Fish Stocking Has Major Part

HALIFAX (Special) — It may be that if you angling catches of sport fish are better this year than last, the work of the federal department of fisheries fish culture service in the Maritimes may have played more than a minor part.

Dr. R. R. Logie, chief of the fish culture service in the Maritimes, reported at the department's area headquarters in Halifax that in 1964 the fish culture stations in the three provinces raised more than 25,000,000 fish — Atlantic salmon and various species of trout.

Of that total number more than 6,200,000 were Atlantic salmon and about 117,000 were seabago or landlocked salmon. Speckled trout produced totalled more than 16,000,000, while more than 2,300,000 brown trout were produced. The number of rainbow trout was 237,480.

These fish were used to stock the fishing rivers and lakes in the three Maritime Provinces. In addition, the service collected millions of eggs from which to raise fish in the rear ponds. For instance, the Atlantic salmon egg collection in 1964 was 10 per cent higher than in 1963. Nearly 11,400,000 salmon eggs were taken at five of the stations in New Brunswick and

Nova Scotia. More than 19,600,000 speckled trout eggs were collected, while brown trout accounted for nearly 4,000,000 eggs and rainbow trout 931,000 eggs.

OUTSIDE MARITIMES
In addition to eggs produced to raise fish for use in the Maritimes, the service supplied more than 1,200,000 eggs to fish culture agencies outside the Maritimes. Mostly this is a reciprocal arrangement. For instance, last year 90,000 landlocked salmon eggs were received from the state of Maine. Many times fish are shipped to outside agencies, such as universities, who require fish for biological study.

Dr. Logie noted in his report that the "show business" was making greater demands on his branch. In addition to thousands of people who visit fish hatcheries in the Maritimes, more and more requests for live-fish displays at sportsmen's shows are received. In 1964 the fish culture branch provided live fish displays to exhibitions or fairs at Souris, Summerside, Shippegan, Chatham, Woodstock, Stanley, Fredericton, Saint John, Sussex, Lunenburg, Lawrencetown, Greenwood, Windsor, Yarmouth, Halifax, Shelburne, Bear River and Digby.

policy is aimed at strengthening peace rather than building up nuclear war potential. Sokolov gave a recital of the present condition of the Soviet armed force which he said number 2,423,000 men. He listed many previous claims, some of which Western experts doubt.

He said new Soviet anti-aircraft defences are capable of reaching targets at any altitude and flying at any speed. Although he said aircraft, this hinted at previously aimed anti-missile defence. The West has yet to develop one and it does not think the Soviet Union has a need.

HAVE ROCKETS
Ground forces "are equipped with tactical nuclear weapons and tactical rockets," Sokolov said. He declined to answer questions of American correspondents on the number and targets of Soviet strategic rockets.

Sokolov denounced the plan reported in the press last December for "ATO" to use nuclear mines on West Germany's eastern border with Communist areas. The U.S. Embassy here denied knowledge of such plans when a Soviet protest was made.

HALIFAX (CP) — Farewell was paid to the navy's familiar white and blue ensigns here as they were replaced by the new maple leaf flag.

About 800 officers and men, including 30 ships and shore establishments, and a 100-man guard of honor took part in the ceremonies.

The ensigns had flown from the navy's vessels since the force was established 55 years ago—the white from the stern, while in port, and the blue from the bow.

Rear-Admiral W. M. Landymore, chief of the navy's Atlantic Command, said it is not easy to end old friendships that cannot be renewed.

