## Average Egg Price Is Good

OTTAWA — The national average price to producers for Grade A Large eggs amounted to 42.4 cents per dozen for the 1965-66 support year ended September 30, the federal Agricultural Stabilization Board announced recently.

There will be no deficiency payment made under the 1965-66 program which provided a floor price of 34 cents per dozen for the first 4,000 dozen and 31 cents for each of the next 6,000 dozen eggs.

The 42.4 cents per dozen average price is the highest since the support program for eggs was introduced in 1960.

The high prices prevailing during the period are attributed to a downturn in production and to a natural increase in demand for eggs resulting from population growth.

Egg marketers at registered grading stations amounted to 225 million dozen compared with 237 million in the 1964-65 period. The decline is the result of fewer pullet chick placements in laying flocks during the first six months of 1965 when egg prices were unusually low.
