S'side Council Approves Paving, Patching Program

A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held early last evening to approve seven resolutions dealing with paving, re-surfacing, patching and seal-coating various town streets at a cost of over \$40,000.

Before the resolutions were read, it was pointed out by His Worship Mayor W.A. Currie that the expenditures are within the budget and the town would still be maintaining their pay-as-you-go policy.

Streets approved for asphalt paving are: Lidstone Street from Beattie Avenue to Schurman Avenue at a cost of \$4,144; Harvard Street from the railway tracks to East Street at a cost of \$10,531; Hawthorne Avenue for a distance of 950 feet at a cost of \$10,539; Schurman Avenue, from Summer to Grandville Street at a cost of \$7,326.

Removing old curbs and replacing with new, catch basin and sewer construction work is involved in above projects.

For re-surfacing: Convert

Street from Central to Grandville; Spring Street, from Notre Dame to Winter and Fitzroy to First; Fitzroy Street, from Spring to Eustane; First Street from Cedar to Water; Foundry Street from Spring to Fire Hall, a total cost of \$7,348.

For patching: Beaver Street, Pleasant Street, Belmont Street, Cambridge Street, Grandville at Notre Dame, Milton Ave, Notre Dame at Cedar, Eustane St., First St., Cedar St. Total cost \$2,750.

For seal-coating: North Market St., from Cedar to Central; Beaver St., from Duke to Central; Pleasant St., from Summer to Spring; Belmont St., from Russell to Eustane; Cambridge St., from Grandville to Russell.

Coun. W.E. MacCausland asked why asphalt was being used instead of concrete as asphalt paving has been found to be very expensive to repair, stating that in the past four or five years it has cost the town approximately \$100,000 to repair asphalt streets.

Coun. Lea Wood, chairman of the street committee said the streets being paved don't have too much traffic and hat the asphalt is much cheaper.

Coun. Dr. H.E. Clark, who is also on the committee, stated that he would like to see cement used but the cost is much higher and that people residing on these streets in need of paving can't be

asked to await another five years which would be necessary if cement pavement was laid, due to the cost involved.

Coun. Clark added the committee hadn't recommended all of the streets they would like to see paved this year, but that an attempt was made to serve the three wards at a cost of roughly \$10,000 per ward. He stated that in recommending these streets it was felt that these were the streets that needed attention this year.

Mayor Currie thanked the committee, whose third member was Coun. R.B. Dewar, for their thorough work in regard to present paving needs and capital expenditures. (Patching comes under current expenditures.)

Curran and Briggs Ltd., have been awarded the contracts.

A 192-pound halibut was caught by Gerald Grant and Clifford Vincent yesterday while jigging for cod out of Tignish harbour.

Last week a smaller halibut weighing about a hundred pounds was brought in by George Doucette. Fish of this size put up quite a battle before being hoisted and both of these provided plenty of excitement for the cod fishermen.

The trick is to get them close enough to the boat to be able to make use of several additional hooks. Although not common in these waters one or two halibut are caught almost every year in Tignish. A 229 pounder was brought in by Jimmy and Arnold Gaudet in 1955. Yesterday's tasty fish was distributed to the markets in Tignish and Alberton.

PM Withdraws Condition In Invitation To Summit Talk

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker has withdrawn the conditions he attached last January to an invitation that Russia's premier consider attending a summit conference in Canada, External Affairs Minister Smith said Tuesday.

Asked by Opposition leader Pearson in the Commons external affairs committee whether reiteration by Mr. Diefenbaker Friday of a December invitation he extended to former Premier Bulganin means the invitation to Nikita Khrushchev now "is without strings," Mr. Smith replied: "If the Security Council should decide that any part of the forthcoming summit meeting should be held in Canada there would be no strings attached."

"This is an unqualified, unconditional assertion."

"Then this represents a change in the prime minister's attitude," Mr. Pearson said.

MUST FOLLOW PLEDGE

In Winnipeg last January, addressing a Ukrainian gathering, Mr. Diefenbaker said his invitation to Mr. Bulganin was extended "only on the basis that Russia was prepared to abide by its promises at Geneva to permit free elections in the occupied countries."

"To meet with the Russians under their present conditions would be a betrayal of the people behind the Iron Curtain," Mr. Diefenbaker said then.

Mr. Smith, replying to Leon Crestohl, Liberal member of Parliament for the Montreal constitu-

tion of Cartier, Mr. Smith said Canada is not committed in any way to support any action Britain might take in defence of her Middle East oil interests.

Mr. Crestohl had asked Mr. Smith to comment on "menacing language" used in the House of Lords by the Earl of Home, secretary of state for Commonwealth relations, that Britain would take any steps necessary to protect her interests in Middle East oil.

Recession In Europe Looms

PARIS (APW)—Derick Heathcoat Amory, British chancellor of the exchequer, Tuesday said the European economy is showing signs of softness and the possibility of a recession is real.

Heathcoat Amory was president of a two-day meeting of ministers from the 17 Western European nations in the organization for European economic co-operation. The meeting gave special attention to the American economic downturn and its possible effects on Europe.

A resolution called on member countries to "pursue policies encouraging sustainable economic

growth."

Heathcoat Amory said danger signals had been sighted in a falling off of demand for basic commodities such as steel and textiles.
