Soviet M. V. D. is trying to repatriate him by force. Once a beehive of activity and anti-Western propaganda, the satellite embassies are today half-deserted, mysterious fortresses rigidly guarded by silent men of
