THE LATEST APPOINTMENT.

The long-expected has happened. After keeping the seat of the late Senator Arsenault vacant for a year, the Government have placed in it a member of the House of Commons, the Hon. John Yeo. Our Liberal statesmen have again deliberately played false to their pre-election contentions. To appoint a member of the House of Commons to a judgeship, a governorship or a senatorship was, on the part of the Liberal Conservatives, an act of corruption, an interference with the independence of Parliament, to be condemned in the strongest language and criticised as a reason why the Government ought to lose the confidence of the country. But presto! the Liberals are now in office and power as a result of such Liberal condemnation and criticism of their opponents; and now such an appointment is all right,—an act to be commended by right thinking men, applauded by the country and justified by the electors,—particularly by the electors of East Prince!

Two years ago the electors of East Prince elected Mr. Yeo to represent them in the House of Commons. There was a great struggle. Much money was spent, and Mr. Yeo was declared the choice of the majority, invested with the authority, the responsibilities and the duties of a member of the present House of Commons. But before this House has half run its course, Mr. Yeo abandons his duties and responsibilities, and goes leisurely, for life, to the ease and comfort of the Senate. Was there any necessity for this renunciation of duty and responsibility? Ask Mr. Rogers, of Alberton, Mr. R. T. Holman, Mr. Gaffney or Mr. Montgomery, of Summerside, Mr. Reuben Toplin, of Kensington, or Mr. Pound, of Margate,—ask any man who by reason of life-long devotion to the Liberal Party had a just claim upon the consideration of our Liberal Government—if it were necessary that Mr. Yeo should abandon the responsible position in the House of Commons for which he had striven and for which they had elected him. We do not deny that Mr. Yeo has stood loyally by the Liberal Party and is to be congratulated upon his personal success. But we do maintain that neither the people of East Prince, as a whole, nor the leading men of Prince County who have served their party faithfully, have been well treated by the Government which has taken him out of his seat in the House of Commons and placed him in the Senate.

What the people of East Prince will do about the matter is not of much moment at this juncture. In their disgust, and in the knowledge that Parliament may be dissolved in the course of a few months, they may do nothing, or they may seize this opportunity to teach the Government that they cannot, with impunity, be false to themselves and the country. The people at large would be well pleased if they should adopt the latter course.

POLITICS AND THE PUBLIC SERVICE.

A FEW days ago we challenged the organs of the Liberal Government in this Province to defend the recent appointment of John Gow Scrimgeour as an official of the Dominion Government. But none of them has attempted to do so. We may therefore conclude that the appointment is defensible. The Guardian, indeed, declares in effect that a many-times convicted violator of the law is not a fit person to

hold office under the Crown, while the Patriot avoids the question.

But the Patriot repeats, in this connection, the oft-repeated falsehood that railway men and others in the employ of the Government were, while the Conservatives were in office, compelled to go to the polls and vote for the Conservative candidates. Perhaps the Patriot will mention the name of one man who was so compelled. We never heard of one. The fact is, the railway officials and others voted for the Conservative candidates because they were Conservatives, not because they were forced. That was the reason why our Liberal Provincial Government had them disfranchised until after there was a Liberal Government in Ottawa. Their franchise was restored, and what happened? Mr. Flannigan was discharged as a warning to others because he said that he was a Conservative and would vote according to his principles; and the men were dragged on one day to vote for the Liberal candidates and on the next day to vote against the Scott Act in terms of the deal with the liquor men. Even if the Conservatives were what the Patriot calls them—"a gang of boodlers"—and if this were so what shall be said of the Liberals who have already increased the public expenditures by close upon \$10,000,000 a year?—it is hard to see how the fact justifies the appointment of John Gow Scrimgeour or proves that the Liberals' treatment of men in the public service has been in accord with the principles laid down by Lord Dufferin.
