Walking Match

THE twelve hours' walking match, which took place yesterday, between Owen McCloskey and Thomas Wakeland, in the Citizen's Skating Rink, for thirty dollars a side, resulted in a victory for the former—he having beaten the latter by four miles and three laps. At two o'clock the contestants were even, McCloskey shortly commenced to lap his opponent; and, at five o'clock, had four to the good. They then walked as to a funeral march till 8 o'clock, when McCloskey again commenced to spurt; and, when the score was counted at 9 o'clock, it was seen that he had increased his lead to seven laps. Wakeland's attempts to gain a lap were entirely fruitless. At the beginning of the twelfth hour, he lagged greatly, fell back at length, and left the track at 9.32. McCloskey continued to walk lively; and, at the conclusion, was loudly cheered and carried in triumph—by his backers—around the platform. The following is the score:—
