Kennedy Is Hopeful Est Ban Negotiations Will Be Fruitful

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy said Wednesday that after three days of nuclear tests in the Web of Life, "we are still hopeful" that the United States, Britain and Russia will agree on a limited test ban.

He held a press conference the day after proceeding "in a business-like way."

Any agreement will be sent to the Senate for advice and consent, he said.

Kennedy said no other matters are under negotiation at the Moscow talks.

The negotiations are successful they should lead to wider discussions among other nations, he said.

If the talks are successful "it will be important to reach the widest possible agreement on nuclear testing throughout the world," he said.

Kennedy said the task of the negotiators should be to make the agreement as simple as possible and indicated he would not comment further on the test ban.

DEFICIT DOWN
After reading a brief former statement on the Moscow talks, Kennedy turned to the U.S. fiscal position with a statement saying, the budget deficit for the government year just closed was \$6,200,000,000 or \$2,600,000,000 less than his estimate in January.

He said there was a cash deficit of \$4,100,000,000, also less than predicted.

Budget requests have been reduced by \$200,000,000, he said, with nearly all executive departments scaling down.

Hundreds of millions of dollars from the federal budget by using private instead of public funds also are going up, he said.

But he said the most urgent economic business before the United States is the tax cut he has recommended. He said it is needed to wipe out "excessive unemployment" and stimulate economic growth. It is also the primary means, he said, to balance the budget and cure the balance-of-payments problem.

The president said the tax bill and his civil rights bill are the two most important and complex pieces of legislation.

That the House of Representatives ways and means committee has been conducting the tax bill for six months.

He said what he is interested in is that the bill be enacted before the end of the year.

HOPE NOT ABANDONED
Kennedy next said the committee rather than the House crisis has not given up hope of an agreement before next Monday.

He said it will be better for both parties if they come to an agreement rather than forcing the issue to be handled by Congress. Nobody, he said, should tell what might come out of Congress in such a case.

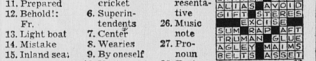

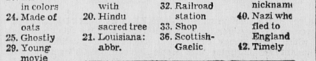

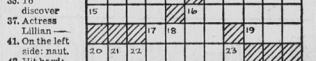

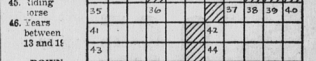

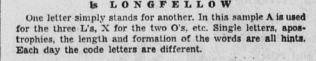

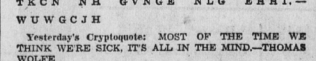

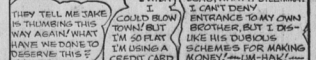
