

N.B. Jockey Wins Twice

FORT ERIE, Ont. (CP)—Ron Turcotte, the precocious 20-year-old apprentice jockey from Grand Valley, N.B., rode the winners of the first two races at Fort Erie Friday afternoon. Turcotte, who scored the first victory of his career Monday, now has registered five wins in four days of racing. He has ridden in only 12 races at the meeting.

Ballydown, winner of the first race, and Rosequeen, winner of the second, were saddled by trainer Gordon Huntley, with whom Turcotte has been associated ever since he made his first appearance on the tracks, in the summer of 1961. Up until this season, he had ridden an exercise boy for Huntley's public stable and he had ridden in only 15 races in 1961.

Ballydown and Rosequeen were heavy favorites and combined for the meeting's smallest daily double of \$3.70. Ballydown paid \$3.70 straight and Rosequeen paid \$5.60.

Turcotte displayed considerable skill and good judgment as Rosequeen as he took the filly in hand when she was outpaced through the first furlong. He permitted the filly to settle down before he went to the outside to win easily by five lengths.

SPECTATOR ROLE HARDER THAN PLAYING

Bert Olmstead to Dress For 3rd Game Sunday

TORONTO (CP)—Bert Olmstead gets back into harness Sunday night after a five-week spectator role he says has been harder than playing.

"I can't stand to watch the action," the veteran Toronto Maple Leaf left winger said Friday.

Leaf coach Punch Imlach has promised that the 13-year veteran of the National Hockey League will be in the lineup at Chicago when Toronto and the Black Hawks meet in the third game of the best-of-seven Stanley Cup final. Leafs will win their third game.

"I watched most of the games on television," said Olmstead. "It's easier on the nerves. It's a way watching is harder than playing. When you're on the ice you don't have time to think." His attention as a spectator was devoted "more to the outcome, not too much to the individual plays."

It will be five weeks to the day Sunday night Olmstead was injured — in Chicago. He cracked a bone in his shoulder when he slammed into the boards in the third period of a game won 2-2 by Toronto.

Olmstead, a tough man on the ice who can be as gentle as a lamb away from the scene of battle, has been practicing a couple of weeks but is uncertain how he'll stand up physically in playoff action.

"I'm as good as I can be for just practising," he said. "But there are different conditions in a game, especially in a final when it's dog-eat-dog."

Olmstead, now 35, is uncertain about his plans for next year.

"I'm going to sit on my tractor for a while in the summer and think about it," he said. He operates a farm at Scepter, Sask.

MISSING LAST YEAR

This is the second straight year that he has missed playoff action. Last season when Leafs were ousted in the semi-final by Detroit Red Wings, Olmstead suffered a knee injury and was out until fifth-and-sixth games.

"I was out for a while in the 1959-60 season. In mid-season the following year he shifted to Montreal Canadiens and stayed there until he joined Toronto four seasons ago.

"His most productive seasons were 1954-55 and 1955-56 when he led the team in goals and assists. In the former season he had 10 goals and 48 assists and in the latter 14 goals and 23 assists.

Olmstead and a handful of other Leafs worked out Friday and the rest of the team skated briefly.

Home Ice Supremacy

TORONTO Maple Leafs are still showing that home ice supremacy in the Stanley Cup playoffs. In the semi-finals with New York Rangers, the Leafs took all four of the games when they played on Maple Leaf Gardens. They continued along the same line when Chicago Black Hawks came into town for the finals. Toronto won the opener 4-1 and took shaded the defending world champions 3-2 in the second.

Tomorrow night in the Windy City the Hawks will try their luck at keeping their home ice streak intact. In the semi-finals with Montreal Canadiens the Hawks won all three games played in Chicago and managed one triumph on the ice of the enemy.

If the home ice pattern kept all through this series, undoubtedly Maple Leafs would be extremely lucky. It would mean that they would clinch the world hockey championship in seven games. However, Toronto would most sooner close this best-of-seven fight in less games and they'd be all the more likely to bring a decision out of Chicago.

SUNDAY night the Hawks of course will be favorites to pick up their first win of these Stanley Cup finals. If this happens they'll be back back in the thick of things and ready to grab the equalizer on Tuesday night.

Chicago fans are reminding us what happened when Hawks and Canadiens met. They were indeed the first two games played on home ice and proceeded to lose the next four to the reigning champions. Follows like Kinky Morgan, Wendell Calderone are trying to convince us that what happened to Toronto will happen to Toronto.

They may be right at that although we just can't see it that way. The Leafs have a strong record in the first two games and will certainly be going all out not to blow this early home lead.
