RENDERS THEM BLIND.

Peculiar Outbreak of Disease Among Cattle in Frontenac.

Kingston, Ont., August 1.—The farmers in the vicinity of Elginburg have become greatly alarmed at a mysterious disease which has made its appearance among the young cattle in that vicinity. The disease attacks the cows in the eyes, which bulge out, after which they go blind. The disease is not confined to cows, several horses, and even chickens, having been affected.

Dr. Bell, V. S., says that the comparatively new disease may appear in an enzootic or epizootic form. As it appears in the county of Frontenac, cattle are attacked at all ages, but the dairy cows seem to suffer most. The disease is most prevalent in the hot and dry summer months, but it may appear at any time in the year. The doctor said he knew of sheep that suffered from the disease last winter, and five or six of the flock went blind. The inflammation was so severe that the eyeballs in some instances burst. Whether the disease is due to micro-organisms is not certain. There is no doubt, however, that it is due to microbes from some source, and that it is contagious. The first Dr. Bell saw of the disease was while in Pennsylvania, about five years ago. He also saw cases in Rochester, N. Y., last summer, and has seen some within the last two weeks in two or three counties. Cattle may have more than one attack, and in this event they are certain to go blind.

WHERE WAS SHE GONE?

Mysterious Disappearance of a Well-known Russian Lady.

An extraordinary story from St. Petersburg published in a London paper says: A lady high in court and bearing a respected name in Russia has disappeared; her husband has been informed by the police that she will not return and that he is at liberty to let her apartments to another. The servants' wages and the rent have also been paid by the police. What has become of her will doubtless remain a mystery to her friends for all time, but in the woman's tragic disappearance is revealed the secret of the Czar's long illness. The Berlin and Vienna papers declare that a plot was hatched in the palace of Count Zassoff, a chamberlain of the czar, whose wife was lady in waiting to the czar, to poison the Imperial couple. This was in revenge because a relative, Col. Terwosky who had been detected stealing military funds, had been disgraced and compelled to resign. The beautiful Countess Ilka, wife of Count Znanoff, then tried to murder both the czar and czarina by slow poison. She failed to reach the czar, but his wife was not so fortunate.

FRANCE IS INTERESTED.

But Her Relations are now Quite Friendly.

PARIS, August 1.—From a semi-official source the following statement was made: "From a commercial point of view, France is as much interested in American as Spanish trade and consequently she has no reason to jeopardize her friendly relations with the United States. Still she feels sympathy for her unfortunate neighbor and rejoices heartily at the fact that peace is to be arranged and that the French ambassador, M. Cambon, has been the messenger of peace sent by Spain to America."

"As to the terms upon which peace will be arranged, the French government and public opinion in France are perfectly aware that the United States will no longer be satisfied with a mere independence of Cuba, considering that the war has cost her considerable sacrifices. Consequently, the French press, especially the Journal Des Debats and the Temps, are ready taking into account that important element in the settlement of peace. They only hope that America will not claim too much. Not that France feels envious in view of the increasing power of the United States, but simply because too onerous conditions on the part of America would make peace difficult."

"In fact it deserves to be pointed out that France does not make any objection to the United States increasing either its strength or its dominions. "The reason for the quiet feeling of France in this matter is that she is convinced that if such an increase in any way threatens any European power she is not that power. Even the annexation of Hawaii, which gives to the United States an important position in the Pacific ocean, has not disturbed France in the slightest degree, her possessions in America being small and unimportant, consisting of some little islands, and French Guiana."

"As to the Philippines, if these islands are to be lost to Spain, France as the ruler of Indo-China, would probably prefer having the Americans as next door neighbors instead of any European or Asiatic power. Consequently, what France wants, so far as the United States are concerned, is only a proper consideration of her commercial interests."

Military Courage.

The question of the comparative proportion of really brave men in any army will probably never be determined. Great officers on the continent keep their knowledge on that subject rigorously as a professional secret and assume as a certainty that all soldiers are brave. They know very well, however, that they are not, and when confidential will admit, as Marshal von Moltke once did in public, that with a great number it takes discipline, and severe discipline, too, to induce them to face shells unshrinkingly. American officers have been known to acknowledge that of their men, who are as brave as any in the world, 20 per cent would run away if they could, and in every army, even ours, which a man enters only of free will, there is a certain proportion who literally cannot overcome their fears. They are stricken with a sort of paralysis. The proportion is probably not high in any army, the majority, if in health, being able to do their duty and having intense motives to do it, but neither is the proportion high of those who literally feel no fear.—London Spectator.

A Cyclists' Paradise.

Cyclists in rural France are well catered for in delightful little country cafes, with open air tables often set in an arbor of evergreens. A franc and a half or two will get you a perfection of an omelet, a plate of stewed wild rabbit, soft cheese, wine and black coffee, and for an extra 4 sous or so the waitress, if the wheelman is ungallant enough to let her do it, will inflate his tires, the merest "marchand de vins" being nowadays the proud possessor of a standard pump.—Caterer.

CLOTHING DURING SLEEP.

While Asleep it is Necessary to be Well Covered.

The reason it is necessary to be well covered while sleeping is that when the body lies down it is the intention of nature that it should rest, and the heart especially should be relieved of its regular work temporarily. So that organs make ten strokes a minute less than when the body is in an upright posture. This means 600 strokes in sixty minutes. Therefore in the eight hours a man usually spends in taking his night's rest, the heart is saved nearly 5,000 strokes. As it pumps six ounces of blood with each stroke, it lifts 30,000 strokes ounces less of blood in this night's session that it would during the day, when a man is usually in an upright position. Now, the body is dependent for its warmth on the vigor of the circulation, and as the blood flows so much more slowly through the veins when one is lying down, the warmth lost in the reduced circulation must be supplied by extra covering.—Evening Wisconsin.

It is curious in how many forms the 100 crops up of reviving the old "blue laws" which are usually referred to as foolish attempts to make people good by act of Parliament. 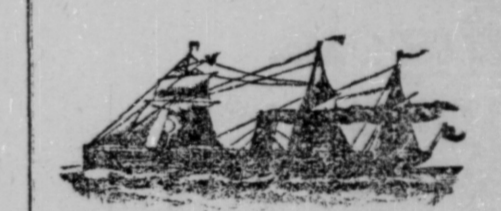
