BOSTON (AP) — Official returns have confirmed that Democrat Endicott (Chub) Peabody defeated the Republican incumbent, John A. Volpe, in their Nov. 6 contest for governor of Massachusetts.

The official count gave Peabody 1,051,563 votes. Volpe, Peabody's winning margin was 3,691 votes.

Old Arms Plant Made Library To Aid Science

LONDON (CP) — An old ammunition factory on the Yorkshire moors has been adapted to house the scientific literature of the world for 100 years to come.

Called the National Lending Library for Science and Technology, the building has 20 miles of shelves carrying some 12,000 volumes.

In addition, the library takes in 12,000 current periodicals and has 12 miles of microfilm and microfiche in special trays. The microfilm represents 75 per cent of the world's literature in any other form.

The library lends only to institutions because organizations are easier to carry than individuals. About 800 volumes are lent each day and are expected to reach the borrower within 24 hours. The only cost is the postage—about £3 for 30 loans.

Books in Russian, not only out-of-English-language books in the library and more money has been spent on the translation of Russian scientific literature than on the purchase of other books.

Director D. J. Urrahat said planners were estimated 15,000 scientific volumes will be produced in the world during the next 10 years and the annual output after that will be 500,000.

Drinking Laws Said Licitious

VANCOUVER (CP) — Doug Hume, at 45 the youngest magistrate here, thinks 18-year-olds should be allowed to drink and that laws prohibiting drinking in public are ludicrous.

"When a 18-year-old comes before me on a possession of liquor charge, I impose the most nominal fine possible," he said.

He considers it ridiculous to place any age limit on drinking when it's so widely accepted. But if an age limit must be set, it should be 18.

"It's also somewhat ludicrous to fine a man \$50 for taking a drink in front of a bar. Why should we protect the pure public from seeing who have a drink?" he asked.

Christmas Hopes Berlined In Berlin

BERLIN (AP) — The East German regime has dashed hopes of Berliners on both sides of the wall that there might be family reunions this Christmas.

The official Communist party spokesman said he had brushed off efforts by church leaders to negotiate an agreement to allow passage through the wall for brief visits.

It called the effort a "trans-verse propaganda manoeuvre of the cold war." The paper said the Red regime would only negotiate with the West Berlin church government.

That the West has so far been unwilling to do is being reluctant to accord recognition to the Communist regime.

UNFIT FOR TRIAL

BIRMINGHAM, England (Reuters) — Doctors told the court Thursday that Paul Najran, 19, was unfit to stand trial for robbery because he is in a "state of self-willed psychotic trance."

Najran is accused of stealing a purse worth £2,200 on Oct. 27. Two women made statements to a cell to see Najran, as he lay on a bed with his eyes shut and apparently incapable of speech.

Federal, Provincial Gov'ts Hold Spotlight in Business

Federal and provincial governments held the business spotlight last week.

A reduction in the Bank of Canada's interest rate and the lifting of most surcharges on imports imposed last June in the face of a foreign exchange crisis, were announced in Ottawa last week.

Tuesday, the Bank of Canada reduced its interest rate to four per cent from five—the third reduction since the rate was pegged at six per cent last June.

On Wednesday Finance Minister Nowlan announced removal of a special import duty on almost all food products. He said the action was designed to keep down the cost of living.

The Canadian Tariff Commission's effects mostly food. Basing of the surcharges, coupled with a similar step affecting imported machinery a month ago, still leaves surcharges on about 53.3 per cent of the \$2,000,000 in all annual imports affected by the specific move.

The Canadian Tariff Commission said it welcomed the move but suggested that the government now has reached a stage of recovery that warrants complete removal of the added tariff.

The reduction in the Bank of Canada rate was followed by similar moves by the other chartered banks. All of the banks, with the exception of the Mercantile Bank of Canada, announced reductions of one-quarter of one per cent Friday.

The Mercantile Bank said it is still considering the matter.

HELP FOR AILING HOMES

INADEQUATE WATER Question: Our toilet in a main doesn't fill with enough water for proper flushing. How can the water supply be increased?—Baltimore, Md.

Answer: The height of the metal float (on top of the water) governs the amount of water in the tank. Try adjusting the bending the rod, to which the float is attached, slightly upward to raise its position. This will automatically cause the big float ball to float higher before shutting off the intake valve, thus permitting a higher water level in the tank.

RE-CONDITIONING DINETTE Question: We using our redwood dinette set for several years. The finish now needs re-conditioning. How do I go about changing the color? It goes well with the kitchen. What is the best method to follow? The wood has a kiln-dried surface.—Newark, N.J.

Answer: Wood of redwood surface thoroughly with fine steel wool and turpentine to remove the old finish and grease, etc. Then apply one or two coats of clear, dull white lacquer of the type used on wallpaper (available most paint, hardware and wallpaper stores). When the lacquer has thoroughly dry, apply a thin coat of top quality oil-based buffing wax. DIYING ON RUGS Question: I recently purchased some being used wool rugs. However, I made a mistake by getting them too light as my four grandchildren, including nearby, visit me very often. Answer: There is a concentrated liquid rug dye for use on wool, silk, rayon, etc., manufactured by the makers of a wood-joint expansion material to tighten loose furniture joints. It is available at some housewares dealers. Or a fabric spray, widely available department stores and housewares dealers, could be used; however this cannot be applied to rugs on the floor. Whichever product is used, follow manufacturer's label directions carefully.

ONLY HOT WATER RUSTY Question: Only my hot water is rusty; the cold water is clear. What causes this and how can it be corrected? Answer: The rust might be in the water pipes, or it might be from corrosion in hot water storage tank, or there may be iron in solution in the water. Water in this condition will appear clean until it is heated then it becomes rusty. It should be allowed to settle and then poured through a filter. This will neutralize the chemical iron and reduce the corrosion in the water pipe and a tank. It is available at plumbing supply stores.
