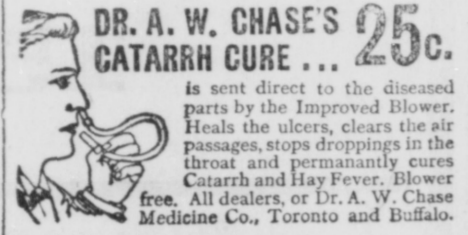

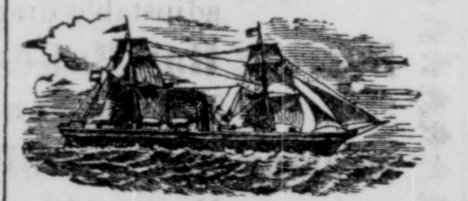

South Africa and the East.

CHINESE REBELLIONS.

China is the home of secret rebellious societies; but it has remained for the Boxers to bring the great indolent, half asleep celestial empire to the verge of disintegration. This crisis in the Orient, dreaded and avoided by Europe, for half a century, seems to have come at last. As long as England, Russia, France and Germany could adjust their own quarrels over the partition of China by diplomatic makeshifts the "Eastern question" slumbered. But at a moment when the powers interested in China seem to have been resting in self-satisfied complacency, the Boxers suddenly spring into activity, declare their purpose to sweep the foreigners into the sea, start a reign of terror, compel the powers to land a handful of sailors and marines—and the crisis is on.

What or who are the Boxers? Who organized them? Who is their leader? What is their mission? These are questions asked all around the globe. The Boxers is the youngest of the great family of secret revolutionary societies that have menaced European enterprise in the last quarter of a century. It was organized in the Province of Shan Tung to oppose German aggression. The society grew rapidly in numbers and its influence spread until today the great and densely populated provinces of Shan Tung, Honan and Pechili are completely under its control. Not only are the provinces in northern China practically under the control and at the mercy of the Boxers, but the society is rapidly spreading southward. It has already crossed the Yangtsekiang River, and outrages in the southern provinces, where French interest now predominate, may be heard from any day. But it is in the Province of Pechili or Chili, as it is frequently written, the greatest danger exists, for in this province is located Peking, the capital and centre of Chinese administration. The membership of the Boxers society is made up of coolies, river men, idlers, pirates, bandits and criminals of all classes. But their leaders, although unknown to the European authorities in the Far East, are unquestionably men of ability and shrewdness. The Boxers may be considered as simply a part and parcel of the revolutionary propaganda in China. The society differs little from other societies known at different times as the 'Society of Heaven,' the 'Heaven and Earth Society,' the 'Triads,' the 'Black Flags,' the 'Teente Brotherhood,' the 'Tea Society,' the 'Water Lilies,' the 'Floods of the Vegetarians.' These societies and others, with different names but similar purposes, have waged constant war against the foreigners. They resent the presence of Christian missions and commercial enterprises alike. To them the engineer who surveys a railway, the physician who comes to end an epidemic and the missionary are equally the objects of aversion, and the secret society will murder the one as cheerfully as the other.

A CHRONOLOGICAL REVIEW.

Some of the more notable instances of rebellion and riot instigated by the "Boxers" and similar societies in the last few years may be briefly summarized as follows:

February 4, 1889—Riots at Chin Kiang; British Consulate and foreigners' houses burned.

September 9, 1889—Insurrection in the province of Fukien.

December, 1889—Insurrection in the Amoor district of Manchuria; rebels seize town of Ian Pei Tuan and defeat the imperial troops.

December 1890—Massacre of native Christians, at Jong Tuy Tsin and other places.

May 12, 1891—Anti-European riots at Wuhu; much destruction to property; British Consulate wrecked, the Consul and his wife barely escaping with their lives.

June, 1891—Increased popular and anti-foreign agitation throughout China. The secret societies become so bold that the foreign legations unite in a threat to bring in troops unless order is restored.

June 9, 1891—French church and orphanage burned at Woosieh.

September 11, 1891—American mission at Ichang destroyed.

November, 1891—Insurrection in Mongolia and Northern China against foreigners; Mucan societies published a decree against foreigners at Shanghai.

April 27, 1892—Renewed outrages on foreign missionaries.

September 15, 1894—Murderous outrages on missionaries; murder of the Rev. Jas. Wylie at Liao Yang.

Aug. 1, 1894—Massacre of British

missionaries, the Rev. R. W. Steward, eight women and two children, at Whasang, near Ku Cheng, by the Vegetarians.

August 7, 1894—British and American missions and hospitals destroyed at Fatshan.

May 28, 1895—Foreign mission houses at Chengtu and Schechuan burned.

From 1895 until 1899 the outrages on foreign missions, schools and hospitals were of almost monthly occurrence. Between those dates, however, foreign aggression on Chinese territory became more marked. Russia, Germany, France and England acquired large areas of territory, either by lease or by force, and began fortifications, railroads, factories, etc. This foreign aggression only intensified the popular discontent among the Chinese masses, and the secret societies flourished as they never had before.

In the closing months of 1898 a rebellion in the interior provinces was secretly fomented, and early in January, 1899, the Anhui and Honan rebels, to the number of 10,000, took to the field. They first captured the city of Ku-yung, where they committed the horrible atrocities. City after city in Kwang Tung and Kwangsi provinces fell into the hands of the rebels. Imperial troops were sent against them and in February the rebels were defeated in a battle near Chango, in Hupeh province. In February, 1899, also occurred an incident that added fuel to the flames of discontent. A riot, started at Ta-lien, Wan within the Russian sphere of influence, led to a conflict between the Chinese natives and the Czar's troops. As a result of a brief and entirely one-sided conflict, 300 Chinese were killed. As far as reported not a single Russian soldier was killed or wounded. This trouble arose from the efforts to collect taxes levied on the Chinese by the Russians, and served to inflame the natives against all foreigners more than ever.

In June, 1896, the Chinese of Shan Tung province undertook to resist the encroachments of the Germans. A large body of Chinese peasants attacked the men engaged in the construction of a railroad from Kiao Chou to the interior. The German troops at Kiao Chou marched against the natives, and, after killing nine of them, destroyed their villages, to "teach them a lesson." During the year 1899 the demands of the French Government for more territory (which by the way, was secured,) led China and France almost to the verge of war. The dispute was finally settled on terms most humiliating to China. The Chinese do not want the foreigner for a neighbour. They do not want the newer civilization. They care not for railroads, commerce or religion. They want to be left alone.
