## 150 Golfers Will Compete In PEI Golf Tourney Sat.

More than 150 golfers will tread the fairways of the Bellevue Golf Course in Charlottetown and the Golf and Country Club in Summerside Saturday afternoon in quest of Island amateur championships.

The first round of the men's section of the tournament will get underway early in the afternoon over the Charlottetown course, while the ladies tee off at 1 p.m. at Summerside.

Some 100 men 40 from Summerside will be competing for the amateur crown currently held by Art MacKenzie of Charlottetown, a three-time winner of the title. MacKenzie took honors last year blazing through 36 holes of medal play with 148. Jack Beaton of Charlottetown was runner-up.

The cream of the amateur crop on the island will be gunning to dethrone MacKenzie. Included among the strongest prospects are five-time winner Bill "Bud" Beer, Don MacDonald, holder of the 1947 N. B. — P. E. I. amateur title, Wendall Gillis, Jack Beaton, Ted Bradley, Harry Simmons, Bobby Dowling, and Dearwyn Heustis, in addition to several others.

A Summerside golfer Blanche Hogg is the defending ladies champion. Mrs. Alex Horne of Summerside was runner-up in the 1952 competition.

## SPORTS FRONT

These days when the word "recession" is in the news, it is heartening to hear of planned expansion, even if it has nothing much to do with the national economy.

Of course, the major baseball leagues have been toying with the idea of perhaps two 16-team loops or even another league. Nevertheless, Selke is certain that now is the time to take the big step. In order to do it the big question of available talent has to be solved. Selke says that his own Canadians would be split into two squads and Canada's biggest city — when there isn't anyone from Toronto around — would have its first pair of N.H.L. teams since the days of the Maroons. Other possible sites include Quebec City and Cleveland, although Selke wouldn't go out on a limb to name them. The latter had a try at getting into the big time in hockey a few years ago, but couldn't raise the necessary ante.

Selke has gotten both opposition and support from the Smythes of Toronto. Young Stafford Smythe is behind him 100 percent but father Conn, president of the Maple Leaf Gardens and an N.H.L. governor, said "nix" only to reverse himself moments later when the pleasant thought of the great Montreal hockey power being split in two sank home.

Smythe the Younger says: "I am and always have been in favor of it. I was disappointed when Cleveland didn't make it a few years ago, but they didn't have the money."

But there is that sticky question of talent to solve. Where would it all come from when there doesn't seem to be enough to go around now, what with the Black Hawks, Leafs and almost everyone except Les Canadiens having trouble getting enough good players to people their rosters now?

Stafford Smythe says: "There are enough. The quality would not suffer. We had better hockey in O.H.A. junior when we had 10 teams than we have with six."

But Dad Smythe doesn't see eye to eye with his son. Says he: "I couldn't agree less, we haven't enough good players now. Look at the Leafs." But the possibility of Maurice Richard and Jean Beliveau playing on opposite sides of the fence is an intriguing one and, after some reconsideration Smythe adds: "However, if Selke says he will split his team and make two in Montreal, I'll go with him there."

Tommy Ivan, general manager of the lowly Hawks who got up to sixth place last season, brings up another point against expansion. Says he: "We have only six clubs because of the scarcity of top flight players right now. We'd be risking financial losses to admit clubs that would have to be weak."

In making his proposal Selke said that other teams in the league would have to give up established players to the new entries, so it is not difficult to see that he will get a lot of opposition. Apart from the Canadiens there isn't another team in the league that can afford to give away established talent and still look like a major league outfit.

Toronto Leafs, in fact, are so hard up that they have put in a call for an ex-Leaf and Black Hawk great Max Bentley to come up and see. He's now somewhere and Bentley has a 16-year-old son playing hockey. Leafs want him to play in spots. Max would be used on the power play and also serve as a coaching capacity. It will be interesting to see what develops.

Pete Rademacher, whose name—as John Lardner would say—only two years ago used to be followed in conversation by the word "who?", started out his career in reverse, beginning at the top and working his way down. His first heavyweight bout with champion Floyd Patterson led to a bout with contender Zora Foley. Next in line will probably be a non-contender and then exit.

Rumors on the West Coast have Charlie Dressen in line for Walt Alston's job as pilot of the Dodgers and Bobby Bragan is given an outside chance of taking over. General Manager Buzz Bavasi, as all GM's do, denies it. But support from that quarter wouldn't get more than a cynical horselaugh from, say Mayo Smith, Jack Tighe or even Bragan himself.

There should be some keen competition when the Island Amateur Golf Championships swing into the first round at Charlottetown and Summerside tomorrow afternoon. A lot of talent is represented in both the men's and women's divisions. Art MacKenzie of Charlottetown and Blanche Hogg of Summerside are defending champs.

## Argonauts Beat Blue Bombers

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Argonauts, bouncing back from an uninspiring first half, sprang to life with three touchdowns in the final two quarters to defeat Winnipeg Blue Bombers 22-15 in their opening exhibition football game of the season at Varsity Stadium Thursday night.

The Argonauts, who have finished last in the Big Four football league in 1952 and 1953, turned back a strong bid by the Blue Bombers in the dying minutes to hand the 1957 Western champions their second straight exhibition setback. The Bombers lost to Montreal Alouettes 40-7 Tuesday night.

The rebuilt Argos, striving desperately to start the season with a victory before a crowd of 12,584, came from behind three times to win the game in the fourth quarter on their final two touchdowns.

They were down 7-0 at the end of the first quarter, 7-3 at half time and, after going ahead 10-7 in the third, dropped behind 15-10 going into the final quarter.

## Bedard Only Canadian Left In Tennis Competition

Canadian Press Staff Writer VANCOUVER (CP)—Don Fontana of Toronto was eliminated Thursday from men's singles competition at the Canadian tennis championships. He was defeated by a Japanese national champion Kosei Kamo in a bitterly fought four-hour match.

By an odd twist, the only other Canadian still left in competition, defending champion Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., seemed guaranteed a berth in the finals because of the religious beliefs of his scheduled opponent.

Kamo and Fontana fought each point out in their marathon struggle. The Japanese making at most impossible retrieves and then failing to return Fontana's volleys, couldn't make a quick end to it all. For his part, the temperamental Fontana found his serve failing him and was often caught off guard by Kamo's placements.

The final score was 6-1, 6-8, 6-3, 4-6, 9-7.
