Man on a Tightrope

—The best picture of 1964 to date is "Man on a Tightrope," the timely and telling Twentieth-Century-Fox thriller at the Capitol Theatre, Summerside. Not only audiences today, but film fans for years to come are likely to point to it as one of the authentic masterpieces of its period. For the balance of the screen year, this is the one to beat.

Director Elia Kazan's particular brand of screen realism has not been better served than it is put to work describing the flight of a small but plucky European circus troupe from the confining orbit of iron curtain rule to the freedom of Western Germany. Robert E. Sherwood's script is a gem of brilliant writing and Robert L. Jacks' production guidance excels at every turn in its on-the-spot filming within the actual mid-European locations depicted.

As the topical drama unfolds, it has the effect of a spellbinder on audiences. The drama accompanying the escape—and the pursuit—adds a new height and dimension to the long-honored screen device of the "chase," with tension ever-mounting. The story, with its strong underlining of anti-communist comment, is enhanced by its being set within the always colorful and intriguing setting of circus life. And to this background, past-master Director Kazan has imparted all his skill for realistic and exotic detail, for the flavor, feeling and mood of all the variants of carnival life: the symbolic wirewalker of the title; the lion-tamers, the freaks, the dwarfs, the clowns.
