## Predicts Big Increase In Student Enrollment

HALIFAX (CP) — Rev. H. J. Somers, president of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N. S. said Tuesday there would be a 50 per cent enrollment increase in universities in the Atlantic provinces in the next 10 years.

Dr. Somers, in a report presented at the annual meeting of the central advisory committee on education in the Atlantic provinces, said this estimated increase was based on studies made by the public committee of the National Conference of Canadian Universities.

A committee was formed to bring the work and problems of universities to the people of the Atlantic provinces.

Dr. Somers was appointed chairman with president C. MacKay of the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton; Dr. G. A. Hickman of Memorial University, St. John's, Nfld.; Frank Mackinnon of Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown; dean George Wilson of Dalhousie University and Rev. L. LePlante, president of St. Anne's College, Church Point, N. S., as members.

## Report Decline In Smuggling Cigarettes

OTTAWA (CP) — Smuggling of United States cigarettes has declined, the R.C.M.P. reported today. It credited a tax cut for making profits less attractive to the large-scale smuggler.

The R.C.M.P.'s annual report released today said that 40,998 cartons of cigarettes were seized under the customs laws during the 1953-54 fiscal year. The total compared with 115,415 cartons in 1952-53 and 67,570 the previous year.

It referred to the tax cut on cigarettes in the spring of 1953, coupled with a price drop, and said the price spread between Canadian and U.S. cigarettes was reduced "to a point where profits to be realized are no longer attractive to the large-scale smuggler."

Cigarettes remained the main commodity in smugglers' smuggling, however. Other smuggling ventures during the year involved costume jewelry, nylon stockings, sport shirts, old used cars, watches and margarine.

The number of sm. stills seized in 1953-54 was 34 per cent higher than the previous year. Six commercial or semi-commercial stills were seized in Quebec, and six in Manitoba. "Seizures in these two provinces accounted for 49 per cent of the

## NEW METHOD OF LOCATING HUMAN CANCERS MAKES DETECTION EASY

By ALTON L. BLAKESLEE ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP) — Human cancers can be made to shine with a bright red warning light for easy detection, a medical team announced today.

This may mark a great step in the fight against cancer. It could lead to a pretty sure way of telling whether a person has cancer, whether it has spread to his body, where all the cancer is located. It might also create a new way of carrying radioactive atoms to cancers to destroy them.

A chemical obtained from human blood is injected into a person's veins. This chemical, prophyrin, seeks out cancer tissue and lodges there.

Then, when body tissues are examined under ultra-violet or invisible "black light," the prophyrin shines with a red light of danger as bright as a woman's lipstick.

## SHOWS EXACT EXTENT

So far this method has outlined entire cancers in a few human bodies, telling surgeons that extent of the cancer for complete removal, Drs. D. S. Rasmussen-Kinnon, Dr. E. Ward and Frank H. J. Pigge of Baltimore told the American College of Surgeons.

One woman with breast cancer had the prophyrin injections. When a spotlight of ultra-violet light was beamed at her breast, the red light in her cancer shone through her skin. In others, the ultra-violet spotlight in a darkened operating room delineated or outlined the cancerous areas of the body after surgeons had made their incisions.

Hidden cancers in the stomach, bladder or elsewhere could be sought by instruments equipped with ultra-violet "eyes."

"There is hope that the prophyrin can be combined with iodine so that it will show up under x-rays."

## Anglicans Stress Need For Men For Mission Fields

By STEWART ANDERSON TORONTO (CP) — Rev. Canon A. H. Davis of Toronto, field secretary of the missionary society of the Church of England in Canada, said Tuesday the chief need of the society is for hard working, venturesome and self-sacrificing young men for the mission field.

Canon Davis spoke at a joint meeting of the society and the executive council of the church's general synod.

"We are not keeping pace with development in the northern part of the missionary dioceses," said Canon Davis. There was also need for "aggressive evangelism."

He added: "We have to bow our heads in shame when pointing out some of the 'little Anglican churches' which need money spent on them. In one diocese, 50 per cent of the missionary houses lack modern facilities."

The meeting decided to raise the minimum stipend of clergymen serving in mission fields \$400 during the next two years.

The \$1,800 single and \$2,000 married stipend will be raised to \$2,000 and \$2,200 next year and in 1956 to \$2,200 and \$2,400.

Decision to raise stipends followed a recommendation by the executive committee of the general synod's executive council.

The increase means an additional \$35,000 must be raised next year. Missionary diocese clergymen also will receive an eight-cent-a-mile car allowance starting next year, half to be paid by the society and half by the diocese.

The society's share now is one-fifth. Rt. Rev. N. R. Clarke, suffragan bishop of Moosonee, and Most Rev. Philip Carrington archbishop of Quebec, said Indians are not being treated as equals in the church.

"We'll save their souls but we won't live with them," said Bishop Clarke.

Archbishop Carrington said there should have been an Indian bishop, Indian clergy and laity at the meeting.

