Ottawa Announces Nova Scotia Farm Settlement Scheme

OTTAWA, May 3-(CP)-A joint Dominion Provincial scheme for settlement of agricultural immigrants on Nova Scotia farms was announced today.

Under the plan the Nova Scotia Land Settlement Board will lend the settlers an amount equal to two-thirds of the purchase price of the land and 50 per cent of the cost of livestock and necessary farm equipment.

Correspondence read included a letter thanking the Court (from Dr. A. D. MacKinnon of Little Narrows, N. S.) but declining the honour of nomination for the Moderatorship of the forthcoming General Assembly.

Arrangements were made for the induction of the Rev. Donald Nicholson into the Pastoral Charge of Clyde River in the Church at Canoe Cove on July 4th at 8 P. M.

The following were appointed Delegates to the Pre-Assembly Congress to be held in Montreal, June 7-7. Miss Margaret MacDougall, Mr. Hazen McEure, Mr. Gordon MacArthur and the Rev. C. D. Henderson together with the following Assembly Commissioners: Rev. W. A. Young, Rev. D. A. Campbell, Mr. Alex. Hiltz and Mr. Neil Nicholson.

Observance will be made by the congregations of the Presbytery on June 25th of the 75th Anniversary of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, as at present constituted.

Reporting on the Marshfield vacancy, Rev. Donald Nicholson stated that Mr. Malcolm Lot had been appointed to this field for the summer and it is expected he will soon arrive. Rev. G. C. Webster informed the Court that the new Manse at Clyde River would be ready for occupancy about June 15th.

In Class 56, school chorus for grades 1 and 2, first place was awarded to Rochford Square School, Charlottetown, with 82 marks. Second place was won by Summerside School with 78 points, and Prince Street School, Charlottetown, was third with 76.

Summerside School won first place in class 57, school chorus for grades 3 and 4, with 83 marks. Rochford Square School, Charlottetown, was second with 81 points, and third was won by Prince Street School, Charlottetown, with 80.

In Class 58, school chorus, grades 5 and 6, Grade 5 of Prince Street School, Charlottetown, took first place with 83 marks, and grade 6 of Prince Street was second with 82. Summerside School was awarded third place with 80 points.

Only two entries were in class 59, school chorus for grades 7 and 8. Of these two, Summerside School took first with 82 marks, and Prince Street School was second with 81.

In class 60, school chorus for grades 9 and 10, Prince Street School was the only entry and received 83 and 82 for the two test pieces.

School Unit No. 1 (Group B) placed first in class 61, school chorus, any grade, limit 40 pupils, with a mark of 81 points. Prince Street School (Grades 7 and 8) were second with 80 marks, and group B of Unit No. 1 were third with 78 points.

Group A and B of Unit No. 1 were the only entries in class 68 for high school chorus, limit 40 voices. Group B was first with 78 points and Group A was one point behind for second place.

School Unit No. 1 was the winner also of class 69, high school chorus, three part harmony, limit 40 pupils, with 77 marks. Prince Street School was second with 75 points and Teachers' Training, P. W. C. was third with 70.

In class No. 70, school chorus for any grade, limit 40 pupils, first place was won by Rochford Square School, Charlottetown with 81 points. Second place was awarded Prince Street School with 80 marks, and third to Parkdale with 79.
