Stollery Outlasts Doucet To Gain Playoff Berth

BRANTFORD, Ont. (CP) — Gordon Stollery of Toronto sank a 25-foot birdie putt on the first extra hole to defeat Doran Doucet of Windsor Mills, Que., in the semi-finals of the Canadian junior golf championship Friday.

Stollery meets Ian Thomas of London, Ont., a member of the winning Ontario team in the interprovincial matches here earlier this week, in today's 36-hole final over the 6,537-yard Brantford Golf and Country Club course.

Thomas defeated the tournament's second low qualifier, Peter Turner of Toronto, 5 and 4 Friday. For Stollery, it was his second 19-hole match of the day. He eliminated Terry More of Winnipeg on the first extra hole in the morning quarter-final. He held a two-hole lead going into the 17th against Doucet, but missed a three-foot putt to lose that hole and dropped the 18th when he hit into the trees.

Feature Race Goes Monday

Motor sport has caught the fancy of Island sport fans this summer in the form of "stock-car" racing. The sport which has been dormant in the Garden of The Gulf has climbed to a lofty position in the interests of sports minded Islanders and tourists.

There are those who maintain that "stock-car" racing isn't sport, but we fail to agree with them, as auto racing in the form of the "Indianapolis 500" and other big meets ranks right there with the top professional sports that we have access to in North America.

The meets staged at the respective Island "stock car" tracks do not start to compare with the top meets on the continent, but these tracks have been drawing approximately 3,000 people as an average attendance figure.

Officials of the Covehead raceway have a big meet planned for the Covehead track this Monday afternoon. Officials of the meet told us they hope this will be the climax of a most successful season for all Island tracks.

The program will commence Monday morning at 11 o'clock with a parade of entries. The respective classes are open to any racing driver wishing to pilot any type of stock car in the competition.

There will be \$1,000 in prizes up for grabs when the flag goes down at the Covehead raceway Monday afternoon. There will be six different classes with the respective cars attempting to qualify for the feature event.

The top four drivers in each class will qualify for the feature event. Monday's meet is expected to produce the fastest stock-car races this year and auto racing fans can be sure there will be plenty of thrills and spills in store for them at the Covehead raceway.

As an added attraction on the program there will be a "Powder Puff" race which will feature female drivers. Approximately 15 cars are expected to take part and any women wishing to test her skill (or lack of it) on the stock-car track is invited to enter.

Two of the male drivers to keep an eye on in this program will be Fred Smith and Bob Beer. These two gentlemen have spent considerable time in the winners circle to date this season and they will be going all out in Monday's competition.
