Midnight Fire Razes Home Of Elderly St. Roch Couple

Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Arsenault, St. Roch, about midnight Wednesday night. Mr. Arsenault, who is in his seventies, and his partially crippled aged wife were asleep at the time in an upstairs room and when they discovered the house was on fire they barely managed to escape downstairs and reached the open just a few moments before the entire house was an inferno. Both received third degree burns and Mrs. Arsenault had the misfortune to lose her glasses, dentures and a small sum of money. Through the efforts of the Tignish Fire Dept. and neighbours the adjoining barn and shed were saved and a pig and several hens and ducks were moved to safety. Two dogs, housed in the basement of the home, were lost. Due to the St. Roch Road having recently been widened and ditched the Fire Dept was unable to get into the year and had to remain on the road itself and use water from a nearby pond. Fortunately the weather was calm, otherwise a neighbouring house and the school across the way would have been in some danger. The couple have taken quarters in an unoccupied house nearby owned by Leo Overbeck and arrangements were being made last evening for some assistance from the Red Cross Disaster Services Committee.

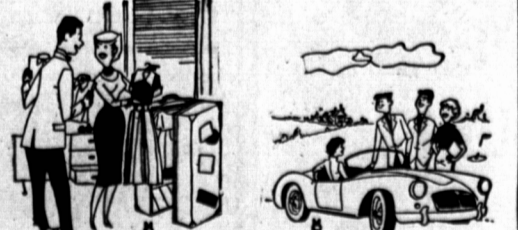
