

PWC Retains City Title

Prince of Wales College, had to come from behind three times, Saturday afternoon to defeat a surprising Queen Charlotte High School curling team 11-10 in the most exciting game seen so far in the City schoolboy playoffs.

Prince of Wales came into the final match strong favorites to keep the City title which they captured last year, and the victory ensured them of representing Charlottetown in the Island Schoolboy Championships which will be staged this week at the local club.

The High School quartette, fresh from a resounding victory over a team from Birchwood High in the morning, kept right on rolling in the final contest, picking up a single point in the first end and adding another in the second to go ahead 2-0.

The Welshmen jumped into the lead for the first time with a big five ender in the third, but the Q.C.H.S. lads, led by skip Roger Goss and mate Barry White got one back in the fourth and battled back for three more in the fifth to take the lead once more.

The exciting battle see-sawed once more, as Alan Smith and his college crew took over with three in the sixth to jump into a slim two point lead, eight points to six.

But the Goss-led youngsters proved they could curl with the best of them by posting a startling four, in the seventh which gave them a two-point lead.

P.W.C. closed the gap by picking up one in the eighth and tied the game with a single in the ninth.

In the crucial tenth end, skip Goss had last rock, but the Welshmen got one stone in early and set up a lot of guards, that he just couldn't get through.

Bowfield To Receive Bosox Rookie Award

PENTICTON, B.C. (CP)—Ted Bowfield, 24-year-old Penticton native son, left Saturday for Boston to receive the rookie-of-the-year award of Boston Red Sox of the American League. The award, presented annually by the Baseball Writers Association of America, goes to the most promising newcomer to the Red Sox lineup.

It is the first time in the 20-year history of the award that a Canadian has won the honor.

Bowfield, a 190-pound south-paw pitcher, joined the Red Sox in July of last year and established a 4-3 record, three of his victories being posted against the world-champion New York Yankees.

He started the 1958 season with 22 Innings of the American Association.

Bowfield played baseball with the Penticton Red Sox while attending high school and was signed to a professional contract with Boston in 1954.

Preakness Is World's Richest Money Race

BALTIMORE (AP)—The purse for the Preakness Stakes, which amounted to a whopping \$1,000 when it was first run back in 1873, has been raised to \$150,000, making it the richest added-money race in the world.

The Maryland Jockey Club has put up \$100,000 to sweeten the pot since 1946, when Churchill Downs first raised the Kentucky Derby to six figures. The sponsors of the Preakness and the Belmont stakes quickly followed suit.

Officials of the Maryland Jockey Club, operators of Pimlico Track where the second feature in American racing is big three is run, expect nominating, entry and starting fees to swell the pot to about \$180,000.

This would mean about \$127,000 to the winner. A total of \$30,000 would go to the second colt, \$15,000 for third and \$7,500 for fourth.

The Preakness, with the Kentucky Derby and the Belmont Stakes, is for three-year-olds only. Nominations for the 83rd running on May 16 close Feb. 16.

Pierce Takes Salary Cut

CHICAGO (AP)—Pitcher Billy Pierce accepted a salary cut estimated at \$2,500 in agreeing to Chicago White Sox terms for 1959 Saturday. It is believed the new contract calls for \$35,000 to \$37,500.

Pierce had a 17-11 record last season after winning 20 games in each of the two previous years.

Is Sensational In Indoor Debut

WASHINGTON (AP)—Bobby Morrow ran indoors for the first time, made his debut, a smashing success by sweeping the 70, 80 and 100-yard sprints in the Evening Star track games Saturday night.

Morrow, the 1956 United States Olympic sprint king from Abilene, Tex., Christian College, had to pour on all his speed to overtake Bob Brown of Penn State in the 100 and complete his triple triumph.

The 23-year-old Texan, who had said before the dash series that he didn't like running on boards, was clocked in 9.8 for the 100. He won the 80 in 8.1, with Brown second, and the 70 in 7.2 with Ken Kave, former Morzan star, on his heels.
