Arabi's Divided Defence.

He was Directed by Sultan and Khedive.

ALEXANDRIA, Oct. 30.

Arabi Pasha, by the advice of his counsel, Mr. Broadley, has divided his defence into two periods. The first period is before the war, and the last after July 10th. He claims that his first yearlike attitude was directed by orders of the Khedive of Egypt, and his opposition to the English forces on the field was given by the command of the Sultan.

Wolesley's Arrival.

More serious floods have taken place in Tyrol. They are more disastrous than those which occurred a few days ago. The damage by those of the 29th, is estimated at fifteen millions of florins.

SERIOUS FIRE AT FALL RIVER.

BOSTON, Oct. 30.

The Flint Mills at Fall River, Mass., were totally consumed by fire last evening. Over five hundred hands were employed, and the annual production was 137,000,000 pieces print cloth. The loss to the owners is estimated at \$300,000.

The Great Walk—Fitzgerald Wins.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.

The six days walking match at Madison Square Gardens in this city, concluded last midnight, was won by Patrick Fitzgerald, formerly of Montreal. He completed a walk of five hundred and seventy-seven miles.

Heavy Fire in Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 30.

A very heavy fire took place in this city yesterday. The block containing the offices of the Bank of Montreal and the offices of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was completely destroyed. The Chief Engineer's papers were saved. The loss is estimated at over \$10,000.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

PARIS, Oct. 27.

Friends of the government now admit that the immense number of threatening letters which passed through the post-offices at Montreuil, Les Mines, Chalons and Lyons are the work of practical jokers and enemies of the republic, who wish to raise a scare.

VIENNA, Oct. 27.

Among the persons arrested at Odessa was a student who had in his possession many Nihilist manifestoes. Agrarian disturbances have occurred in the Government of Volynia. A priest has been murdered for distributing an imperial proclamation in regard to the Agrarian question.

PARIS, Oct. 27.

The *Republique* says there exists in France a sect resembling the Russian Nihilists, and Irish Fenians, but the situation is less alarming than in either Russia or Ireland, as the anarchists here are a mere handful.

LONDON, Oct. 27.

An amendment, offered by Stoker and accepted by the government, that a question must have been adequately discussed before disclosure is pronounced, was adopted. Debate adjourned.

CAIRO, Oct. 28.

Minutes of the Council, held before the war, have been found among Arabi Pasha's papers. They show that the cabinet, at a meeting at which Dervish Pasha, the Turkish commissioner, was present, decided to meet the British with armed resistance. Borelli Bey, public prosecutor, states that the massacres at Tantah began at the moment when Abdallah Pasha's aid-camp appeared on the scene, and declared that annihilation of Christians would be in accordance with Arabi Pasha's wishes. This assertion is made on the evidence of six inhabitants of Tantah.

CAIRO, Oct. 27.

Among the documents belonging to Arabi in the possession of the authorities is a letter from the Sultan's religious adviser to Arabi, seriously implicating the Sultan in the course Arabi pursued.

LONDON, Oct. 27.

The *Times* Cairo correspondent telegraphs that it is believed that Professor Palmer and party were led to the edge of a precipice and offered the alternative of throwing themselves over or being shot. It is supposed that Palmer leaped over, and that Captain Gill and Lieut. Charrington choose the other alternative and were put to death.

CAIRO, Oct. 27.

Abdallah Pasha, Ali Fehme Pasha, and Abdul Pasha corroborate the report of the ill-treatment of the rebel prisoners. Six were beaten with slippers and spat upon. Arabi has delivered to Mr. Broadley, his counsel, a statement of the indignities inflicted upon him. Broadley has instituted proceedings against the chief actors in these outrages.

LONDON, Oct. 27.

Sir Henry Gore Booth's yacht "Kara," one of the vessels which went to the Arctic in search of Leigh Smith and party, has been wrecked while on the way from Hartlepool to Wrenhoe, England. Crew saved.

CAMANGO, Mexico, Oct. 27.

Reports from Mexico give the total cases of fever during the epidemic at 1000 deaths, 324 cases now under treatment and 450 recovered. There have been 150 deaths at Camango since the disease appeared.

LONDON, Oct. 27.

Davitt speaking at Greenock last night announced his intention of visiting the highlands and island of Skye, to become acquainted with the case of the Crofters. He denied that anybody connected with the Land League had anything to do with the action of tenant farmers in the highlands.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.

Rowell said that he would not enter another race.

Corporations, and of the President, Directors,
