LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Grain That Does Not Rust.

SIR,—The *Island Farmer* of the 12th has
a letter from Jas. D. Dewar, Esq., of Mont-
ague, in which he gives an account of some
"Democrat" wheat which he has grown,
and which he says was untouched by rust,
in the same field and circumstances where
White Russian was hadly rusted. He
wishes to know the reason of this.

There have been several kinds of wheat
which, when first introduced here, have
been noted for withstanding rust. The old
red Mediterranean was one of them, and I
think by the Reports that it is yet considered
rust-proof in some parts of the United
States. These varieties appear to be vigor-
ous growers, with thick cuticles. This
latter quality enables them to withstand
the rust parasite.

I have examined stalks of white oats,
from a badly rusted field, which themselves
had escaped uninjured. These stalks were
bright and clean; but with the microscope
it could be seen that the rust spores had
fastened on them and had germinated un-
der the cuticle, but the *hyphae* were unable
to burst their way through the strong
cuticle to the air, and consequently could
not develop. In fact, the vigorous grain
stalk was strong enough to smother its at-
tacking parasite and prevent its growth.
