**Take Care of Health.**

Comparatively few people take really good  
care of the health. The rule is to take care of  
the body after it has shown signs of decay, or  
has really broken down. That which we do  
not possess cannot be taken care of. Health  
preservation is having a good, healthy body  
and keeping it so. President Bateman, of  
Knox College, used the first chapel service at  
the opening of the college session this fall in  
giving the students some wholesome counsel.  
His first point was concerning the health.  
"First of all," says he, "take care of your  
health. You cannot study well without good  
health. Sleep as much as you need. You  
cannot have good health without sleep. If you  
are up late at night you cannot keep your  
body and mind in good condition for work."  
This is as good advice for other people as it is  
for students. The young man who extends his  
evenings of pleasure far into the night will  
be the listless clerk at the counter, the care-  
less accountant in the office, and the slow work-  
man at the bench on the succeeding days.  
This is true in nine cases out of ten. The  
body must have rest or the penalty must be  
paid sooner or later in a weakened constitu-  
tion, with the sure accompaniment of incapacity  
for service. It should also be kept in  
mind that the physical effects, leaving out the  
effects of dissipation, of a failure to care for  
the health are nearly, if not quite, as disas-  
trous to the individual in any honorable oc-  
cupations as they are to the flippant devotee  
of public amusements and fashionable pleasures.  
Temperance, in the most inclusive  
meaning of the word, is the safeguard of  
bodily strength. Overwork is often little more  
than a lack of regulation in performing what  
seems an allotted share of service. With a  
body that is refreshed by proper rest, and with  
the head to plan the work, a tremendous  
amount can be accomplished. Both mind and  
body will be strengthened by hard work if the  
laws of health are known and faithfully obeyed.

**Brandy in the Pudding.**  
A bridal party was visiting at our house,  
and one day after dinner the temperance  
question was introduced. After a free  
discussion I turned to the brother of the  
bride (a young man had not previously  
known) and said: "Of course you are a  
temperate young man?" I shall never for-  
get the look he gave me as he replied: "If  
you had asked me that question yesterday  
morning I would have answered you em-  
phatically, Yes, I am a temperate young  
man; but to-day I cannot say it."  
I eagerly asked for an explanation, and  
having my promise not to be offended, he  
frankly gave me the following statement:  
"Early in boyhood I discovered I had  
an appetite for strong drink. I secretly  
sought opportunities for its indulgence, and  
when seventeen years of age found myself  
in a fair way to become a confirmed in-  
ebriate. About that time I was converted,  
and through grace was enabled to keep a  
victory over the appetite, although the  
struggle was a long and hard one. I signed  
the pledge, and for four years had faith-  
fully kept it, and had flattered myself that  
the appetite had been eradicated; but,  
while visiting here, the brandy in your  
mince pies has been a source of growing  
temptation, and yesterday when I  
tasted the brandy sauce on your  
pump pudding it proved too much.  
You will remember I hastily excused  
myself, and in less than twenty minutes  
after leaving your house I was under the  
influence of liquor. You will also remem-  
ber that I did not return until some time  
in the evening, and by way of explanation,  
said I had a severe headache, and went  
immediately to my room. I was actually  
too intoxicated to trust myself in the  
parlor."  
This occurred about twenty-five years  
ago, and up to that time I do not remember  
ever to have heard a word offered against  
the use of brandy for culinary purposes,  
and being an earnest Christian woman  
would have resented the question, had I  
been asked if I was "a temperance  
woman!"  
The answer that young man gave me was  
a bitter revelation, and with a truly peni-  
tent heart I begged him to forgive my  
criminal thoughtlessness, and falling upon  
my knees I promised God never again to  
disgrace my table with the accursed poison;  
and then, amid our tears and sobs, the  
young man was persuaded to reconsecrate  
himself to God and to his pledge, and  
before we arose, God gave me the evidence  
that no farther fruit should follow the fear-  
ful mistake I had so thoughtlessly made.  
From that time the young man was truly  
saved.

