RUSSIA'S IMPERIAL FAMILY.

The means of the Russian imperial family are of the richest in the world. Apart altogether from the civil list, which usually amounts to \$1,500,000 a year, but which may, of course, be increased by imperial order, the house of Romanoff owns 21,600,000 acres in different parts of Russia, which under a system laid down in the reign of the Emperor Paul, are managed by a special bureau, called that of the Imperial Appanages, which is controlled by a minister, who reports to the emperor alone, and takes no orders from the ministry of finance. The ministry of Appanages now receives a revenue of more than £2,000,000, out of which forty-six grand dukes and duchesses are supported, at an average cost in all of £500,000, or say £11,000 a year per prince or princess. The remaining one million is suffered to accumulate, in order to meet the constantly increasing number of members of the imperial family, who are by no means always satisfied with their donations. The sums, though large, are not derived from taxation, and are probably less than those employed by the Hapsburgs, who are, as a corporation, immense landowners, not to mention the great fortunes of two or three branches of the family, or than those of the house of Othman. The revenue of the Hohenzollerns exceeds £1,600,000, and that of the house of Savoy is more than £600,000 a year, the British house being, among the greater sovereign houses, by far the poorest. Fifty years hence the question of appanages will be a serious embarrassment to the dynasties and will probably lead to a great relaxation of the royal marriage laws. Then the American heirs, who by that time will possess half South America, will indeed have a chance.—The Spectator.

Young people looking for a new entertainment will enjoy Lucia M. Robbins' description of "A Butterfly Party." Mrs. Wetherpoon's August treatise includes mention of some of the novel uses now made of precious stones. Mr. Vick's flower garden is supplemented by practical answers to various inquiries, the books of the month are noticed, and the usual pages are devoted to needle-work.
