Summerside's grand old lady, Mrs. Sarah Tamlyn, today celebrates her 100th birthday. She was born in Hope River on November 19th, 1853 and came to Summerside as a child. For some years now she has resided with her daughter, Mrs. D. F. MacNeil, Cedar Street. Her only son, James, who left Summerside some years ago to reside in Western Canada, predeceased her three years ago at North Battleford, Sask.

Mrs. Tamlyn still enjoys a measure of good health and she follows the news daily with the greatest of interest. Her husband died early in their married life and she was left with one daughter aged eight years and a son aged five years.

It is a matter of great pride to her that seven of her grandchildren served their country in the different services during the last war, four of them from the very beginning of hostilities. Another grandson is still a member of Her Majesty's forces.

Four years ago she was able to pay a visit to her birthplace, Hope River. Her remarkable memory is never ending source of wonder to those who know her. About two years ago she received a casual visit from a friend of the family who paid his respects to her on that occasion and when he again visited her home a few days ago she was able, without hesitation, to recognize him from the sound of his voice.

Mrs. Tamlyn is of Irish descent and the piano at Mrs. MacNeil's house is always active on her birthday. On that day she invariably receives a visit from Wilfred Doucette, better known to his many friends as "Tig" who, with his well known musical ability, obliges her with a variety of Irish tunes. When "Tig" is out of town on her birthday, Mrs. Irene Peters, a nearby neighbor does the honors on the piano.

A staunch member of St. Paul's Church, Summerside, she is always at the radio at 5.45 each evening for the Family Rosary. Today is a memorable day in the life of this esteemed lady and she will no doubt be receiving many messages of congratulations from her many friends throughout the Province. Work Progressing On Western Line

"Provided the weather remains good we hope to get into Tignish by the end of the year," Mr. G. H. Milligan, manager of the Maritime Electric Company, said last night. However, Mr. Milligan said the matter was problematical although they are pushing the work in the hope of getting power to the village before the New Year.

He added that after they had completed the line to Tignish they would start down to Bloomfield if weather conditions permit. At present it is hoped to complete the work of extending the poles from Moncton to Tignish within a week as the company workmen have reached a point approximately three miles from the objective. Serious snow storms, however, would complicate matters. It is believed that the required homes, wired will soon be reached. The distance required from Tignish on the main highway to Bloomfield is about two and one-half miles.

Death Tuesday In Summerside Of Mrs. Hubert Howatt
