A NUMBER of employees on the Canadian Pacific Railway, have been on strike for an increase of twenty-five cents per day in their wages.

THE Tea Party at St. Andrew's, yesterday, was, notwithstanding the unpromising weather of the forenoon, largely attended, and a handsome amount realized.

MR. BLUE, of the Nova Scotia Bureau of Statistics, has issued a summary of 500 returns from all parts of the Province on the state of the crops on July 1st. It is very encouraging. If the prospects are realized there will be abundant crops.

THE fishery reports from Newfoundland are, so far, encouraging. From the Southward and Westward accounts are very satisfactory, but from Northward the news of hook-and-line men is unfavorable, but large catches are reported from all parts in traps.

A LARGE and fashionable company assembled last evening in St. Andrew's Church to witness the sittings of Mr. James Dickie and Miss Jardine. The Rev. Dr. Macrae officiated. The happy couple left for P. E. Island by way of Picton, N. S., last night.

A CONVERSATION to promote the children's Reformatory in Charlottetown, will be held at an early day, of which due notice will be given. Friends of the cause are invited to meet at St. James' Hall, Front Street, on Saturday evening, the 22nd July, at half-past seven o'clock.

GOOD PROGRESS has been made in the construction of the Nova Scotia Steel Works at New Glasgow. The manager, Mr. Graham Fraser, is at present in England, visiting the different steel works of the old country, and negotiating for the purchase of the rolls and other machinery.

Good draught horses command really salable and good prices in St. John. Mr. Thomas Damery, of Portland, N. B., and another teamster named Ryan, of St. John, pass d through here on Monday on their way to P. E. Island, for the purpose of purchasing draught horses, which they say can be easily disposed of at from \$150 to \$175.—Moncton Transcript.

THE Promenade Concert and Strawberry Festival in the Drill Shed, yesterday evening, in aid of the Methodist Church, was a grand success. The committee who had the affair in hand deserve great credit for the satisfactory manner in which it was conducted. We learn that the proceeds from all tables were very large.

CREDITABLE—J. D. McLeod, Esq., of this city, owner of the imported stallion "Barister" has placed at the disposal of the Board of Commissioners of the Provincial Exhibition, 1882, the sum of twenty dollars to be awarded in prizes for foals, to be entered at the exhibition, sired by that celebrated horse. This is a step in the right direction. We shall be glad to chronicle similar donations from other gentlemen interested in stock raising or any other important industry.

A DARING highway robbery was yesterday evening, committed on Lower Spring Park Road. A farmer, named Joseph McDonald, of Crapaud, fell in with "two financiers of Jericho Road." He stood tight, exhibited his wealth, and they "stood to him" like brothers. On proceeding out the above named road, they upset him and secured his wallet, containing over \$30. He followed them to ascertain their names; but they fell upon him, maltreated him, and escaped to the Royalty, where they still remain at large.

A SMALL quantity of new potatoes, exhibited at our office yesterday by J. D. Mason, Esq., proves what farmers and gardeners may accomplish in producing early potatoes, if they select the proper seed, and give the crops a little more care and attention. The kind grown by Mr. Mason were imported by him from Canada a few years ago. The earliest is a handsome, well-shaped tuber, and is known as the "Triumph." Besides being early it is prolific, and we are informed, well flavored. The specimens shown were larger than hen eggs. They were planted on the 21st of May, and are now fit for use. To give an idea how prolific the "Triumph" is, Mr. Mason brought the product taken from one vine, which amounted to over 40 potatoes. He also showed us another species of new potatoes, which he is growing this season. It is a white one, called "Hebron's Beauty," and is, he says, very superior for table use. These two varieties are, we believe, suited to this soil, and farmers should, therefore, give attention to them.

TWO YOUNG FIRE FIENDS.—This morning Marshal Flynn detailed a policeman to arrest a young vagrant named Weatherbie, whom he suspected of setting an incendiary fire a few days ago, on the premises of Major Pollard. The officer made the arrest of a boy answering to the description given by the Marshal. The boy denied he was the incendiary, "but he knew the boy that was." He made a humble confession of the acts he helped another boy commit within the past week, saying: "me and Manthorne (another boy about sixteen years of age) met on Monday evening, and set fire to a puncheon of straw in Major Pollard's yard. It was put out before it did much damage." On the following evening Manthorne and Weatherbie got matches from a pretence of lighting a pipe. They proceeded directly to the stable of Rev. Dr. Murray, and barricaded the door, gathered a quantity of straw into a manger, set fire to it, and lit the premises. The stable, with Mr. Weatherbie's workshop was destroyed. They, on the same night, entered the stable of John Doyle, truckman, Upper Queen Street, set fire to a quantity of hay but it fortunately did not burn. In court, this morning, they made an open confession of the above facts—one laying the blame on the other. The magistrate ordered that they be imprisoned for six months, and that the eldest Manthorne—shall appear before the Grand Jury at its next session.
