Ivan Doherty the Sports Arena boxing promoter has set the wheels in motion for another big boxing show at the local arena on Wednesday Sept. 24th.

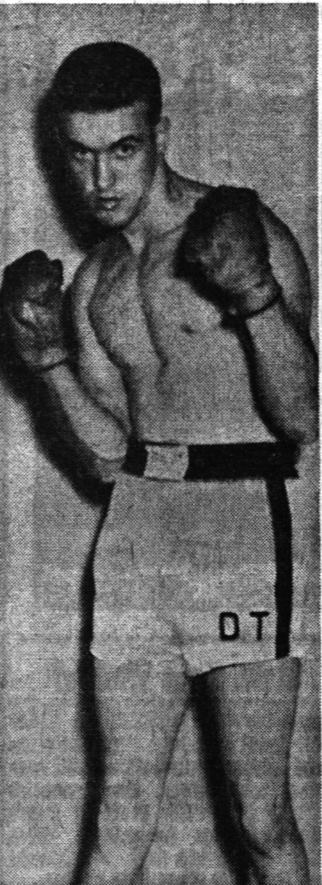

# Chualo Stops Parker In First

TORONTO (CP) — George Chualo scored a sensational first-round knockout over veteran James J. Parker to win the vacant Canadian heavyweight boxing championship at Maple Leaf Gardens Monday night.

Boxing observers predicted the scheduled 12-rounder between the two heavyweights would end early but the sudden finish surprised everybody in the crowd of 12,500, largest indoor crowd for a fight in Toronto in several years.

Chualo, who celebrated his 21st birthday only last Friday, storm all over Parker from the opening bell and floored the former lumberjack two times before referee Sammy Luftspring counted Parker out after exactly two minutes of action.

Parker, who at 30 was attempting a comeback after taking bad beating from world light heavyweight champion Archie Moore in Toronto two years ago, was no match for his bull-shouldered opponent. Parker, of Barrie, Ont., weighed 219 pounds; Chualo, of Toronto, 213.

After a few seconds of sparring, Chualo tore into Parker and a solid right smash to the head dropped Parker for a seven count. Parker was barely on his feet when Chualo stormed in firing punches. Another hard right floored Parker for a nine count.

Parker, obviously dazed from the attack, was a sitting target for the third and final assault. He tried to cover his head with both hands but Chualo rained punches on the one-time Canadian heavyweight contender and Parker sank to the canvas to stay. Chualo entered the ring a

Defending champion Walter Carver of Charlottetown, who in 1957 won both the trap and skeet championships, will be on hand to defend his title, as well as the mass winners in each division. Carver's main opposition will come from former champs Glydon Willis and Ron Atkinson, also Bob Hyndman, Gil Houston, Art Hogan, Ollie Harper and Bill Morrell. Western threats will be Donnie Gallant and Dick Henthorne of Summerside while from the East Art and Ken Clements of Montague should give a good account of themselves. Other gunners are also expected from Souris, Kensington, Tignish, etc.

In conjunction with the regular shoot novelty shoots, gun patterning, etc., will be held and for the first time the Charlottetown Gun Club has opened the range to any gunner on the island, no memberships are required and gunners may do any type of shooting they desire. The experienced gunner and the novice, both will be able to try their hand at the clay targets. Single rounds of trap or skeet may be shot if desired, it is not necessary to get in the Championship competition.

The Sceptre raised the British ensign as the Barbara Anne approached and the presidential yacht dipped the American colors.
