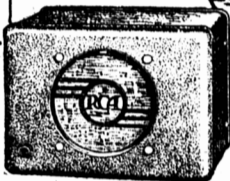

Claims Pension Appeal Court Never Influenced

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, May 20.—The Pension Appeal Court has never been influenced in its decision by considerations of the amount of money involved in pension claims, Justice A. D. Hyndman, president of that court, told the Commons committee on ex-service men's affairs here today. Naturally, however, if a claim involved several thousand dollars, the court would exercise great care to ensure that all the facts had been elicited, he added. "Another point that has been raised is whether we are influenced by the Minister (Hon. C. G. Power) or the department," said Judge Hyndman. "I can say that not a single member of the past or present government has ever said one thing to influence the court either one way or another. We have been left entirely to ourselves to decide cases on our own responsibility." The witness emphasized that where a medical adviser summoned by the court to give his opinion on a case had been favorable to the applicant the court had always accepted that opinion. "We have never gone against the advice of the medical adviser even if it was a flimsy-looking claim," Judge Hyndman said. Citing figures, Judge Hyndman showed that of the 280,000 surviving ex-service men who had served in the Canadian Expeditionary Force and had served in a theatre of actual war only about 80,000 received pensions. He thought the court should continue to be manned by men of legal training since practically all of the questions that came before it were questions of fact. There was no difficulty with medical questions.

Has Plan To Aid Coal Industry

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) EDMONTON, May 20.—A proposition by which it is claimed Alberta coal could be processed under a new secret and patented system and sold in huge quantities to Eastern Canada and United States markets in many forms has been outlined to Premier Abernethy and his cabinet by Albert Grant, of Montreal, head of the Grant Engineering Co., Ltd., which holds North American rights to the process. Mr. Grant, who served for a time as adviser to the Soviet government, was presented to the cabinet at a session Saturday by P. J. Rowe, of Edmonton, Social Credit member of the House of Commons for Athabasca and head of the federal society credit caucus committee engaged in seeking new industries for Alberta. Mr. Grant will remain in Edmonton this week and will confer with Hon. C. C. Ross, provincial minister of lands and mines. Establishment of at least two plants in Alberta within the next few months for processing of this province's coal is believed to be planned.

Grads Look For Stiff Contest In Home Series

Percy Page and his Edmonton Grads depart in mid-June for Europe, the Olympics and exhibition tour and much sight-seeing, they will pretty well have earned the holiday. Not many champions recognize all challengers as the Grads do. Because of this, it is barely possible the world's women basketball champions will start overseas without a title. They open a best-of-five series at home May 28 against El Dorado Oilers, and this is the most important series Grads have ever engaged in. If you don't think so, just ask them. The Oilers, it must be understood, were known as the Presbyterian College team of Durant, Okla., three years ago. They went into Edmonton and defeated the Page girls in a series played half under the girl's rules and half under men's. It marked the only time the Grads have been beaten in a series since their organization in 1915. So you see how important this coming affair is to Edmonton. This time they will play men's rules and the Underwood International Trophy held since it was donated in 1923, will be at stake. Grads will start thinking about the European trip when they are finished with the Oilers. The El Dorado girls are playing this season for an oil company. Two years ago they moved from the Durant Presbyterian College—and they moved bag and baggage, coach included—to Oklahoma City, where they were sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. Last year they represented Holdenville, Okla., with expenses paid by a wealthy Indian. It's the same Holdenville which bred Dizzy and Paul Dora. Grads have already beaten teams ranked No. 1 and No. 3 in the United States. First it was the American Institute of Business Girls team from Des Moines, Ia., No. 3 outfit, and then the 1936 U. S. champions, Tulsa Stenos. Those Stenos, Page asserts, were a great team. "It will be harder for Edmonton fans to picture stronger competition than that furnished by Tulsa," he says, "but, if any is to be found it will probably come from the El Dorado quintet. "To explain this statement, it should be pointed out that in six pre-tournament contests between the Tulsa and El Dorado teams, the latter won five games and tied the sixth. Whether it was the law of averages or just hard luck is a matter of opinion, but the fact remains that in the final game of the American tournament the hitherto unbeaten El Dorado girls dropped a one-point decision to their opponents from Tulsa. These El Dorado ladies averages close to six feet in height and they live for basketball. They are the No. 2 ranking team in the United States, but Page fears they may be the uncrowned champions. Grads, win or lose, will leave Edmonton June 19 and visit England, Scotland, France, including Nice and Monte Carlo; Italy, Switzer-

Alleges Laundry Aid Injured Voice

HALIFAX, May 20.—(C.P.)—A \$2,000 damages suit brought against the firm of Proctor and Gamble Company of Canada, Limited, was adjourned until tomorrow after Mr. Justice Doulil had heard two witnesses for the defence testify in Supreme Court this afternoon. The plaintiff, Mrs. Maurice Hyland, a Halifax housewife, told the court she had lost her voice for a time after inhaling fumes from an international advertisement laundry preparation which she had bought at a local store and placed in a washing machine containing hot water. Tomorrow the defence will set up in the courtroom a miniature stove and L. A. Lovett, K.C., will boil water in a pot and pour some of the preparation into it in an effort to prove inhaling the resultant fumes is not injurious. "The fumes came up and choked me," Mrs. Hyland told Mr. Justice Doulil. She had run to a tap and drank cold water but she had been unable to sleep well that night or for some nights after, she added.

Urges Churches to Avoid Politics

TORONTO, May 20.—(C.P.)—The church was advised to keep out of politics today by Dr. J. A. C. Evans in addressing the Toronto Centre Presbytery of the United Church. He had no business, he contended, "meddling" in material things. "I don't believe the church should be the guide of any country in what she should do in time of war," said Dr. Evans, referring to a resolution requesting the Social Service Council of Canada to initiate preparation of a statement on the church's responsibility for the "ideals of collective security."

While Japan continues to extend its long military arm into Inner Mongolia, Franz August Larsen, 67-year-old one-time missionary, is trying on behalf of the Mongol government to combat the Nipponese economic and political penetration into Ghengis Khan's ancient kingdom.