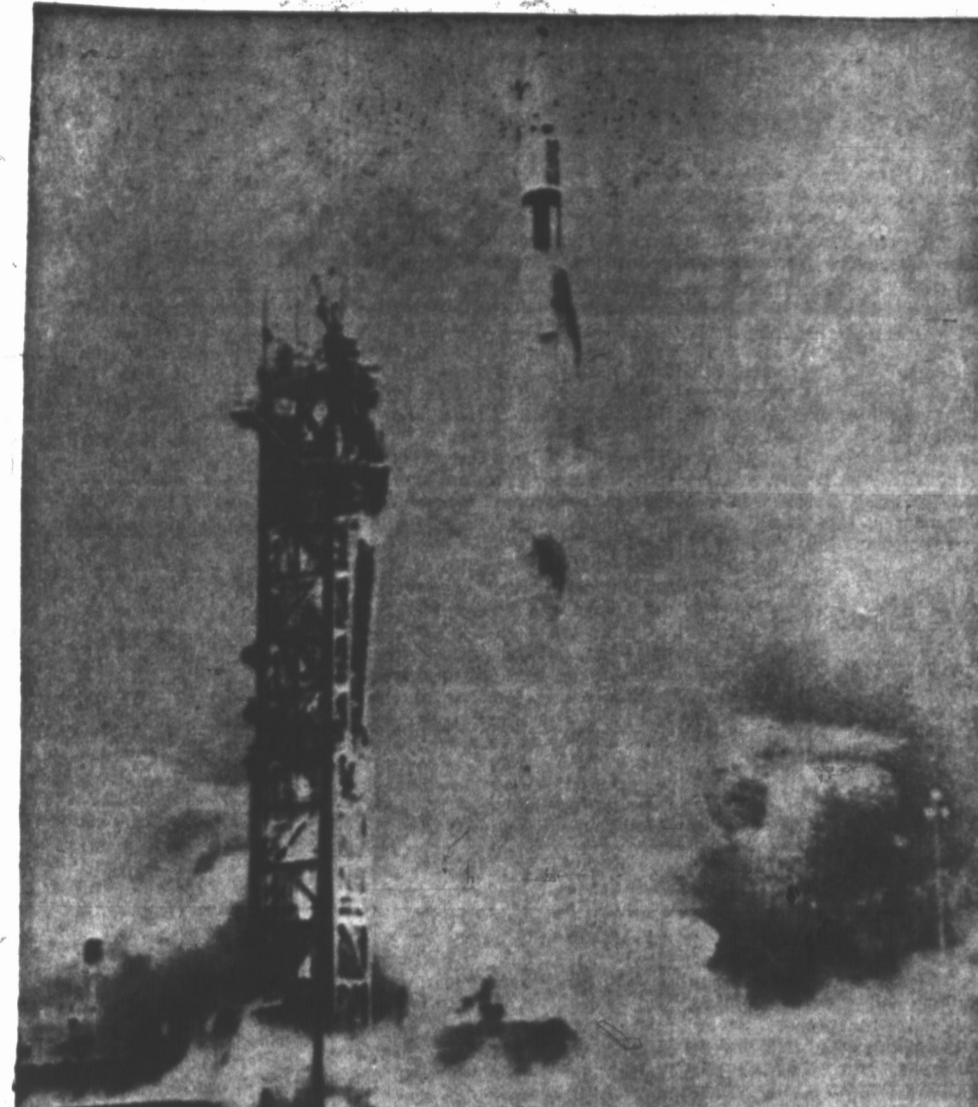
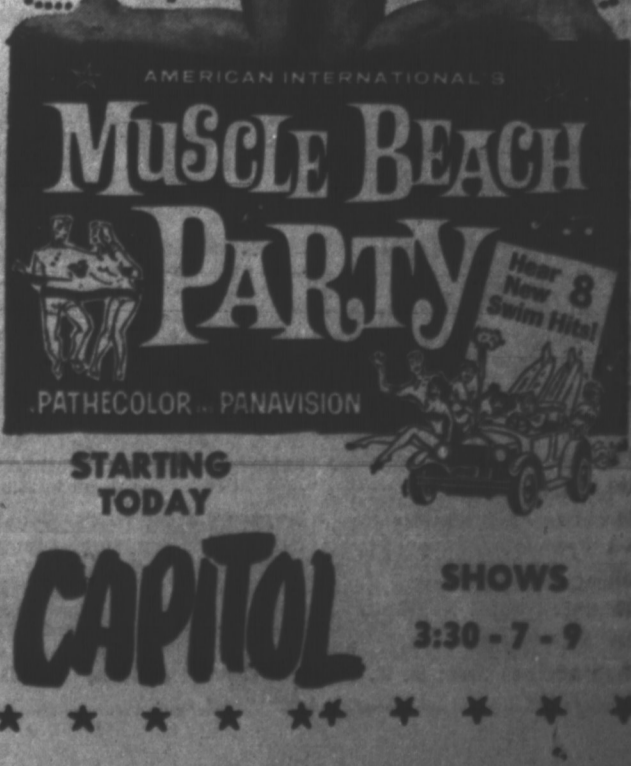
