TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Paris Exposition.

PARIS, May 6. President Carnot formally opened the exposition this afternoon. He was accompanied to the exposition grounds by the Presidents of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies. Tirard, Prime Minister, made an address welcoming the President. He declared that the exposition exceeded all expectations, and proved that the French people still preserved all the qualities for which they have been noted. He extended greetings to all strangers now in Paris, and said that Republican French would show itself hospitable and generous, treating them not as rivals inspiring jealousy, but as fellow workers, laboring for the happiness of humanity. Carnot in his address referred to the undaunted energy of France, arising from the severest trial to fresh industrial triumph. He afterwards inspected the various departments of the exhibition. The exhibits number 30,000. To-night Paris is ablaze with illuminations. No vehicles are permitted in the streets and the city is the peoples.

Wheat and Flour.

TORONTO, May 6.

The World says that owing to the action of the Dominion Government in refusing to accede to the request of the Ontario millers to either increase the duty on flour, or decrease the duty on wheat there is concerted action now amongst the millers to break the price of wheat. They are now paying \$1.07 to \$1.08 for their Ontario milling grades, such as No. 2 red and No. 2 spring, and claim that at the present price of flour it is utterly impossible for them to run mills except at a loss.

Major Rogers Dead.

WATERVILLE, MIDD., May 6.

Major A. B. Rogers died at the house of his brother, L. Z. Rogers here yesterday, of cancer in the stomach. Major Rogers was known to the world as the discoverer of Kicking Horse Pass, through which the Canadian Pacific found what was believed to be the only opening across the Rocky Mountains to the Pacific coast. That was the crowning piece of a series of brilliant engineering feats which gave him rank among the foremost engineers of the country.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, May 6.

The annual session of Royal Societies will open at Ottawa to-morrow. Gerald, Assistant Commissioner of Inland Revenue, and Davies, Dominion Distillery Inspector, left to-day for the Maritime Provinces on a tour of inspection. A cotton factory, the largest under one roof in America, is to be erected at Montmorency Falls, Quebec, to be running in September.

It is stated on excellent authority that the Government intend fitting out survey parties at once for the location of the Harvey and Moncton Short Line. There is general appropriation for surveys which will probably be utilized to carry on the work and location this season.
