Doings in and Around Souris.

Politics are beginning to take a boom. Much speculation is rife about the candidates from the Grit camp for the elections next July, although, it may be considered as settled that, James R. McLean will have for his colleague Mr. Frederick Morrow. Mr. Morrow should run a pretty good ticket, did he not have such powerful antagonists as John McLean, Esq., and Charles McEachen, Esq., late M. P. S. Two more popular gentlemen could not possibly be selected on the Conservative side. Mr. McLean is a successful business man, and can also give a very good account of his stewardship during the last five years in Parliament. It is true the finances of the Province were somewhat low owing no doubt to the absence of taxation, and consequently Mr. McLean could not expend as much money in his district as he would wish, still, the people have no reason to complain, and Mr. McLean's chance for reelection is very good indeed. Mr. McEachen having only enjoyed Legislative honors for so short a time, a faithful estimate of his abilities cannot be well formed, but, however, he is a strong card, and will be a fitting representative of the honest yeomanry of the northern portion of the district. The fact of Mr. McEachen carrying two districts last spring by a handsome majority is "prima facie" evidence of his popularity. Altogether two stronger cards than Messrs. McLean and McEachen could not be chosen.

It is currently reported that Herman McDonald, Esq., of Hermonville, is the probable candidate for the Legislative Council. The electors will manifest their prudence by putting this gentleman forward for election. No more popular man could be selected. Mr. McDonald is well and favorably known within the length and breadth of the Legislative Council district, and his election may be considered certain. There are rumors of several other gentlemen of Souris having a desire for Legislative Council honors, but their good sense should tell them, and their concern for party, that three candidates from Souris Village is quite sufficient, which, after all, makes but a small component part of the district. Perhaps it would be well for the constituents of every electoral district on the Island to try a few more farmers for their representatives in the Legislative Assemblies, and curtail, to some extent, the number of merchants and lawyers of which our Houses of Parliament are principally made up.

The barque William Owen is loading with oats at this port for Plymouth, Eng. She is six hundred tons burthen, and takes 48,000 bushels oats. The ice is still in Souris.

Mr. Brennan, our artist, has in course of completion two other fine paintings of two of our Souris magnates—Mr. F. Morrow and Mr. Boyser. The work on these paintings is highly creditable to Mr. Brennan, and would be fair for an artist of much higher aspirations.

New Glasgow Notes.

Mr. Lamont has commenced work on the Bridge at this place, and we may expect a safe structure in a short time.

Farmers are very busy, taking advantage of the beautiful weather for putting in crops.

The temperance organizations here are doing good work. The anniversary of the Division was celebrated in April last by a most successful entertainment. Great preparations are now being made to celebrate the birth of Clyde Council by a grand Concert on the 8th of June. The musical portion are fully alive to their work, being determined to make it a first-class entertainment.

An Electrical Submarine Vessel.

Some satisfactory trials have recently been made at Liverpool with a new electrical submarine vessel, the invention of Mr. J. F. Waddington of Birkenhead. The vessel, which is cigar shaped, is thirty-seven feet long and six feet in diameter at the centre, tapering off to the ends, which are pointed. A conning tower is mounted on the top of the boat, and her depth of immersion below the water surface is regulated by external inclined planes carried one on either side, and controlled from within. She is fitted with a rudder placed aft, and has a self-acting arrangement for preserving her horizontal position.

The crew consists of two men, and there is a supply of compressed air for their use when the boat remains submerged for a lengthened period. The motive power is electricity, which is stored on board in fifty of the Electrical Power and Storage Company cells. These drive a screw propeller, and it is stated that their charge is sufficient to propel the boat for ten hours at a speed of about nine miles per hour, either below the water or on its surface. The cells also supply light through glow lamps, and drive a pump for emptying the water-ballast tanks, which are filled for submerging the boat. A trial of the vessel in the presence of representatives of the Admiralty is stated to have elicited their approval.

Fatal Family Quarrel.

In Apple Grove, twenty miles below Point Pleasant, W. Va., Mrs. Jas. Guerin and her sister, Mrs. Thomas, are widows, each having a large number of children. The children quarrelled over the ownership of a step-ladder, and Mrs. Thomas carried the ladder home. Her nephew, Jimmie Guerin, aged 19, struck her on the head with a stone, the woman soon dying. Mrs. Thomas' daughter Eliza, aged 15, secured a gun, and firing upon her cousin, the boy murdered her mother, riddled him with shot, he also dying in a few moments. The girl had been arrested.

Alfonso XIII.

