Hamilton Cats Claw Argos; Montreal Defeats Ottawa

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Hamilton Tiger-Cats defeated Toronto Argonauts 35-21 Sunday at Hamilton in the final game of their Eastern Football Conference schedule. The loss snapped a two-game winning streak by the Argos but left them last with only three wins and 13 setbacks. It was Ticats' 10th victory against four losses. The game meant nothing as far as standings went because all four positions in the EFC were already decided. In the other EFC game at Ottawa, Montreal Alouettes defeated Rough Riders 16-8. It was the last game of the regular schedule for both clubs but they meet again next weekend for the conference semi-final.

The Hamilton win saw Don Southern win the EFC scoring title last year with 94 points. Sutherland scored 14 points on three field goals, three singles and two converts to move ahead of place kicker Moe Racine of Ottawa Rough Riders for the crown. Sutherland finished the 14-game schedule with 82 points while Racine, who picked up one point Saturday at Ottawa, finished with 76. Hamilton got touchdowns from Willie Betha, Billy Wylie and Gerry McDougall, a former Argonaut. Joe Zuger kicked a single and the Ticats added a safety touch worth two points to round out the scoring. Jim Rountree, Dave Theala and Len Sparks scored Toronto touchdowns with John Vilunas kicking two converts and a single. The single came early in the third quarter when Vilunas' field goal attempt from the Hamilton 21-yard line went wide. Sutherland went into the game seven points behind Racine in the scoring derby, but caught up to him by half time. He rushed three times for nine yards and caught a 21 yard pass. Shatto announced earlier in the season he would retire at the end of the year. Other players wrapping up individual titles in the game were Zuger in punting and Gerry Henley of Hamilton in punt returns.

Stamps Clinch WFC Crown; Robinson Leads Scorers

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Calgary Stampeders clinched first place. Larry Robinson locked up the Western Football Conference scoring title and Jerry Williams became the first freshman coach to pilot a western champion in 11 years as Stamps beat B.C. Lions 20-10 Sunday in Vancouver. The win gave Calgary its first WFC title since 1949 and the two points broke a first-place tie with Winnipeg Blue Bombers, who now head into a sudden-death semi-final against Saskatchewan Roughriders. In the other weekend WFC game Saturday at Edmonton, Roughriders defeated Eskimos 15-12 in the last game of their regular schedule. Robinson, the Calgary back who entered the game with a seven-point scoring lead over his closest rival - Lions' kicker Peter Kempf - booted two field goals and two converts to wrap up in the scoring title with 95 points. Kempf's single and convert gave him 82 points and second place.

The Stampeders led 7-0, 14-8 and 17-10 at the quarters. Calgary halted four Lion drives with interception—three by Jim Furlong, the other by Jerry Keeling who outwrestled back Ron Morris for the ball. Stamp quarterback Eagle Day completed eight of nine pass attempts while the Lions' Joe Kapp only managed 13 for 35. The Stamps gained 196 yards through the air to the Lions' 159 and rushed for 149 to B.C.'s 93. Lovell Coleman carried the ball 25 times for 95 yards, bringing his season total to 1,511—far short of Saskatchewan's George Reed who finished with 1,788 yards for the rushing title. A blocked field goal attempt and brilliant running by fullback George Reed gave Roughriders the victory. Reed scored a touchdown and compiled 144 yards rushing in 16 carries as Roughriders used the win to warm up for a berth in the WFC semi-final. His touchdown, early in the fourth quarter, was set up by linebacker Wayne Shaw, who crashed through to bat down Tommy-Joe Coffey's 46-yard field-goal bid. Shaw recovered the ball on the Edmonton 20. After six successive carries and a penalty, Reed scored from the one-yard line to put Roughriders in front for the first time. The other Saskatchewan touchdown was scored by flanker Hugh Campbell on an eight-yard pass from quarterback Ron Lancaster. Jack Abendschneider completed Roughriders' scoring with two converts and a single on a missed field goal attempt. Jim Thomas scored Edmonton's touchdown. Coffey kicked a convert and a field goal and Randy Kerbow and Al Eucyer kicked singles. Edmonton led 8-7 after the first quarter and 11-8 at halftime. The third quarter was scoreless.

MARITIME RACING

SACKVILLE DOWN, N.S. (CP) — Eloise Wick, owned by Greenbrier Farms of Charlottetown, topped the summary in the \$1,000 feature invitational pace Saturday to highlight a nine-dash harness racing card. The horse raced to a 3:07 3/8 victory in the first leg of the event and finished second behind the 2:16 3/8 clocking of Dartmouth owned Borderview. Reunited in the final dash, Borderview Renewed, owned by Eric and Henry Wehby, placed third the first time out, but salvaged the fastest mile of the night. Other winners were Sir Sampson (2:11 1/8), Fur Anway (2:18), Headgear (2:11 3/8), Dominion Byrd (2:19 1/8), High Price (2:11 4/8), Sugar Blues (2:18) and Borderview Beauty (2:18).

Behind excellent blocking, Reed became the second player in CFL history to gain more than a mile on the ground in a season. He entered the game with 1,684 yards and wound up with 1,788, compared with the record 1,794 held by former Calgary fullback Earl Lunford.

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