**News Notes.**  
China is about to send a commission to  
Russia to negotiate a Russo-Chinese com-  
mercial treaty.  
Several severe earthquake shocks have  
been felt at Guadalajara, Mexico, during  
the past two days.  
Owing to a strike of printers all the  
newspapers of Vancouver have suspended  
publication temporarily.  
The grape harvest in Essex county, Ont., has  
been phenomenal. About 1,500 tons were  
shipped and 1,000 tons made into wine.  
Serious riots continue in the Island of  
Crete, owing to the antipathy of the in-  
habitants to the Turkish troops stationed  
there.  
It is reported from Buenos Ayres that  
the Argentine Government intends to order  
a cruiser to watch the movements of Scotch  
steam whalers, and to prevent them from  
killing fur seals or sea elephants in Argentinian  
waters.  
Truth says the recent troubles in the  
Horse Guards were due to the ill-judgment  
of the officers. It is the officers who will  
suffer most by the change of quarters from  
London to Shorncliffe. The punishment may  
fit the crime better than outsiders  
imagined.

It is only a fortnight since six men were  
shot at Coffeyville during the Dalton gang's  
raid on the banks of that town. Now,  
from Boise City, comes the report of the  
shooting to death of six and the hanging of  
two wounded horse thieves. The dime  
novel writer will have to stimulate his  
gory imagination if he wants to keep his  
Western fiction up with the procession of  
Western fact these days.  
The indications in the London money  
market are towards higher rates. Money  
on the street has at last risen as high as  
two per cent again, a figure it has not  
reached for some time back, and as the Bank  
of England has been losing in its daily  
balances of late, showing this week a decline  
of \$265,000, it cannot be long before an  
advance in the Bank rate takes place. The  
regular sources of information do not  
record a change so far, but by a press des-  
patch it is stated that the rate has been  
advanced to three per cent.

The law of Denmark now gives to every  
Danish subject, man or woman, the right  
to a pension at 60 years of age, except in  
cases of convicted criminals, or those who  
have fraudulently made over their property  
to relatives, of those who have brought  
themselves to distress by extravagance, or  
who have during the preceding ten years  
received relief from the parish, or who  
have been convicted of mendacity. The  
parish examines each case and reports the  
amount of relief to be granted. It may be  
withheld if the beneficiary becomes inelig-  
ible through misconduct or improper ex-  
penditure of his pension, or if he marries.  
The state contributes half the expense of  
the parish in distributing relief provided  
the expenditure does not exceed \$270,000  
each year from '91 to '95, and \$550,000 in  
subsequent years. There is no appeal from  
the decision of the parish authorities.

Mr. Andrew Carnegie presented the town  
of Ayr with \$50,000 to establish a public  
library. On October 5 Mrs. Carnegie laid  
the cornerstone of the new institution, and  
later in the day Mr. Carnegie himself was  
present with the freedom of the burgh.  
He made a speech on the occasion, in  
which he said he was more strongly bound  
than ever to devote the remaining years  
of his life less and less to ends that end  
with self and more and more to the service  
of others, by using his surplus wealth and  
spare time in the manner which seemed  
most likely to produce the greatest good to  
the masses of the people, from whom the  
surplus wealth comes to men, only to pass  
through their hands as administrators. He  
said his sympathy, however, was mainly  
with those who by their own exertions  
manage to keep their heads proudly above  
water—not the submerged, but "the swim-  
ming tenth." We ought, he said, to grasp  
with outstretched hand and help upward  
the man who desires to climb, and endeavor  
to implant in those who lack in this pre-  
cious ambition. It is evident that Mr. Car-  
negie has overlooked his Homestead work-

above water.

AT HALIFAX—The annual mobilization  
of the imperial forces took place at Halifax  
on Friday. The infantry marched a num-  
ber of posts in a line of defence against the  
attack upon Halifax, by land, of an imagin-  
ary foe. The forts in the harbor and its  
approaches were in charge of the artillery.  
A torpedo boat that attempted to enter the  
harbor at night under cover of darkness  
was discovered with the aid of powerful  
search lights, and brought within range of  
the big guns in the forts. The authorities  
are satisfied as the result of the manoeuvres  
that it would be impossible for an enemy to  
effect an entrance to the harbor by night,  
or without a severe overhauling by day.
