MONCTON (CP)—Nick Pidsodny racked up his fourth shutout of the season here Monday night as Moncton Hawks blanked Fredericton Capitals 2-0 in an Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League game postponed from Christmas.

Ray Lacroix shot the only first-period goal when he backhanded a hard drive past Fredericton goalkeeper John Craig at 5:57.

Centre Edward Thomson of the Hawks ended the scoring for the night at 12:11 of the second period when his low drive from the blue line slipped through a maze of legs and lodged in the lower corner.

Boxing, Theatre Subject To U.S. Anti-Trust News

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. Supreme Court decided Monday that both the prize fight and legitimate theatre businesses are subject to federal anti-trust laws.

This clears the way for trial in federal court of federal charges that monopolies exist in both businesses.

The court was unanimous in the case of the theatres. It split 2-2 in the case dealing with professional boxing.

The court overruled opinions given by district judges in New York that boxing and the theatre have the same standing as big league baseball and are exempt from the anti-trust act.

BOXING CLUB INVOLVED

Named in the government's complaint on boxing were the International Boxing Club and its president, James Norris; Madison Square Garden Corporation of New York and Arthur Wirtz, a partner of Norris in running Chicago Stadium.

The civil complaint charges that since 1949 the group has conspired to monopolize and has monopolized the promotion, exhibition, broadcasting, telecasting, and motion picture production and distribution of professional championship boxing matches.

The theatre complaint charges that Jacob Shubert, Marcus Helman and three corporations they control had conspired for years in restraint of interstate trade in the production, booking and presentation of legitimate attractions and that they conspired to monopolize the booking of attractions throughout the United States.

Retired Players Named To Baseball Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK (AP)—John Franklin (Home Run) Baker and Ray Chalk have been named to baseball's Hall of Fame by the special committee on players retired at least 25 years.

Naming of Baker, former great lead baseman with Philadelphia Athletics and New York Yankees from 1908 to 1922, and Chalk, the hitting star of Chicago White Sox from 1912 through 1928, boosted membership in the Cooperstown, N. Y., museum to 79 men.

Joe DiMaggio, Ted Lyons, Daz Vance and Gabby Hartnett were elected last week by another group, the 10-year members of the Baseball Writers Association of America who were restricted to players active within the last 10 years.

WINS WORLD SERIES

Baker, 68, got his nickname by winning two world series games for the Philadelphia A's against the New York Giants in 1911. The third baseman on Connie Mack's famous \$100,000 infield of Stuffy McInnis, Eddie Collins, Jack Barry and Baker in the years around 1912. Baker had a lifetime batting average of .308 from 1908 through 1922 with the A's and the Yankees.

Schalk, 62, caught for the White Sox from 1912 through 1932, managing the club the last two years. He finished his big league playing career with the New York Giants as a catcher-coach in 1929. Later Schalk coached the Chicago Cubs and managed vari-

TORONTO (CP)—Swimmer Marilyn Bell, conqueror of Lake Ontario, was presented with the Lou Marsh Trophy Saturday night as Canada's athlete of the year.

The award, given in memory of the former sports editor of the Toronto Star, has been won by two other Canadian women athletes. Skater Barbara Ann Scott won it in 1945, 1947 and 1948 and golfer Marlene Stewart won it in 1951.

Gelineau Signs With Quebec Aces

QUEBEC (CP)—Former Boston goalie Jack Gelineau, who retired from hockey last year, has signed with Quebec Aces of the Quebec Hockey League but won't see action for two weeks, general manager George Imlach announced Monday.

The 30-year-old player who won the Calder rookie award with Bruins in the 1950-51 season played with Aces from 1951-52 season to last year.

He practised with the Quebec team when regular goalie Dave Gatherum was injured earlier this month and played 10 minutes during an exhibition game Sunday at Rimouski.

Imlach said Gelineau pulled a leg muscle which will keep him away from action for about two weeks.

Claude Evans, sent to Quebec by Montreal Canadiens as an emergency replacement for Gatherum, will remain for the rest of the season, Imlach said.

French Champ Knocks Out Paddy DeMarco

PARIS (AP)—Seraphin Ferrer, undefeated, 24-year-old French lightweight champion, Monday night knocked out former world lightweight king Paddy DeMarco of Brooklyn in 2:30 of the fifth round of a scheduled 10-rounder in the Palais des Sports.

The 12,000 fans roared as the young Frenchman, an underdog to the veteran, 27-year-old American, floored DeMarco with a solid right to the chin.

Ferrer staggered to his feet at the count of five and then grabbed the ropes. The referee continued the count to 10 as DeMarco clutched the ropes, unable to continue.

It was the 16th straight victory for Ferrer, a pro only two years.

It was only the third time in 31 fights that DeMarco had been stopped, and it was the first time that he ever had been counted out.

Featherweight champion Sandy Saddler halted him on cuts and Jimmy Carter, the current 135-pound titleholder, stopped him in the 15th round last Nov. 27 when Carter regained the crown.

Leduc Has Hat-Trick Islanders Blank Ramblers 8-0 At Forum Last Night

The Charlottetown Islanders last night kept pace with the second place Moncton Hawks as they blanked the Amherst Ramblers 8-0 before an extremely small crowd at the Forum. The Islanders collected three goals in the opening period, banged four by Frigon in the middle session and added another in the finale.

