pursued by police trucks and motorcycles with sirens roaring. Boumediene's regime, apparently still nervous about possible public reaction to Ben Bella's fall, had banned public events in an effort to ward off trouble.

Communist China, seeking to maintain the influence it had with Ben Bella, sent word to Boumediene of its "total and unconditional support to the Algerian government news service said Ambassador Tseng Tao delivered this message from Premier Chou En-lai who is in Cairo en route to the Asian-African summit meeting which is still presumably scheduled to open June 29.

RELEASE PRISONERS
The council ordered the release of all political prisoners it said had been arbitrarily arrested under Ben Bella. It did not identify them or give their numbers.

There were reports in Algiers that Boumediene was seeking the collaboration of prominent Ben Bella supporters by offering them posts on the new council.

Abdel Aziz Bouteflika, a top Boumediene aide, summoned a meeting of the preparatory committee for the Asian-African conference.

Some governments, including Japan, seemed to have decided not to come to the conference.

Bid To Limit Welfare Spending Sharply Criticized By Ambler

Jack Ambler, executive director of the P.E.I. United Fund, has strongly criticized a city councillor's proposal which would limit welfare spending by the city.

"At a recent city council meeting, finance chairman W. R. MacNeill demanded that a ceiling be put on city welfare spending which, he said, was 'running away.'"

He said the city's two welfare bureaus had spent \$36,338 so far this year, and since the city's share—one-quarter of the funds available to the bureaus—was set at \$10,000, only about \$700 of this was left for the balance of the year.

Speaking Saturday at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Protestant Children's Home, Mr. Ambler charged the councillor's remarks implied "the professional staffs of our welfare agencies have been handing out too much welfare money—in other words, they are incompetent."

ULTIMATE EFFECT
"If we allow this statement to pass without rebuttal, we are in turn agreeing with the statements. How can we then, as a United Fund, parade these same agencies in front of our contributors, during the fall campaign as agencies operating at maximum efficiency with the donated dollars?"

Mr. Ambler said "it would be well for us to go on record with the full story of the ultimate effect" of a program of reduced welfare payments out of city taxes.

"The councillor concerned is either unaware of the ultimate consequences of his suggestions or he has been misinformed," he said.

He said those concerned with the United Fund must make it known they believe in the agency budgeting; that the agencies are making best use of available dollars; that municipal, provincial and federal governments have an obligation to fulfill; and that contributors to the fund also have a part to play.

"The United Fund can play an important role in the development of the social welfare program, 'only if we have men and women in our ranks who are willing to take a stand' on the contentious issues of the day."

COMPLETE PROGRAM
Referring to independent campaigns outside the Fund, Mr. Ambler said they contributed to the lack of sound success of the Fund in establishing "a complete, well planned program of voluntary health and welfare services."

Another factor contributing to this was the lack of a central planning body to co-ordinate various agency programs and research further expansion or elimination of present programs.

New trustees of the Home elected at the meeting were Hon. F. W. Hyndman, Charlottetown; Brig. W. W. Reid, Charlottetown; Rev. Henry Tye, Parkdale; Stanley Maynard, Park Hill; Mrs. Harold Lbard, Kensington; Mrs. Gladys Bent, Charlottetown, and George Laird, Souris.

Re-elected for a further term of three years were Judge W. E. Darby, Summerside, and Mrs. I. A. Horne, Charlottetown.

Mrs. T. E. MacNutt resigned after 23 years on the board, and F. A. Large, QC, chairman, also resigned. The new chairman is to be elected in the future. Chairman of the nominating committee is K. M. Martin, QC. Mr. Large reported there

Mor than 200 delegates registered yesterday at St. Dunstan's University for the 43rd provincial annual convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada.

POLICEWOMAN WINS SALARY
NEW YORK (AP)—A jury has awarded \$3,018 for loss of salary during a maternity leave to a former policewoman who testified she became pregnant under "official orders."

The jury of 10 men and two women deliberated 90 minutes in Brooklyn civil court before returning the verdict in favor of Mrs. Johanna Levin, 35-year-old brunette.

During the trial that began Tuesday, Mrs. Levin testified she was injured in a 1958 accident while on duty. She testified that Dr. Stanley August and two other police surgeons suggested that pregnancy might have a therapeutic effect and ease the pain she complained of in her neck, head and left arm.

"Shortly thereafter, she became pregnant and gave birth to a son. It was not brought out at the trial whether the pregnancy helped ease her pains.
