PM Says He Never Met Financier John Doyle

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson said here he has never met Ottawa financier John Doyle.

The prime minister was asked by reporters to comment on an allegation by Dr. Guy Marcoux that Mr. Doyle, Transport Minister Pickersgill and fraud suspect Moose Darabanc took part in a secret deal between the Liberals and six Social Credit MPs after the 1963 election.

"I've never met Mr. Doyle," Mr. Pearson said after a cabinet meeting.

"I don't know anything about Mr. Doyle's business affairs, his personal affairs or any other affairs."

Mr. Pearson said he didn't know anything about press reports that Mr. Doyle has been assessed more than \$2,244,000 by the revenue department for taxes he allegedly owes for the years 1960, 1962, 1963 and 1964. Mr. Doyle is reported to be con-

testing the assessments before the tax appeal board.

The prime minister declined to comment further on Dr. Marcoux's allegations, beyond saying that Mr. Pickersgill had made a "very strong statement" Sunday.

Mr. Pickersgill denied Sunday that he bribed or attempted to bribe any MP or anyone else to support the minority Liberal government. He told reporters Monday he had nothing further to say.

The minister's press statement made no reference to Mr. Doyle, who has vast iron ore holdings in Newfoundland and a business office and apartment in Ottawa.

Mr. Doyle was convicted last May of illegal stock promotion in Hartford, Conn., and sentenced to three months in jail. He was absent when the sentence was passed and is wanted in the U.S. for jumping bail.

Conservative Leader Diefenbaker and Dr. Marcoux, Social Credit member of the last two Parliaments, have described Mr. Doyle as a personal friend of Liberal Premier Smallwood of Newfoundland and an influential figure in the Liberal party.

Chevrier Talks On Constitution, British Trade

GLASGOW (CP)—Canadian High Commissioner Lionel Chevrier says there is need for adjustment of Canadian constitutional arrangements to inject a new sense of national purpose and unity and to ensure the steady development of prosperity throughout the country.

In a lecture to the Glasgow Junior Chamber of Commerce, Chevrier said that the existing Canadian constitution has served Canada well but it has shown post-war shortcomings. It has caused grievance in Quebec and a sense of frustration among other Canadians concerned over "a governmental system which has frequently appeared cumbersome and ineffective."

"Many Canadians have long complained of being over-governed by federal parliament and 10 provincial legislatures," Chevrier said.

SAYS MOST WANT UNITY

While there has been talk of separatism in Canada and of Canadians wanting to join the United States, the vast majority of Canadians want a strong and united Canada."

Some Countries Have Worry Over Canada-India A-Deal

LONDON (CP)—Allan McKnight, an Australian who directs the policing of civilian atomic operations in some two-dozen countries, says some countries would feel more comfortable if India's nuclear agreement with Canada was brought under the inspection of the International Atom Energy Agency.

McKnight, the agency's inspector-general of safeguards, hastened to add at a press conference Tuesday that he is convinced India is not producing atom bombs. He also noted that in recent months Canada has again emphasized to New Delhi that the Canada-India reactor at Bombay must be used only for peaceful purposes.

"But wouldn't we all feel more comfortable," he asked, "if bilateral agreements were placed under international jurisdiction?"

Later, in an interview, he said Pakistan is one of those countries which feels uncomfortable about the Indian situation. Following the outbreak of Indian-Pakistani hostilities and renewed threat against India by China last month, some Indian members of Parliament demanded that India start producing atom bombs.

McKnight estimated that India produces only about 10 kilograms of plutonium a year and another source estimated that it would take about twice that quantity to make an atom bomb.

A Canadian official said that

under the Indian agreement, Canada has the right to inspect uses made of Canadian uranium fuel but not the Bombay reactor itself if fuel is obtained elsewhere.

AGREE TO INSPECTION

So far, 21 countries have agreed to open their plants to inspection by the International agency which reports to the United Nations Security Council. In addition, Canada, Israel, Sweden and several other countries either have negotiated or are negotiating to turn over a variety of bilateral inspection jobs to the agency.

McKnight said one of these is the Canada-Japan bilateral agreement on peaceful uses of atomic energy. The agency would take over inspection on behalf of Canada and Japan. McKnight said he would welcome a similar move by India to put its activities under agency inspection.

As members of an international secretariat, agency officials "stand ready" to take over inspection jobs but they could not enter the political arena and attempt to persuade governments to turn over these jobs to them.

