Another case against Captain Hughes, that of keeping liquor for sale, comes up for trial this afternoon.

MARRIAGE BELLS.—Flags are flying on the steamship Coban to-day in honor of the marriage of Mr. W. H. Clarke, second engineer of that steamer, and Miss Janie Anderson, of Charlottetown. The nuptial ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Corey. The bride is a very popular member of the Baptist Church choir, and they presented her with a beautiful antique oak rocker.

GIVES PICTON A HARD NAME.—F. LaRoche, special officer of the Quebec provincial treasury department, has returned to the Maritime Provinces. Picton, he said to a reporter, was the dirtiest place he had ever been in. There were no sidewalks, but there were six churches; and, although supposed to be a temperance town, no licenses were granted, yet he noticed more drunkenness in twenty-four hours than he did in Quebec in a month. The best points of the town were its churches and hotels.

The steamer Pastnet, Capt. Churchill, left on return to Halifax on Saturday afternoon with the usual general cargo and several passengers, including Captain John Hughes, the Messrs Steele and Miss Curran.

The Elliott left for Picton last evening to go on the slip for coppering, before proceeding to Bonifield, Nicaragua, between which port and Savannah she will engage in the fruit trade.

NEWS NOTES.

Serious floods are reported in and around Lucknow in India.

Hippolyte, the Haytian President, is suffering from heart disease.

British capitalists are said to be ready with the money to complete the Chicago Ship Canal if Canada will extend the time for two years from last July.

Lieut. Governor Schultz lately returned from Keewatin says that he found a great deal of sickness among the Indians this year, and they may need relief during the winter.

Ladas has been beaten in another race and has lost his backers a lot of money. It looks as if Lord Rosebery had delayed the general elections too long to get any political good out of his victory in the Derby. The gamblers' favor does not hold in face of hard luck.

The Minister of Education for England and Wales, in a statement which he made recently in the Imperial House of Commons, showed that no fewer than 4,250,000 children are receiving free education in those countries under the act of 1891, while 800,000 continue to pay fees, of which number, however, 500,000 do not pay more than one penny per week. The annual grant asked for by the Minister was the enormous sum of £5,500,000, or about \$22,000,000, over last year. He stated also that the average attendance had increased by 2 per cent. during the year, standing now at 78 per cent.

The Siberian railway which the Russian Government is now constructing from St. Petersburg to Vladivostok, on the Sea of Japan, is one of the greatest enterprises of the age. There is a belief that the political and social effects which will follow its construction will be of considerable moment. Its effect on the Russian Government itself will be likely to be revolutionary. The great industrial development that will follow must be reflected in changes in the social and political fabric of Russia, which stands sadly in need of the civilizing influences this vast enterprise will bring. In opening up vast regions for settlement and as fields for commercial and manufacturing enterprise, it seems not improbable that the world's currents of migration will be turned in new directions.

There is a London cable despatch in the Toronto Telegram in which the statement is made that merchants throughout England "are still complaining of the large proportion of under-paid letters from Canada." The last mail reaching London is reported to have brought many overweight letters. Canadian letters to Great Britain have to pay full postage on many letters which they receive from their friends at home. Probably, as the rate allowed for a single rate letter passing in Canada or from Canada to the United States is one ounce, the impression prevails that the single rate to Great Britain is also allowed on one ounce. If so, this is a mistake. All English letters weighing over half an ounce must pay double postage, and the single rate to England is five cents, against three to the United States, Newfoundland and all parts of Canada.

A telegram has been received at the Japanese legation, Washington, to the effect that a treaty was negotiated between Korea and Japan which authoritatively defines the relations toward each other and toward China. The treaty was signed at Seoul, on the 26th August. Article I defines the object of the alliance to be the strengthening and perpetuation of the independence of Korea as an autonomous state and the promotion of the mutual interests of Korea and Japan by compelling China's forces to withdraw from Korea, and obliging China to abandon her claim of right to dominate the affairs of Korea. Article 2 binds the Japanese government of Japan to carry on warlike operations against China, both offensive and defensive. The Korean government is bound by the article to afford the Japanese forces every possible facility in movements and furnish them with supplies. Article 3, provides that the treaty shall terminate as soon as a treaty of peace is concluded by Japan and China.
