

MISCELLANEOUS.

Three of the Munich clubs have resolved not to admit Jews, and a Jewish judge has been excluded from a club at Ulm.

The Labrador codfishery and that pursued by the Newfoundland fishermen on the Banks are turning out well, it is reported.

Thomas White, M. P., will accompany Mr. Brydges to the North-West in the course of a few days as far as the Rocky Mountains.

Near Marksville, La., four young men riding rapidly two and two in opposite directions through a narrow lane on a dark night, had a collision that killed all four of the horses and bruised the riders considerably.

At Pembina Mount, Man., the hay crop was a plentiful one, and every prospect appeared of excellent crops of all kinds. Springfield advices of 26th ult. to the Times stated that barley had, been and other crops were being cut. At Poplar Point, a full average yield was expected, although heavy wind and rain badly flattened some grain.

The Grand Trunk and the Great Western railway companies have agreed to throw their earnings into a common purse, and certain details of the union are to be worked out by arbitration. The terms of the agreement will be closely scanned in Canada, and as some legislative permission may be required, there will be an opportunity for protecting the public interests.

The impression prevails in England that Lord Dufferin is about to remove from St. Petersburg to Constantinople. He appears to have had his usual success at the Court of the Czar. It remains to be seen what he will be able to accomplish with that of the Sultan. The Turk is not without his good qualities, but he seems to be an almost incorrigible obstructive. It seems almost impossible to make him understood that if he will not move on he must be brushed aside.

London, Ontario, is rejoicing in the completion of its water supply system. The supply is obtained from a number of springs three and a half miles below the city, capable of furnishing 3,021,843 gallons every twenty-four hours. The water is pumped into a reservoir, 300 feet square and 17 feet deep, 180 feet above the level of the highest building in the city. The pumps are driven by water power, obtained from the Thames river. The supply is said to be very good and abundant, and the cost remarkably moderate. What are Federicton and Charlottetown doing, or going to do to secure a wholesome water supply. —St. John News.
