Mr. R. K. Dent, librarian of the Free Library at Aston, near Birmingham, is responsible for the following, which is taken from a paper published in the current number of the Library. Speaking of the curious transformations which the titles of books undergo in the mouths of would-be readers and their messengers he says, "Only the other day I was asked at the counter for the 'Works of Joe Stevens,' meaning those of 'Josephus,' and an assistant vainly endeavored to find Canon Liddon's 'Braken Fowl,' which I ultimately made to be Canon Knox Little's 'Broken Yow.' I should not want to add that the junior assistant suggested (quite seriously) that perhaps it was among the 'Bantam Lectures.'" The present writer can vouch for the following, which he heard one day at Mulby's. A lady came in and enquired for "The Confessions of St. Augustine." The attendant looked puzzled, "Confessions," he seemed to be saying to himself, are sometimes entirely unfit for publication, and such things are not to be had here." Then, after referring to some catalogue, he asked the customer "Is it a new book?" I could not stand this any longer, and told him that it was by no means a new book, as St. Augustine lived more than a thousand years ago, and that a copy might be obtained for a couple of shillings or so at a certain publisher's.

In a notice of the death of Father Flanagan (F. J. "Tom") of Carna, Ireland, a correspondent of the Manchester Guardian writes:—"I remember seeing him at the door of his church in Carna when some collection was being made for the Pope. Not a soul was allowed to leave without being personally scolded or praised by the priest. It was 'Now, Biddy, fair an' his Holiness will be asking to receive a solitary shilling from the like of yourself, or 'Mully, sure an' a shilling's very handsome for a lone widow, an' it's your name will go to his Holiness in front of it.' Each appeal was followed by a good natured slap on the back or a twitch at the ear. The people adored him, as well they might, for it wanted a hero to be an efficient priest at Carna. That wild parish is a mere waste of rocks, bogs, moors and salt water inlets. O'ften 'Father Tom' would be called up at midnight to administer the sacrament in some distant part of the parish, which he could only reach by the help of relays of peasants lighting him with torches over dangerous crags and trackless morasses. He was an authority on forestry, and gave evidence before a Commission on that subject. One of his dreams was to see Connemara again covered with woods, as it has been in prehistoric times."

Of all the epithets which one might think of as applicable to St. John the Divine surely "elegant" is about the last which would occur to anyone's mind, and yet we read in Sir Thomas Browne's "Religio Medici" (sect. 49) the following:—"That elegant apostle, which seemed to have a glimpse of heaven, hath left but a negative description thereof. He was translated out of himself to behold it; but being returned into himself, could not express it." On referring to Dr. Murray's "Dictionary" now in course of publication by the Clarendon Press, we find ample authority for the use of the word, which sounds peculiar to modern ears. Amongst the quotations there is one from Jeremy Taylor, who, in his "Great Exemplar" speaks of "a most elegant and persuasive parable." Comber ("Companion to the Temple") refers to "the learned volumes of this elegant Father," meaning St. Chrysostom.

Stories of dogs are always interesting, especially if they are true. Here is one of which there can be no doubt, as it refers to an animal who for long has been well known to passengers at the Lowestoft station, but whose death is now recorded. This very popular member of the staff of the Great Eastern Railway was a black and tan collie, and appears to have originally appointed himself to fulfil the duty of starting the trains, but time and habit seem to have fully ratified the appointment. By a marvellous instinct the dog, it is said, seemed to know the exact time at which a train should begin its journey, and a restless excitement characterized him as the appointed moment drew near. As the bell uttered its first sound, he would scamper down the platform, and, planting himself close to the engine, bark furiously until the wheels began to move. Satisfied apparently in this respect, he would next make a move for the guard's van and hurry the guard to his post. As the train passed out of the station he retired, and no more was seen of him till a similar operation had to be repeated on the departure of another train. No other bell than that used for starting purposes would bring the animal to view. For years Lowestoft people have been diverted by the dog's performances,

but now, as his obituary notice mournfully puts it, "the fun is at an end."

From dogs to cats the transition is easy. The Rev. H. R. Havelock, in an horrid parody on the following story about the latter. The other day, at a fire, there was a cat with her kittens in one of the rooms. When the fire broke out the cat rushed out of the room but, remembering her kittens, she ran back, leaped out and put it down, and went back for another, and got it out safely. Almost exhausted and very much burnt, she returned for the third, but never came back. She was burnt to death. "The ruling passion strong in death." Was not that, he asked, a kind of heroism and sacrifice worthy of the noblest amongst us?

Notes and Comments.

The Halifax Government has made up its estimate of the assessment necessary for all civic purposes for the year, May 1, 1892, to May 1, 1893. The sum is \$320,567, about \$11,000 more than the estimates of the current year.

In the months of February and March last, says the Montreal Gazette, Pagan had deposited to his credit in one Quebec bank a sum of \$73,000. That was what the Quebec Conservatives had to fight against in the last Dominion election. The records in the Baie des Chaleurs case show that notes for which the toll-taker was responsible were going to protest in April.

The Prince and Princess of Wales have issued a note saying they are anxious to express their deep gratitude to Her Majesty's subjects at home and abroad for the universal feeling of sympathy manifested on the death of their son, and that if sympathy was at such a moment of any avail the remembrance that their grief has been shared by all classes will be a lasting consolation to their sorrowing hearts, and will, if possible, make them more than ever attached to their dear country.

Lecture at Kinkora

On Tuesday evening, Mr. James McLean, of the Herald, delivered his popular lecture on "Sir Thomas More" before the League of the Cross, Kinkora. To the disappointment of many who had expressed themselves "bound to come," the day proved to be one of the unfavorable days of the season. Notwithstanding, a large audience awaited the appearance of the lecturer, and by their rapt attention from beginning to end, pronounced a most favorable verdict on the merits of the paper. Rev. J. J. McDaid, who introduced the lecturer and presided, arose as the latter had finished, and expressed his regrets that as the lecture was given in the church the usual afterpart had to be dispensed with. He expressed himself confident, however, that he would be readily privileged by the audience and particularly by the members of the League, to tender the lecturer thanks on their behalf, which he did accordingly.

The acknowledgement of the tender was accompanied by congratulations to the League for the laudable efforts they were making in the great cause of temperance to wipe out the opposite vice, and in forcible words an appeal was made to all to encourage the workers in that noble cause.

As a summary of the lecture has already appeared in the press, it is not necessary to go into any details, suffice it to say that the people of Kinkora agree with all who hold that Mr. McLean's paper on "Sir Thomas More" was a genuine treat. The next lecture to be given under the auspices of the League of the Cross is from the ready pen of Dr. Macmillan, of Palmerston. Subject: "The Moon." The people of Kinkora, Emerald and surrounding sections may expect a witty and, at the same time, highly instructive lecture. Due notice will be given as to date, etc.
