THE PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD.

Mission Work in Corea.

Some Very Interesting Statistics.

MONROE, Oct. 8.—The Presbyterian Synod has decided to assume mission work in Corea. One of the most strenuous opponents of the scheme was Mr. T. C. James of Charlottetown.

MONROE, Oct. 7.—The first business at last evening's session was the report of the S. S. committee. The report stated that only six presbyteries have reported: Wallace, Lunenburg and Shelburne, Miramichi, Inverness, P. E. Island and Halifax.

Miramichi contains 100 schools of which 71 have reported, teachers enrolled 457, pupils 3528.

Wallace reports 30 schools, 238 teachers and 1963 scholars, raised \$699 for all purposes and \$270 for church schemes.

Halifax sends the most complete report, 103 school, 775 teachers, scholars enrolled 5768.

Comparing the schools as to the amount given to the church schemes, Pictou stands highest, with 22 cents per scholar, then Halifax 20 cents, St. John 19 cents, Lunenburg and Shelburne 18 cents, Wallace 14 cents, P. E. Island 13 cents, Truro 12 cents, Miramichi 8 cents, Inverness 7 cents and Sydney 6 cents.

Total number of schools reported 699, against 615 in the previous year, teachers 3,909, a gain of 228, scholars enrolled 32,881, increase of 2466. Average attendance of teachers 3,249 as against 2,905 and of scholars 21,400 as against 19,830. Number of scholars memorizing scripture 10,340, an advance of 875; committing shorter catechism 16,107, or 1,477 more, repeating the whole catechism, 1187, or 150 more; attending home lesson study 17,590, or 1,658 more; average of scholars attending church 14,917, as against 13,541; number of new communicants 1,777, or 283 more; number of scholars who are communicants 3,236 as against 2,965.

Total amount raised in all schools \$11,254, an increase of \$150; amount expended on schools \$6,609 as against \$4,563; amount contributed to church schemes \$4,470, increase \$365.

Rev. A. L. Geggie, of Truro, read the report of the committee of Young People's Societies. With the exception of one, every Presbytery reported a substantial increase in membership. Very complete reports have been received from all the Presbyteries with the exception of St.

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John, where the failure to report was due to continued illness of the convener. There are 276 societies in the Synod, an increase of 47. Of those 255 are senior organizations, 12 junior associations, 5 missionary societies, 3 literary and 1 Y. P. C. A. P. E. Island reported the largest increase, 11, but the largest proportionate increase was in Lunenburg and Shelburne. The membership is 10,380, of whom 6,606 are classed active and the balance associate. The largest increase in membership is in P. E. Island, 605, total increase throughout the Synod, 1804, which would have been larger but for the failure of St. John to report. The membership consisted of about two-thirds females. Of the membership 5,607 were members of the church and 4,773 not. The financial showing is likewise satisfactory. The increase was \$8,989, an increase of \$1,778. The societies gave \$3,883 to the schemes of the church, an increase of \$1,315; \$1,224 to Home Missions and \$845.29 to Foreign Missions. The contribution to Home Missions was most commendable and it is believed that as a result of the effort of the Young People's Societies the debt will be wiped out. The possibilities of the work of the societies were very great, and the report expressed the hope that before long there would be a Christian Endeavor society in connection with every congregation. The report was adopted along with recommendations.

Seat up for Trial.

TRURO, Oct. 8.—The grand jury yesterday found a true bill against Lyman Dart, charged with the murder of the Armenian peddler, Assard Derar. They were in session several hours and heard a large number of witnesses. Dart will not be tried at this term of the Supreme Court, but probably a special meeting of the court will be held next week for his trial.

Methodist Mission Board.

HALIFAX, Oct. 8.—The annual meeting of the Methodist General board of missions is now being held in this city. At the opening meeting yesterday a proposal was made to send a missionary to the Klondike and referred to a committee.

Double Scull Race.

HALIFAX, Oct. 8.—In the double scull race yesterday the Lynch brothers, of Halifax, won easily over McKay of Dartmouth and Johnson of St. Stephen.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

LONDON, October 6.—The latest returns from Mad-done, Kent, where typhoid fever is raging, show 1,100 cases and 26 deaths. This is an increase of seventy cases since yesterday.

ST. JOHN, October 6.—The Church of England synod at Fredericton today passed a resolution regretting an increase of corruption in elections and calling upon the church and clergy to do all possible to suppress the evil. The resolution was introduced by Dean Partridge, and somewhat modified at the request of Sheriff Sturdee and Judge Hanington. A sharp discussion took place over the motion of Rev. J. Desoyres, asking the synod not to continue the recognition of church schools outside the province. The mover held that as two girls and two boys' schools existed in the diocese, it was not necessary to recommend schools in other dioceses. Judge Hanington and others spoke for Edgemoor school, and after a debate the motion was voted down.

SHERBROOKE, Oct. 6.—A man was killed and eaten by bears near Black Lake, Megantic, recently, according to a correspondent of the Sherbrooke Record. He says that two men had been peeling bark in the woods. One of them went further back in search of another tree. His companion heard him calling a little later, but thought nothing of it for some time. Later when the man did not return, he went in search of him, and his surprise and horror may be imagined when he suddenly came upon two large bears leisurely eating the body of his unfortunate companion, and just finishing their meal, having devoured it as far as the boot legs. The horrified woodsman turned and fled, and later when returned with assistance the bears had departed, leaving only torn clothing and crushed bones to testify to their savage and bloody work.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—A letter was received here from Kikuika, East Africa, which disposed of the story received at Rome from Benadir, saying that the Cavendish porting expedition which left Berbera, East Africa, last year, arriving at Lugh, Somaliland, about the middle of November proceeding thence towards Lake Rudolph, had been attacked by a band of Amharas, who murdered all the members of the expedition, which consisted of two Englishmen and ninety Ascaris. The later news say that Cavendish, who is a nephew of the Duke of Devonshire, and Lieutenant Andrew, his companion, arrived at Kikuika on August 5th, after a trip around Lake Rudolph, which up to that time had not been explored. Cavendish and Andrew had a trying time. Their head man incited the Ascaris to mutiny, and the two Englishmen were forced to yield to their demands. But near Kikuika, Cavendish and Andrew seized the two ringleaders, who have since been sent to the coast for trial. The expedition discovered a new lake, and two active volcanoes, and crossed from the Gulf of Aden to the Zanzibar coast by much the same route as that previously followed by Dr. Donaldson Smith, of Philadelphia.