### VIOLATES ACT

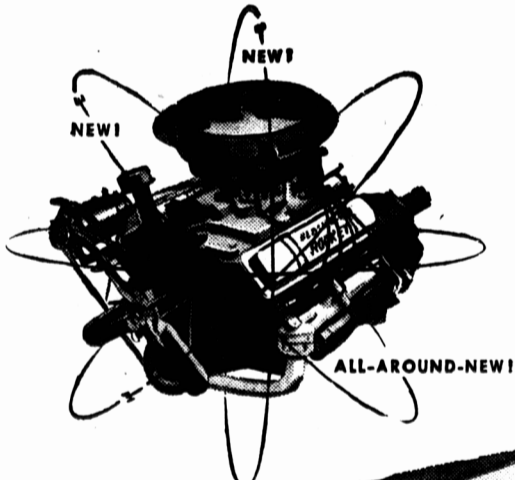

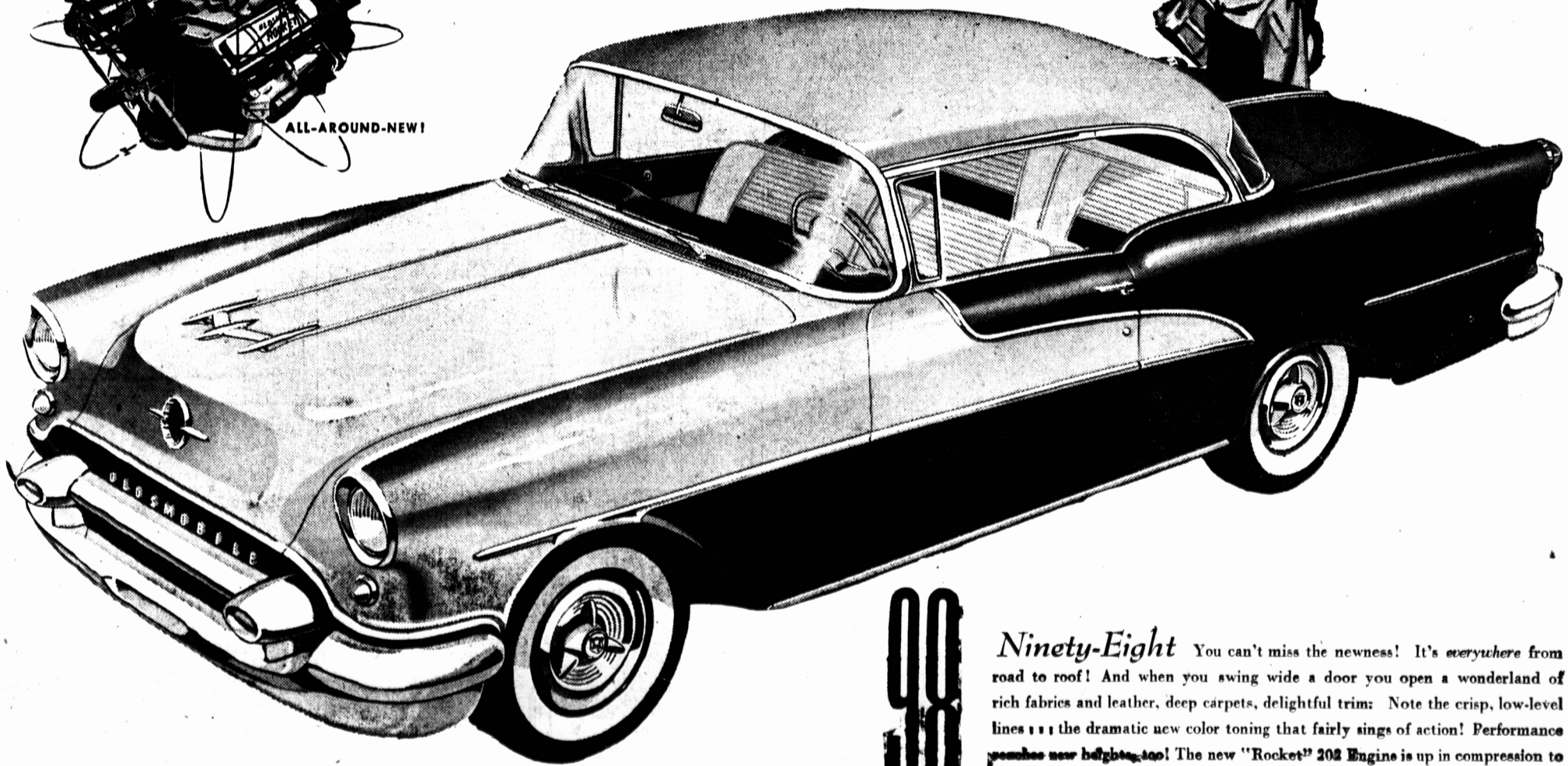
