L. Cantelo Re-elected Fish, Game Ass'n Prexy

Louis Cantelo, Seven Mile Road, was re-appointed president of the Southern Kings Fish and Game Association at the annual meeting held last evening at the Bison Restaurant, Montserrat.

Mr. Cantelo has been president of the association for approximately ten years and has carried on the programs of the association almost single handed in that time. On accepting the position for another year he said he would definitely not accept the position next year as he felt it was time someone else with new and better ideas should take over.

Other officers elected were Joe MacDonald, Cardigan, secretary, treasurer and Walter Connon, Cardigan, vice president, both taking office for the second term.

Mr. Cantelo gave an outline of the convention which he attended recently at Ottawa. This convention was a two-day affair with representation from all provinces except Nova Scotia. One of the most important matters discussed he advised was water pollution.

He pointed out that it is questionable how long the Dominion Wildlife Association would last due to the extreme cost of operation. He also advised that a wildlife meeting has been suggested for this fall to possibly form a Maritime Association from which two or three representatives could be selected to represent the Maritimes at the annual convention, this would cut costs and possibly be of greater benefit at the same time to Maritime sportsmen.

In conclusion he dealt with the operation of the local association and pointed out that \$1,500 had been spent on winter works program most of which was used on dam sites at Cardigan, Mitchell River and Roseville.

Fred Vunzgo gave a report on progress at the Sutherland Dam site where he stated that approximately \$1,000 had also been spent on winter works in clearing the site. He was not sure when work would begin on the new dam.

William Whiteaway advised the meeting that something had already been done or would be done shortly to assure that the Harvey Moore Sanctuary at Milltown would continue to function.

Following the meeting a lunch was enjoyed by the over 20 members in attendance.

Fines Given For Speeding

The case of Carl Joseph Arsenault of Summerside was adjourned until Thursday, May 27, to set a date for a preliminary hearing. Arsenault is charged with break and entry. The accused elected to be tried by a judge with a jury.

EPA's Cancellation Of Flights Considered At Town Meeting

A member of the town council commended the local police force for cracking down on speeders violating the new town speed limit of 20 miles per hour at the monthly council meeting here last night.

Grant Mollison favoured the idea of the police force fining speeders and as he stated, "I would like to commend the police."

He said that recently, comments have been voiced about the reduced speed limit, "there have been some complaints and favourable comments about it". Councillor Mollison said that the chief of police, S.D.A. Wannamaker had also received good and bad complaints from the public. "Older people are commending it and younger ones feel discriminated", stated Councillor Mollison. "I know I watch my speedometer."

The councillor pointed out that a recent newspaper war on speeders was declared but he said it is "just a matter of the police cracking down". Councillor Mollison was informed by the chief that the 20 mile-per-hour rate would remain in effect. Thirty five people appearing on drunk charges ranked as the highest offence reported by the police for April.

The council passed a by-law that Spring Street from Water Street running north to Fitzroy Street be declared a one way street; that it be unlawful to

make a left turn on entering Water Street from Holman's parking lot and that it is now unlawful to make a U turn at the intersection of Water and Central Streets and Water and Queen Streets.

AIR MAILS

On the subject of future air mail service becoming extinct in this part of the province Councillor Ernest Morrison declared, "we should look into the EPA situation. The councillor pointed out that after May 17 (yesterday) one mail flight in and one out here daily will be in effect—quite a change when it used to be three flights in and three flights out each day during the last war.

"Instead of going forward we're going backwards", said Councillor Frances Perry.

"I suggest if EPA can't give us better service that they give the run up and let someone else do it", offered Councillor Morrison. Areas effected would be Summerside and outlying districts including Western Prince County. Councillor Morrison singled out the fine job done by Carl Burke when he was delivering mail.

Councillor Morrison stated that the council should not only

look into this but inform the town Board of Trade that the town council are behind them. "I suggest a letter be written to EPA and one to the Department of Transport", said Morrison.

TRAINING PROGRAM

In other business Mrs. Perry praised maintenance personnel of the town electric department on the training program they are engaged in. These men are being trained as operators.

"I am pleased about the training that has been carried out and that they are continuing their education", commented Mrs. Perry.

The electric department reported 1,346,500 kilowatt hours were generated and purchased in 1964, a 67 per cent increase from April of 1964.

As could be expected, every one in attendance last evening was shocked by the recent untimely death of ex-councillor Leo Wood, in tribute everyone observed a minute's silence before the meeting began.

Councillor Herbert Schurman stated that assistant fire chief Frank Arsenault will carry on until a new chief is appointed. Captain Searle Kenny will act as assistant chief.

Councillor Eric Johnson reported he was pleased with the work being done at Rogers Ranch and at the town garage. But he was disturbed over the changing of ranch's nickname from "Ponderosa" to "Summerside Park". Johnson said numerous people are still calling the ranch the "Ponderosa" and stressed that it should remain so.

Begin Repairs To Breastwork
