Among the wants of British Columbia are grist mills and wollen mills. It appears that the imports of wollens into that province are between \$200,000 and \$250,000 in value annually, and the imports of flour are large. The Victoria Standard considers the province well adapted for raising sheep, and says all the wool at present raised there is bought at low figures for shipment abroad. The paper urges increased attention to manufacturing industry and the retaining in the province of hundreds of thousands of dollars now sent out of the country for manufactured goods.

The United States revenue collected during the fiscal year 1879-80 amounts to nearly \$124,000,000, and the expenses of collecting it were about \$5,000,000. The expenses of collecting the internal revenues for four years past, amounting to over \$467,000,000, amount to a total, including salaries of collectors, of less than \$20,000,000. The war against illicit distilleries in the Southern districts Mr. Commissioner Raum believes to be ended, except in one part of Georgia. In four years no less than 3874 illicit stills were seized, and 7708 persons arrested, to effect which results 25 government officers were killed and 55 wounded.

Michael Carey, a St. Louis car-driver, was stabbed in the head with a pocket-knife in 1857 and the blade broke off near the handle and remained unnoticed in the wound, which soon healed. Occasionally Carey suffered from neuralgic pains in the head, and about three weeks ago he noticed that when he raised his right arm he would feel a severe pain, which daily increased in intensity. He finally consulted a physician, who upon examination found a sharp-pointed bit of metal protruding through the skin near the collar bone. Carey had forgotten about the stabbing of twenty-three years before, but when a knife-blade about four inches long was removed from his body he recalled the circumstance.

The Brewers' association of the United States represents \$350,000,000 capital, and its members annually pay the government \$11,000,000. Thirty-five million pounds of hops and 35,000,000 bushels of barley were used last year by 2,719 brewers of the United States. The number of breweries in Germany have decreased nearly 3,000 from 1872 to 1879. The total annual German production of beer averages 2,270 gallons for each man, woman and child. The English, last year, consumed 884 gallons per head of population, the Americans (U. S.), 500 gallons, the Russians but 80 gallons. The world's annual production of beer, including 18 countries, is estimated to be 3,000,000 gallons in Europe and 4,000,000 gallons in the United States.

A thriving Beet Sugar factory is at work in Maine, another in Delaware, two in California, one is proposed to be built at Oswego, N. Y., and three are projected in Quebec. The State of Delaware offers \$3,000 in premiums for the best crop of sugar beets for the encouragement of the culture, and in one year the Agricultural Department distributed 4,764 quartz of sugar beet seed. The general interest taken in this subject may be destined to result in a vast benefit to agriculture. It is known that sugar can be profitably made from beets; it is known that beets can be grown; all that seems to be needed, says an exchange, is to bring farmers and manufacturers in practical business relations with each other.

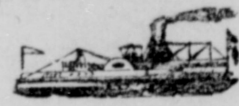