It is reported that Queen Christina of Spain has overruled the objections of her cabinet and named her son Alfonso. The position the ministry had taken was on the ground of the traditions of ill luck which attach to the No. 13. The boy, therefore, will be Alfonso XIII., but he will bear also the name of Leon, which will be bestowed in gratitude to the Pope, who has been so steady a friend of the ruling house of Spain, and who, by the way, is himself a XIII.

North British and Mercantile Insurance Company.

[From Edinburgh "Scotsman," 29th April, 1886.]

The annual general meeting of this Company was held in the Royal Hotel, Edinburgh, to-day, Mr. David Davidson, chairman, presiding. The report for the year, which closed on the 31st December last, stated with reference to fire business:—In 1884 the premiums received amounted to £1,428,830 8s. 7d.; deduct re-insurances, £414,761 12s. 7d.—£1,014,068 13s. During 1885 the premiums received amounted to £1,430,143 16s. 3d.; deduct re-insurances, £281,633 1s. 11d.; net premiums, £1,148,510 14s. 4d.—increase of net premiums, £34,442 1s. 4d. The net losses by fire have amounted to the sum of £615,228 11s. 5d., which include a full estimate of all claims that arose prior to 31st December, 1885. After setting aside, as formerly, one-third of the net premiums of the year to provide for liabilities on current policies, the balance of the credit of profit and loss account for 1885, including the unappropriated balance of £55,939 6s. 2d. brought forward from 1884, amounts to £303,429 6s. 11d. In regard to the life business, the report said:—During the year 1885 there were issued 1,099 policies, assuring £895,290, the premiums on which amount to £32,756 11s. 3d. The net amount insured in 1885, after deducting sums reinsured was £754,000; and the net amount insured in 1884 was £749,562, and the net premiums were £27,371 3s. 4d. There was thus an increase in the net business in 1885 over that of 1884 of £5,038 in the sums assured, but a decrease of £209 0s. 7d. in the net premiums. The income of the life branch from premiums and interest for the year amounted to £520,612 1s. 3d. The life assurance fund amounted at 31st December, 1885, to £3,592,628 1s. 8d., being an increase during the year of £124,032 2s. 11d. The directors recommended that there be appropriated to provide the balance necessary to meet pensions to present clerks the sum of £12,500; that a dividend of 20s per share, and a bonus of 20s per share, be declared; that £80,000 be added to the reserve, thereby increasing it to the sum of £1,250,000; leaving a sum of £53,621 5s. 4d. to be carried forward. The divisible fund of the quinquennial was £396,919 4s. 3d., one-tenth of which, or £39,691 18s. 5d., fell to the shareholders. James Schroder, deputy chairman, moved the adoption of the report. He said that the business of the company was second to none in the world. If they dissected the business and compared it with the business of other companies, they would find that, although in certain quarters other companies might have a larger business, yet taking it as a whole, there was no business so large as the North British and Mercantile all over the world. (Applause.) The last year had been an exceptionally successful one, and at no quinquennial period had they given such a large dividend and bonus. Mr. George Auldjo Jamieson, C. A., seconded the adoption of the report. He referred at some length to the continued prosperity of the company, which he showed from comparisons with the results of previous years. He said he did not see any reason why their present prosperous condition should not be exceeded at another quinquennial period, and it was a matter of great satisfaction to the directors that, while they had redeemed every hope for the present, they had laid the foundations, he explained, of still brighter hopes for the future. The retiring directors and the auditors were re-elected. Mr. William Mitchell, S. S. C., gave notice of motion for next meeting to the effect that one of the shareholders' auditors should retire every third year, and be ineligible for three years afterwards. Thanks were awarded to the directors, the officials and agents of the company, and also to the chairman.

Boston Markets.

POTATOES.—The market is steadier, but the supply of most kinds continues liberal and no higher prices can be obtained. Eastern Hebrons are scarce and command 65c; but Northern rule much lower. Houlton Rose are selling at 60c, and Northern Rose at 50 to 55c; P. E. Island Chenangoes are firmer and some are held at 50c, but sales have been mostly at 45c.

FISH.—Trade not increased much the past week, and prices are without material change.

EGGS.—Eastern extras have not been so plentiful for the past few days, and 12½c has been more readily obtained, while some are held at 13c., but other kinds are plentiful enough and prices continue low. P. E. Island firsts are worth from 11½ to 12 cents per dozen.

A Murderer's Confession.

A Grand Forks special says:—In 1882 the body of a man named McKenzie was found in the stall of a vicious stallion with the top of his head eaten off and the stall bespattered with blood. It was decided that the stallion had killed him. A former resident of St. Paul named May has just died in Canada, leaving a written confession that he murdered McKenzie and threw him into the stall, and that McKenzie was the third person he had murdered and thus disposed of.
