FINANCIAL RESULT OF YEAR 1899.

By referring to the Income Account you will observe that the receipts for the year 1899 are in excess of all expenditure by \$5,619.99 which added to the uncollected Civic Taxes of 1899, \$262.60, makes a gain to the City for the year of \$5,882.59, and deducting the unpaid accounts for 1899, \$1,880.00, there is a balance of \$4,002.59 in favor of the City in the year's transactions which is placed to the credit of Capital Account.

Local and Other Items.

GREAT BRITAIN'S REVENUE. The public revenue of Great Britain for the nine months ending December reaches £32,777,844 as against 78,404,668 for the corresponding period of last year.

LAST GREAT WAR.—The last great war of the world, that between Russia and Turkey, cost altogether £190,000,000 and 180,000 lives, of which Russia paid £133,000,000 and 110,000 lives.

PAPERS AMALGAMATED.—Two papers in Sydney—the Daily Record and the Island Reporter—have amalgamated; the former appearing daily as usual, and the latter appearing as the weekly edition.

KNOWS WHERE TO COME.—The Cariboo correspondent of the Picou Advocate says: We are told that Mr. Daniel Fraser has sold one of his heavy teams of horses, and has gone to P. E. Island for another team. Dan is bound to have a good team.

THEY WANTED A CHANGE.—Histories of England, which furnished supplementary reading for the seventh and eighth grades in Chicago public schools, have been thrown out by the school management committee board of education, and the directors ordered to recommend books on English history which would not contain any reference to England as the "mother country."

SALVATION ARMY WORK.—The annual report of the British Salvation Army, deal with its "Darkest England scheme," has been issued. The accounts show a turnover of £187,000. It seems that the Army has 460 institutions engaged in social work, and it is reckoned that every day some 20,000 destitute men and women are touched by their work. No less than 16,000 homeless wretches find shelter every night under a salvation Army roof; 400 ex-criminals are now in their "homes," and over 5,000 are gathered every year from the streets into their rescue homes, while at the farm colony in Essex quite a large community of waifs and stragglers are working out their social and moral redemption. General Booth appeals for £27,000 to carry on all this work in the year.

JANUARY MAGAZINES.

THE CANADIAN.

An unusually large number of illustrations grace the number of the Canadian Magazine which opens the new year. These include several full page military pictures, a number of photographs taken in and about Canterbury Cathedral, at the Henley Regatta last year, and in and about Constantinople. The articles which these illustrations accompany are brightly written. The opening contribution is a charming story of the North-West by W. A. Fraser, the Canadian Kipling. The Hon. J. W. Longley contributes a Nova Scotian story. Robert Barr's strictures on Canadians as book-buyers are replied to by the six prize whom he scored for placing Dickens before Thackeray. C. A. Bramble, in his series on the Big Game of Canada, writes of the wapiti and antelope, and Arthur Reming contributes a drawing of a Manitoba wapiti or elk. Ernest H. Cooper deals with "The Principles Underlying the Trust," and Bleasell Cameron tells why he believes that the Red India will soon be exterminated in Canada.

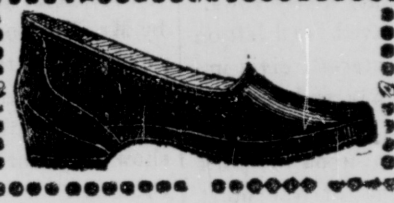

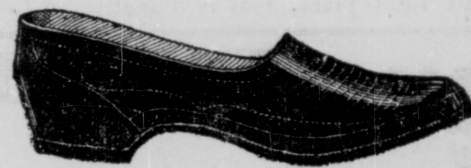

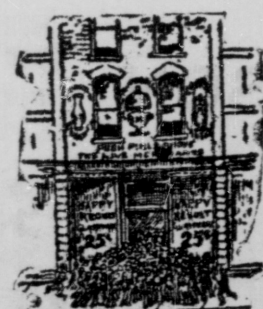
