High Cost of Pugilism Has Mounted Steadily

Jack Dempsey Will Get \$300,000 Win or Lose, When He Fights Georges Carpentier

Whether the bout lasts one minute or fifteen rounds Jack Dempsey will be richer by \$300,000 from his fight with Georges Carpentier, while the French boxer will receive \$200,000 for his share in the battle. This is talking in big figures and would certainly make strange reading for those great fighters who many years ago used to match, fight and finish an argument within the twenty-four hours. In the old days the question of "purse" did not enter into an argument; they fought for honor, and it was not necessary to build a special arena capable of seating sufficient people to enable the promoters to pay the enormous demands made by the fighters. In the early days the combatants would meet and make arrangements for a bout and would then proceed with their many friends to the country, where ropes would be placed around to form a ring. It was not necessary to pay \$20 for a ringside seat, but you took your chance. Often the fight would have to be moved several times before the men could get down to business, because fighting was against the law in those days, and police would often come on the scene and try to stop the fight. The fighters usually selected a piece of land situated on the borders of two English counties, and on the police of one county appearing the ring would be transferred to the other county.

How different are conditions today. Here, for instance, is a partial list of famous purses, and they appear to be growing by leaps and bounds.

More Trouble In Baseball Circles

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 31.—The possibility that the International and the American Association may withdraw from the National Association of professional baseball leagues of the country, and enter the new national agreement as a separate and distinct body, is indicated in correspondence between President Hickey, of the American Association, and Jack Dunn, president of the Baltimore club of the Internationals.

Judge Landis, baseball high commissioner, is quoted as saying he saw no reason why the two leagues should not enter the agreement to be adopted at Chicago next month as a class by themselves along the same lines as the National and American Leagues.

The chief cause of the dissatisfaction of the two big minors is the ruling of the National Association that is given five per cent. of the gross receipts of all post-season series.

President Hickey, in a recent letter to Dunn, protested against this ruling and declared he would withdraw from the National body rather than submit to it.

Manager Dunn, who agrees with Hickey in his stand, has asked President Toole, of the Internationals, to have a mail vote of the other club owners of the league taken on the situation, but this far has not heard from Mr. Toole.

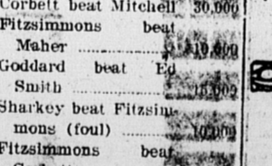

Peculiar Situation

Exists in Boxing—Some Champions Unwilling to Defend Their Titles

The New York Sun and Herald says:—"We are in the midst of an era in boxing the like of which we may never see again. We find some champions unwilling to defend their titles, and others only too anxious to get into a lucrative titular contest, and as a result of the general situation, a striking lack of championship boxing. We find Benny Leonard, practically a challenger, Willie Jackson and Lew Tendler, who are in the head of the light-weight division, and who would have been Leonard's biggest financial opportunities. Leonard has been offered the sum of \$30,000 to meet Leonard, but still he balks. The reason is that a fifteen-round bout with Leonard would mean only one thing for Jackson—a \$25,000 to fight Leonard, and he, too, refuses, for a reason similar to that which actuates Jackson. What a situation! Outclassed light weights declining small fortunes to box the champion.

Johnny Wilson, the new middle-weight title-holder, is another of our champions who hasn't enough confidence in his own ability to take on a formidable opponent—Mike O'Dowd, for one—in a fifteen round fight to decision. Wilson has proved a huge disappointment. "The remedy for this situation of inflated purses and poor action among the title-holders lies in a pact among the state and city commissions—above all, in the abolition of the decisionless bout."
