Retarded School Children Present Christmas Story

O'LEARY — The potential of a child who happens to be retarded is still unknown, and those who are closely associated with such children are being surprised again and again by what can be accomplished with patience, love and perseverance. EVIDENCE

Moving evidence of this was seen in O'Leary Regional High School auditorium Thursday evening, when the children of the day training class, under the direction of their teacher, Mrs. Arnold Boates, presented a Christmas program of outstanding merit. It is believed to be the first time retarded children in this province have appeared on stage before a public gathering. More than one hundred people were present on this occasion.

Perhaps the highlight was a pantomime of the Christmas Story, portrayed with reverence and dignity. The Biblical narrative was read by Rev. Clarence Filby and Rev. Elroy McKillop and soloist, Mrs. John Greer; sang "Away In A Manger"; "While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks," "O Holy Night" and "We Three Kings of Orient Are."

The remainder of the program included vocal duets and solos, recitations, rhythmic band selections, square dancing and step dancing. Pianist for the evening was Mrs. James MacWilliams. CHAIRMAN

Intensive NATO Study Is Planned

PARIS (CP)—North Atlantic ministers, completing their Paris deliberations Friday, agreed to launch an intensive study of how NATO should be shaped to meet future needs, especially in the light of warmer relations with Russia and Eastern Europe.

They placed so much emphasis on improving East-West relations that External Affairs Minister Paul Martin later observed that more importance had been placed on the detente than at any other meeting he had attended.

He was particularly enthusiastic that the ministers agreed to keep progress on an East-West nuclear non-proliferation agreement under review and "to seek agreement on satisfactory arms control measures which might contribute to the improvement of European security and the relaxation of tension."

Of specific Canadian interest, on a point which Martin has been pushing, was the ministers' formal expression of hope "to bring about conditions which could permit a gradual

Car Damaged In Collision With Steer

SUMMERSIDE — A Holden steer was struck by a car near the village of Wellington, Friday morning, and it was injured so bad that it had to be destroyed.

RCMP from Summerside, who investigated the accident, said that a car, driven by Peter Wilfred LeClair, of Ellerslie, struck the steer, and caused about \$250 damage to the Valiant automobile as well as severely injuring the steer.

The accident occurred 16 miles west of Summerside on the western Road, about a quarter-mile from Wellington church.

Another accident Friday afternoon at 2:45 caused \$400 damage to a 1965 Chevrolet half-ton truck, driven by George Yeo of Kensington. The vehicle was in collision with a tractor trailer, operated by Arthur Arsenault, of Charlottetown. Approximately \$50 damage was caused to the tractor trailer.

The accident happened at Wellington, on highway No. 1-A, about 1-4 mile from Summerside.

RCMP also investigated. The only accident in town yesterday, was a bumper to bumper collision on Water Street, caused by slippery conditions, and resulting in minor damage. Town police are investigating.

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