Nevertheless, said McKnight, the agency, which policed only two reactors in 1961, now controls inspection of 46 reactors, producing about 500 kilograms of plutonium a year. He predicted that by 1970 this plutonium production total would rise to some 2,000 kilograms, increasing at the rate of 500 kilograms a year thereafter.

The agency has 14 inspectors, operating under an annual budget of about \$400,000. McKnight estimated he could police the world's nuclear production by doubling the present staff.

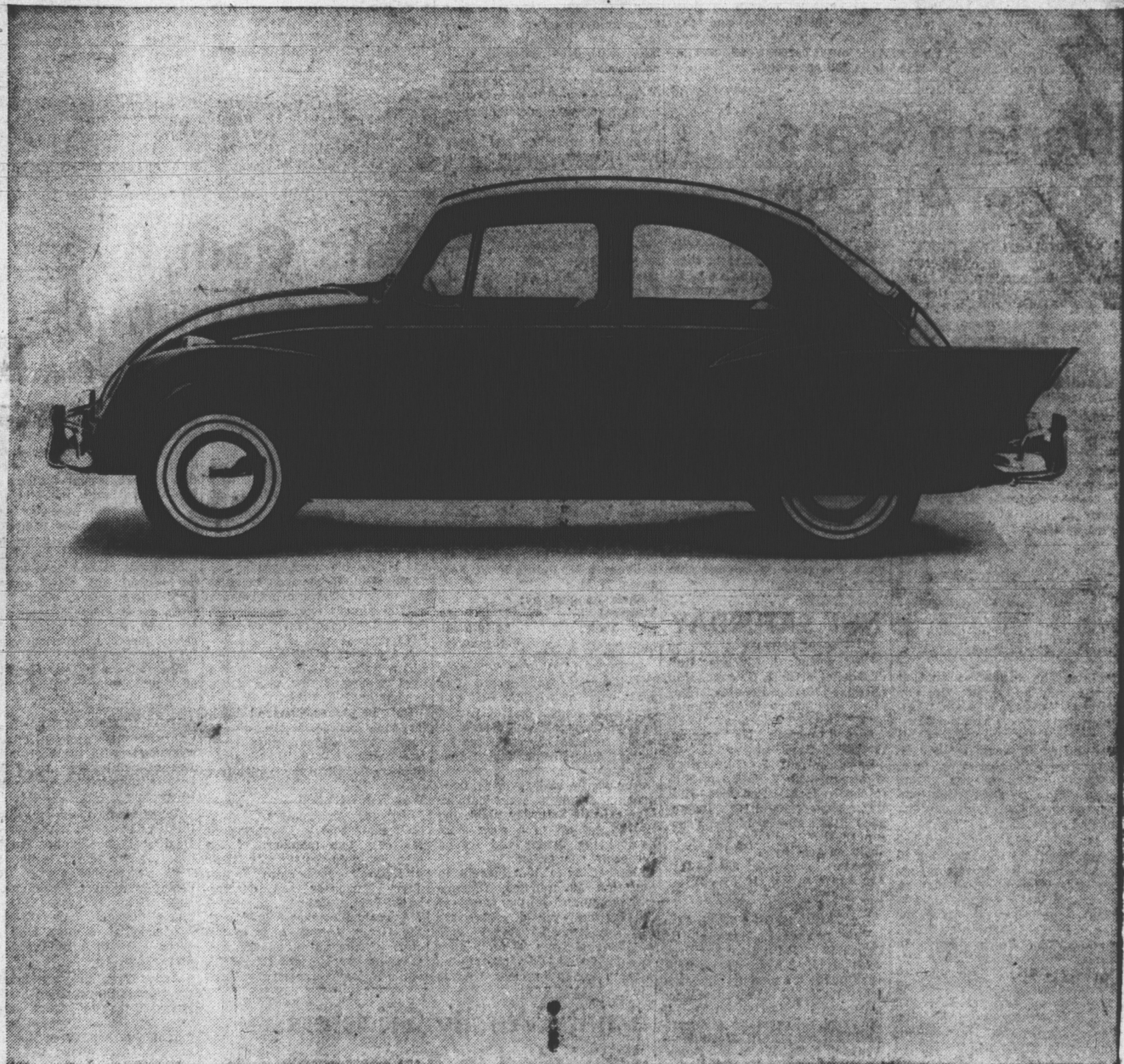
