OTTAWA, April 19.

Blake has been selected Leader of the Opposition, and has accepted.

A telegram says that George Brown was much worse last night.

The U. S. frigate *Alliance* has been ordered to Newfoundland fishing banks, to protect the interests of American fishermen.

The Viceroy of India telegraphs that a messenger who arrived at Cabul on the 28th, reports that the people of Warduk and Logar attacked Gen. Ross on Sunday, and after a severe engagement the enemy were completely dispersed, leaving 1,200 dead on the field. Our loss small, but not mentioned.

Lord Lytton leaves for England in a fortnight.

A bottle has been picked up at the junction of the rivers Weaver and Mersey, containing a paper inscribed, "H. M. S. Atlanta, 16th March. Fearful hurricane, dismasted, going down fast off the Lizard."
