ST. DUNSTAN'S COLLEGE.

Commencement Exercises—Essays and Addresses—Medals and Degrees.

The commencement exercises of St. Dunstan's College were held in the college hall yesterday afternoon at three o'clock. His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Howland presided, having on his right the Lord Bishop of Charlottetown and on his left the Judge of Probate. The audience included a number of the clergy of the diocese and a goodly proportion of the leading residents of the city. The programme prepared for the occasion will be found below:—

The vocal and instrumental numbers were rendered in an excellent manner, the solo by Mr. Roy being eucored. Mr. McGowan's essay was an interesting and instructive review of novels and their authors. The reading of the modern novel—the kind which exalts doubtful characters and gives false ideas of life—was strongly condemned and their perusal spoken of as a literary debauch.

Mr. Doyle's valedictory spoke of the excellent training received at St. Dunstan's College, and counselled the graduates to always remain true to the teachings and traditions of Alma Mater. Touching reference was made to the death of Gladstone, who was referred to as the friend of the afflicted and oppressed in every clime; and the present trouble between the United States and Spain was made the text of a most instructive consideration of wars in general and the conditions under which they were or were not justifiable.

Rev. F. X. Gallant's address to the graduates was a scholarly production. The training of the intellect and will—the training received at St. Dunstan's—was treated at considerable length and its importance pointed out. The graduates were going forth to participate in life's battle fortified with a good scientific and religious education, and he urged them to always be assiduous in cultivating the principles inculcated at St. Dunstan's.

Bishop Macdonald expressed the great pleasure he felt at the work that had been done during the scholastic year, and looked forward to even greater success in the future.

Lieutenant Governor Howland voiced his approval of the exercises and spoke of the great benefit of a good education. Canada wants good men, and never more than she does at present. He hoped the graduates would always reflect credit upon their Alma Mater.

Rev. Peter Corrigan, rector of the college, thanked those who gave medals and other prizes as well as those who patronized the exercises. He referred to the inauguration of the institution by the late lamented Father Angus, and hoped it would not be long before a monument was erected to his memory. He regretted that so many of the graduates of our college went abroad to seek a livelihood instead of remaining at home to develop the natural resources of our own province. He thought that education should be more practical than it is at present and hoped that the day was not far distant when one of the teaching staff of St. Dunstan's would have a practical training in matters pertaining to farming and dairying with a view to imparting instruction in the same important branches.

The distribution of medals, special prizes and diplomas was a very interesting feature of the proceedings, and as each successful student came forward he was enthusiastically applauded. The degree of B. A., of Laval, with which University St. Dunstan's is affiliated, was conferred on John A. Macdonald, Angus Macdonald, P. P. Doyle, Wilfrid Sullivan, Frank G. O'Neill and Real Miller.
