REPUBLICANS SCOFFED

Republicans continued to scoff at the prospect of a new party in support from voters who, they said, had not been tapped by the small and big parties.

At the end of what has been called the most bitter U.S. presidential election in modern times, one in which specific platforms lost out to broad issues of morality, nuclear responsibility, individual freedom and prosperity—there was talk of a record victory margin.

Franklin Roosevelt in 1936 shattered Al Landon with 56.8 per cent of the popular vote and all the electoral college votes except eight—Maine and Vermont.

60 Reefers Arrive Here; More Coming

Some 60 refrigerated railway cars arrived here yesterday from Seattle and Cape Tormentine yesterday, with the first of the new refrigerated cars in last night and this morning.

The province needs an average of 200 refrigerated cars to export produce, mainly potatoes, turnips, frozen foods, meat and fish.

Exceptions were scattered showers in the northwest, upper Mississippi valley, parts of the northern Rockies, the Pacific northwest and Alaska.
