GLACE BAY, N. S., Sept. 21 — (CP)—Sydney Millionaires pulled out of the Maritime Major League today in a surprise move which left the beleaguered league with only three remaining teams.

Arthur Lipton, president of the Sydney Hockey Club, announced the club's withdrawal at a league meeting here.

The Sydney decision came after the club failed in a bid to have the circuit revert to Allan Cup status, with a \$125 weekly limit on players' salaries.

Sydney then refused to post the \$1,000 bond required of competing clubs, making its withdrawal official.

Another meeting will be held next Saturday in New Glasgow to decide on the league's future, left very much in doubt by the departure of the Sydney club.

Only Halifax St. Mary's, Glace Bay Miners and Charlottetown Islanders remain in the circuit.

The Saints last week survived a change of sponsorship which threatened temporarily to leave them out of the running. A Charlottetown spokesman said at that time he did not see how the league could continue operation if one of the four teams stepped down.

Saint John Beavers and Moncton Hawks, competing in last year's schedule, withdrew earlier this year to form a new loop for Allan Cup competition.

Leo McIntyre, Glace Bay spokesman, said the situation created by Sydney's withdrawal was "deplorable." Miners had already signed a playing coach and lined up new players for this season's schedule.

League president Judge J. Elliott Hudson of Halifax said after the close of today's meeting the three remaining clubs were prepared to carry on.

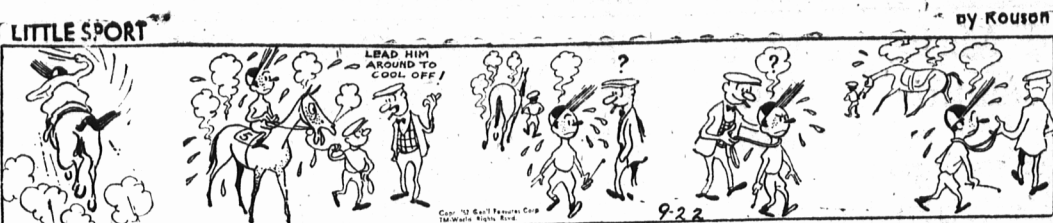
Chris McAlden, league secretary, told reporters preliminary schedule drafts indicated the league could continue with three teams, but this is subject to ratification at the New Glasgow meeting.

But indecision remained. Charlottetown delegate Gilbert Gaudet said it would be impossible to take a definite stand until the matter had been referred to club officials.

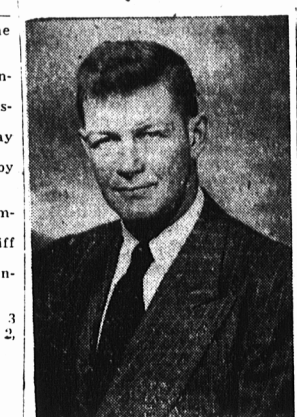

Elmer MacNeil, right fielder for the M. C. A. ball team, stole another page from Frank Merriwell's story book by blasting a two-out tenth-inning home run to give the M. C. A. a 2-1 win over the R. C. A. F. Royals and even up their final series at three games each.

It was the second time during the series that MacNeil had come through with such a hit that turned defeat into victory for the Airways squad.

But MacNeil's blast only came about through the efforts of teammate Warren "Bunny" Hood. Hood committed grand larceny on the Royals when in the eighth frame when with the sacks crammed to their fullest extent he went deep at

second and made a flying one-handed grab off Wanless's liner to retire the side.

Up till the tenth the teams had been in the midst of a pitchers' duel between Waldo Munroe of the M. C. A. team and Hardy Dawe of the Royals. SAN PEDRO, Calif., Sept. 21—(AP)—Husky Florence Chadwick scrambled ashore at rocky Point Vicente today to become the first woman to conquer the 21-mile Catalina Channel.

The attractive 33-year-old book-keeper from San Diego, Calif., came within minutes of breaking all records for the event. Her official time, as reported by clockers from the Amateur Athletic Union who accompanied her in a boat, was 13 hours, 47 minutes, 32 seconds.

This compares with the unofficial record of 13 hours, 35 minutes, set by Byron Summers of Los Angeles in 1927.

Protests Sunday Sport Programs

HAMILTON, Sept. 21—(CP)—A resolution urging the CBC not to eliminate religious broadcasts for the baseball world series was unanimously passed Friday by the general council of the United Church of Canada.

The resolution, introduced by Rev. W. A. Beecroft of Wingham, Ont., on behalf of the radio committee, also asked the CBC to maintain the continuity of its religious broadcasts.

It also asked the CBC to "resist pressure from commercialized sport to broadcast the world series in church of the air or religious period time."

Dodgers Within Single Game Of N.L. Pennant; Yankees Protect A.L. Lead

Joe Black made his first major league start tonight and hurled Brooklyn Dodgers to within one victory of the National League pennant.

The ace relief man limited Boston Braves to three hits as he led the Dodgers to an 8-2 triumph. Meanwhile, last year's miracle winners, New York Giants, fell before Russ Meyer and Philadelphia Phillies 6-2.

In the hot American League race, New York Yankees protected their 1 1/2 game edge over Cleveland Indians with a 1-0 win over Philadelphia Athletics.

Black, who now sports a gaudy 1.91 earned-run average, answered the call for help 54 times this year before making his first start today. He thus broke a Brooklyn pitching record of 54 appearances established nine years ago by Les Webber. Black now has won 15 games and lost three.

The only runs scored off him came in the fourth on a single by Johnny Logan and a double by Ed Matthews which Carl Furillo returned wildly to the infield, allowing both men to score.

Manager Leo Durocher's hot-shot team of 1951 would have to out-miracle last year's pennant drive to even gain a tie, would have to win their final six games while Brooklyn loses its last six. A Brooklyn win or a Giant defeat sends the pennant from the Polo Grounds to Ebbets Field.

Allie Reynolds pitched the Yanks to a brilliant 1-0 victory over rookie Harry Byrd and the Athletics while Bob Lemon twirled the pursuing Indians to a 7-1 conquest over Detroit's tail-end Tigers.

Reynolds permitted only three hits in racking up his sixth shut-out and 19th victory. However, he was in hot water throughout as he issued eight walks.

The Athletics had the Yanks' gritty righthander sweating in the seventh and ninth innings. Cass Michaels tripled to open the seventh but then threw three balls to Joe Astroth but followed up with two called strikes and finally nailed Astroth on a pop fly.

Former Yank Al Clark baited Byrd and popped up Reynolds' first pitch to end the game.

Byrd, who blanked the Yanks on Sept. 3, permitted only five hits but came in the sixth inning along with a pair of walks to produce the game's lone run. Yogi Berra singled home Joe Collins from second base with the winning marker.

Lemon had it much easier than Reynolds, coasting to his 21st victory as the Indians supported his four-hit pitching with an 11-hit attack against Art Houtteman and two relief pitchers.

Al Rosen was the Indians' big gun, driving in four runs on his 27th homer and a double. Rosen's blasting boosted his runs-batted-in figure to 101.

Meyer scattered nine hits in beating the fading Giants. Granny Hamner singled across two runs