It was the sixth shutout of the season for Islanders' goalie Jim Shirley and his second in a row on home ice. Jim stopped the Hawks 4-0 in their appearance here last Friday night. Ray Leduc was also in the midst of the honors, getting his second three-goal "hat-trick" of the year and also drawing an assist on Danny O'Connor's game-winning goal in the first period. Orin Carver, who is starting to hit his old stride again, collected two goals and one assist during last night's encounter. Other scorers were Bob Gray and Lorne Hennessy.

The Islanders controlled the play throughout most of the game with the defence clearing well and the forwards back-checking and passing nicely. This tended to give Jim Shirley in the Islanders cage plenty of protection as he was called upon to make only 18 stops. Jim came up with several sensational saves in the final period when the Ramblers outshot the locals 9-6.

The game, with the exception of several brief periods of raggedness due to close checking, produced some very fast clean hockey. Referees Jim Mitchell and Maurice Goodwin were called upon to award only five minor penalties, one of which came when the Ramblers used a start-up line other than the one which they had given to the official scorer.

Play was fairly even for the first five minutes of the game with both teams getting several good scoring opportunities. Jackie Leclerc and Mike Demchuk broke away as the Islanders pressed in the Amherst zone at the three-minute mark but were both taken out on nearly by Vip Palladino who rushed back fast and cleared the puck off Demchuk's stick and into the corner. Ray Leduc and Wumpy Jones raced right in on Bob Frigon in the Kiley cage at 4:30 but were held off the score sheet as the Amherst netminder fell flat on his back but managed to deflect a rolling puck off his stick and behind the net.

The Islanders had the Ramblers baffled and motionless for almost a minute at the half-way mark of the period before defence-mann Danny O'Connor grabbed a 15-foot rebound and slapped it between Frigon's pads at 5:10. The puck went down into the net over two minutes later Ray Leduc picked up a short pass from playing coach Steve Brklacich in his own end, raced up right wing, around the defence, cut in sharp on Frigon and slid

the rubber in the far corner of the net.

Orin Carver closed out the scoring of the period with the picture goal of the game at 15:00. The speedy right winger picked up a pass from linemate Vip Palladino at the Islanders' blue-line, carried up center ice, split the defence but as he went in was tripped by defenceman Don Rogers. While lying flat on the ice, Orin regained control of the puck and pushed it by a surprised Amherst goalie.

The Islanders continued to pressure the Ramblers in the second period collecting four unanswered goals before the session ended. Ray Leduc started the spurge as he banged in Wally Kullman's short rebound that Frigon never saw. Jackie Schmidt and Shermie White were stopped by Shirley near the midway mark as they entered the Islanders' zone with only one man back.

Lorne Hennessy combined on a nice passing play at 10:57 to give the Islanders a 5-0 lead. Wally Kullman, Hergie Campbell and Ray Leduc displayed some pretty triangular passing in front of the Amherst cage shortly after the 13 minute mark with Ray getting his third marker of the game. He was followed by Leduc, 6:01. Orin Carver ended the scoring of the frame as he banged in his own rebound on a pass right from the face-off by centerman Copper Leyte.

Bob Gray closed the scoring shortly before the five minute mark of the final period, shooting the puck over Frigon's shoulder on a pass from the side by Buck Whitlock. Buck was in time after time in this period but just couldn't put the rubber in the Amherst cage. Four of the five penalties of the game came in this period with the Islanders receiving three of them before Emmett Kennedy was banished late in the game on a hooking charge.

Steve Brklacich remained on the bench during the final period as did Lou Kiley of the Ramblers. Kiley was making his first appearance in several weeks on the local ice surface.

The Islanders got to Amherst tonight and return to the Forum to play the Capitals on Wednesday evening.

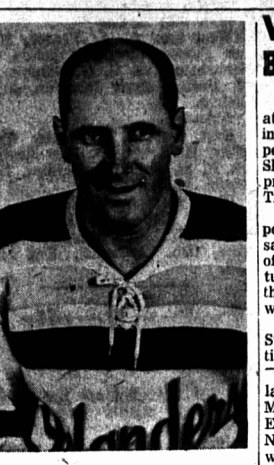
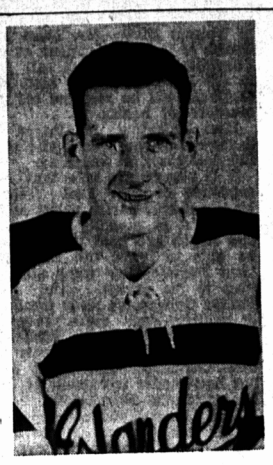
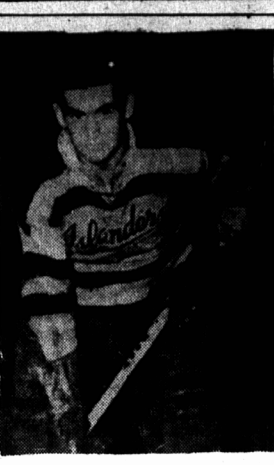
