where he died shortly after arriving. The injured are: Mrs. Margaret Carey, Ottawa, Ontario, badly cut; A. Iobson, East Saginaw, Michigan, hip badly sprained; F. H. Priner, Flin, Michigan, hands scalded; W. C. Rosefeldt, Chicago, scorching and toes crushed; M. S. Pennington, assistant freight agent of the Wabash, Cairo and Illinois Railroad, hands scalded and bruised; A. H. Wheeler, Rochester, N. Y., knees sprained and hands scalded; Howard Thomas, St. Paul, Minnesota and Manitoba Railway, scalded about the head and shoulders; W. Robinson, Montreal, injured internally; J. H. Bollaugh and wife, Rockwell City, Ia., badly scalded on the hands and face; H. Badd, Pullman porter, badly burned on the hands and face, and thigh broken; W. W. Page, Chicago, severely broken up. A few others were slightly hurt.

The Times is thoroughly disheartened. From certain noisiness and tubulence of demeanor, of which it had accounts, it hopes for the very worst. On Saturday it only permits itself to make the following comments: It is a significant fact, the connection of which, with the recent trials and revelations in Dublin, is something more than fortuitous, what is called the extreme Irish party in America—the party of Rossa and dynamite—has determined to keep itself in the background at the Irish convention now in session at Philadelphia. We do not suppose for a moment that Rossa and his followers are really prepared to assume a part which they certainly do not possess; but they know when to take such a hint as Mr. Parnell has given them in his telegram addressed to the convention, and they are not wholly impervious to the influence of healthy public opinion in the U. S. That the dynamite faction in America will continue to plot crime in England and Ireland is only what is to be expected, but it is becoming daily more evident that the law in England and Ireland is recovering its power to detect and punish crime, and so long as that is the case, we must be content to leave its transatlantic authors and abettors to the enjoyment of such impunity as America chooses to afford them. Nothing could have pleased the Tory element better than the convention should have fallen into the hands of such men as Rossa, and have ended in a series of resolutions pledging the united efforts of nine millions of American Irishmen to the annihilation of England. It would have justified their policy, and would have demonstrated anew the imbecility of all Liberal legislation. As it is, Parnell's telegram is conceived here to have accomplished almost as much as he could have effected had he been present and, while the landlord class and its sympathizers are greatly disappointed at what has been done, and look forward with dismay to the prospect of prolonged and effective agitation, the public at large is reassured and learns with relief that the dynamite element in Irish affairs can readily be dealt with by the police.

The Catholic Bishop of Northampton who has just returned from Rome has issued an address to the Roman Catholics of Northampton, in which he warns them against being beguiled into favoring the claims of an Atheist to sit in Parliament. Atheism, he says, leads to Socialism. They must, therefore, band together to keep out of Parliament an Atheist, who has no idea of the first principles of legislation, which are based upon the existence of God.

The tenant farmers in England are agitating for tenant rights with a determination and vigor that does them credit. At a very large and representative assemblage of farmers and others interested in the cultivation of the land at Sevenoaks, the following resolution was moved and carried unanimously:—"That no measure of tenant-right will be satisfactory unless it secures full compensation for such of his unexhausted improvements as increase the letting value of his holding, and is sufficient to protect a continuing tenant against an arbitrary rise of rent on those improvements." It was determined to forward it to the Premier.

Lord Wolsley is certainly a clever as well as a successful general. In one of his latest speeches he praises everybody in power, and praise from a successful captain is very pleasant to deal with the question of war in languages which we don't sufficiently striking to reproduce:—"Now that the war is over, it is for us to consider what lessons may be drawn from it. I was reading in a book of proverbs the other day a very interesting one, which illustrates my meaning better, perhaps, than anything I can say. It is a very old proverb, and written in many tongues, namely, 'That one sword keeps another in the scabbard.' (Hear, hear.) A very eminent writer, referring to the proverb, says, 'And so truly there are wiser and manlier words than the puling utterances of our peace societies, who whilst they fancy that they are carrying out the truths of Christianity, seem to mistake its object.' (Cheers.) Surely, in an evil age, when the world is determined to continue in that evil, the man who bares the sword, even though he may be one of those who would fain leave it in the scabbard, yet is prepared to draw it if necessity arises—that man is the man who bears peace. (Cheers.) That is the greatest lesson that is taught us by the recent war. If this nation wishes to enjoy the blessings of peace, it is absolutely necessary that we, as a people and nation, should, at all times, be prepared to sustain the miseries which war may thrust upon us. (Cheers.)

A despatch from Detroit says a freight train on the Grand Trunk Railway ran into a passenger train near Olivet on Friday last. The air brakes on the passenger train did not work properly, and the train stopped. A signal was sent back to the freight train following. For some reason it did not pay attention to the signal, and thundered into the rear of the passenger, shivering two Pullman cars to fragments. Conductor P. J. Wall, Montreal; H. Frye, Duglewood, N. J.; W. Higgin, travelling agent, Detroit, were killed, and ten others were injured, some of it feared fatally. The accident occurred at 2 a. m. The passenger train was an hour late, and the air-brake hose burst after rounding a curve. The Conductor and others attempted to repair the damage, and the rear break man was sent back, but was unable to go far enough to prevent the collision. The shock was great. The "Bay City" Pullman was telescoped and the Montreal car badly damaged. The officials of the road, with physicians and nurses from Battle Creek Sanitarium, were soon at the scene. Howard Frye, superintendent of power on the New York, Western Shore & Buffalo Railway, was taken from the wreck and conveyed to the Sanitarium,
