

9th year of his age, the Right Hon. the Earl of Bute, Viscount and Baron Mount Stuart, and Knight of the most noble order of the garter.

His Lordship had been indisposed for some weeks past. On Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday last, he found himself somewhat better, but the aid of medicine soon failed of its effect, and he languished until Saturday night. His Lordship bore his illness with great composure and resignation, though his disorder produced at times very excessive pain.

He is succeeded in his titles and estates by his eldest son John, Lord Viscount Mountstuart, and Baron Cardiff, in the kingdom of England.

His Lordship's death will occasion a very numerous train of nobility to go into mourning. The family of the late Duke of Kingston, the Ancaster family, the Campbell's, the Lonsdale, the Duke of Northumberland, Lord Macartney, the Duke of Argyle, are all nearly related to his Lordship, who is reported to have died very rich.

In consequence of the refusal of the Archdeacon of Leicester to convene the Clergy upon the subject of the Slave Trade, a remonstrance has been presented to him upon the subject, signed by upwards of 50 reverend names within the Archdeaconry.

As the Slave Trade is now the topic of general conversation, it may not be unacceptable to our readers to inform them that from February the 9th to March the 5th, no fewer than seventy three petitions have been presented to Parliament.

WORCESTER ASSIZES, MARCH 14.

Yesterday the claim of John Taylor Esq. on the Halfshire Hundred, for the destruction of Mosley-Hall by the Birmingham Rioters, was tried before Mr. Justice Grose, and special jury; when after a full hearing, the jury gave a verdict for the sum of 2700 l. 5 s. 4 d. which is just 1139 l. less than Mr. Taylor claimed.

At ten o'clock at night the claim of William Russel, Esq. came on, and it was not determined at four o'clock this morning.

CHARLOTTE TOWN, JUNE 4.

On Sunday morning, the 27th ult. arrived here in eight weeks from the Downs, the Schooner Prosperity, Baker, master—By this vessel, we have received London papers to the 16th of March last, from which we have extracted the preceding articles of intelligence.

The schooner Endeavour, Perry, master, has arrived at Murray-harbour from Antigua, with rum and molasses. When the Endeavour left the West Indies, the British islands were in perfect tranquility, not dreading any commotion among their negroes. Several of the Islands have, however, suffered considerable damage by the rains which have dreadfully inundated

them, and washed off a number of inhabitants.

The Endeavour touched at Marble head on her way to the island, and brought a number of passengers from thence, all expert fishermen—who mean to settle here.

TUESDAY, JUNE 5.

Yesterday being the anniversary of his Majesty's birth, the same was observed here with every mark of fidelity and joy which loyalty could inspire. His Excellency the Lieut. Governor had a Levee, and received the congratulations of the Officers of Government and other Gentlemen on the occasion. The detachment of his Majesty's 21st regiment were drawn up on the parade in the garrison yard, and at one o'clock fired three fine volleys.

At four o'clock his Excellency gave an excellent Entertainment to the Officers of Government, and Gentlemen of the Island, who did not retire till late in the evening, after having convivially quaffed the inspiring Juice in loyal toasts.
